FIRST SITTING

June 9th, 1931.

The Ninth Annual Assembly of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in Pasadena, Calif., June 9th, 1931, with First Assistant General Superintendent G. Arnold Hodgin in the chair. The Assembly opened by singing, "A Little Talk With Jesus." Scripture reading from II Pet. 1:1-14, with exhortations by Rev. Hodgin. Prayer by District Superintendent C. H. Dauel and Brother J. P. Coleman.

Moved and supported that the first five rows of seats on each side of the church constitute the assembly bar. Carried.

Moved and supported that we omit the reading of the minutes. Carried.

Moved and supported that the time of the sittings be from 9 to 11:45 A. M., and from 2 to 4 P. M. Carried.

Roll call followed by a motion to retain the name of Ethel True in the

ministerial directory. Motion carried. The transfers of Rev. Adrian Grout from the Kentucky District. Rev. Chas. R. Spear, Sr., and Mrs. Virginia Spear, from the Indiana District and Rev. Harvy H. Leach of the Reformed Methodist Church, New York Conference, accepted by the assembly.

Brother Spear was introduced to the assembly and gave his testimony. The recommendation of the District Council that the Keno, Ore., church be received into the assembly accepted. Rev. Marvin Gilliam, pastor of the Keno church, Sr. Gilliam and Mrs. Foster, the church dele-gates, were introduced to the assembly and gave their testimonies.

A letter from Rev. F. J. Briggs, missionary to China, read by the secretary.

Moved and supported that the secretary be instructed to send words of greeting from the assembly to those in the foreign fields. Carried. An offering of \$2.65 was taken to defray the expense of postage.

A letter from Bishop Juji Nakada, of Tokyo, Japan, read by Brother Hodgin was accepted by the assemply as a report.

Moved and supported that the chair appoint a committee of three to formulate a letter to be sent to those on the foreign field from whom we do not regularly hear. Said letter to encourage these to give to the as-sembly a short annual report of their labors.

A letter from Rev. and Mrs. Ralph V. Steelhead, of Misita, Colo., read and accepted.

Moved and supported that the chair appoint the nominating committee. Carried.

The following were named, C. H. Dauel, A. C. Augsbury and Geo. C. Wise.

Gene B. Gandier, G. H. Scofield and A. Krag, were appointed by the Chair as the committee to formulate the letter to foreign Missionaries.

Moved and supported that the annual reports of the district be read by the Secretary, and that each pastor be allowed the time to give a verbal statement of his work. Carried.

Motion to adjourn.

SECOND SITTING JUNE 9TH, 1931

Sitting opened with District Superintendent C. H. Dauel in chair. The song service was led by Brother Sickler; scripture reading by Brother Dauel; prayer by Brother Scofield.

Minutes of last sitting read and approved. Rev. William H. Neff, newly installed pastor of Pasadena First Church, was introduced to the Assembly and gave his testimony.

Moved and supported that Rev. William H. Neff be given a seat within the bar and that his credentials now pending transfer from the Indiana District be accepted. Carried.

Committee on nominations reports (See district boards). Report accepted.

Reading of district church reports by the Secretary continued.

Report of the District Superintendent was called for. Report adopted by the Assembly. (See reports).

Moved and supported that we extend the time of sitting one half hour. Carried.

A telegram from Brother Reynolds of the Rocky Mountain District, requesting that we pray for his sick daughter read by Brother Hodgin. Prayer was offered by Brother Palmer and Brother Hodgin.

Rev. C. L. Davis, of Ventura, requested that the Assembly grant him

a letter of transfer to the Nazarene Church, and that he be excused from the Assembly after this sitting. The request was granted. Report of Rev. C. W. Ruth, former acting pastor of Pasadena First Church read by the secretary. Report accepted. The secretary was instruct-ed to write him a letter of appreciation.

Moved and supported that Sr. Neff and Brother Thomas be given time to present the General Church budget Wednesday, June 10th, at the afternoon sitting. Carried.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

THIRD SITTING, JUNE 10TH, 1931

First Assistant General Superintendent Rev. G. Arnold Hodgin, in chair. The song service was led by Brother Hodgin; Scripture reading by Brother Scofield; prayer by Sr. Ashcraft.

Rev. W. R. Cain and Brother Fisher of the Free Methodist Church and Sr. Neff, assistant pastor of Pasadena First Church, were introduced to the Assembly.

Moved and supported that these be given a seat within the bar. Carried.

Roll call, followed by reading of the minutes. Minutes adopted. Home Missionary Committee recommends that Brother Roper be given 45 minutes to present the needs of Home Missionary work. Recom-Moved and supported that Thursday forenoon be given to the elec-

tion of officers. Carried.

Remaining reports of district churches, unstationed ministers and deaconesses given.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

FOURTH SITTING, JUNE 10TH, 1931

First Assistant General Superintendent G. Arnold Hodgin, in chair. The song service was led by Brother Hodgin; Bible quotations were given from Assembly floor. Prayer by Rev. Gittins of the Free Methodist Church.

Moved and supported that Brother Gittins be given a seat within the bar. Carried

Rev. William Kirby of the Friends Church, was introduced to the Assembly and seated within the bar.

Moved and supported that Rev. P. F. Elliott, Jr., of the Michigan District, be given a seat within the bar. Carried.

Rev. Lankard of the Nazarene Church was introduced to the Assembly and seated within the bar.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Home Missionary Board recommended that the Assembly grant Brother Roper 30 minutes to present the needs of Home Missions. Recommendation accepted.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society adopted.

The recently organized District Young Peoples' Society, through Brother Roper, requested that this organization be recognized by the Assembly as a part of the district work. The request was granted with The understanding that the proposed constitution be submitted to the District Council for approval before being adopted by the District Young Peoples' Society. Sr. Neff spoke briefly on the General Church Budget. This was fol-

lowed by questions from the floor.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

FIFTH SITTING, JUNE 11TH, 1931

First Assistant General Superintendent G. Arnold Hodgin in chair. After devotional service, minutes of former sitting were read and adopt-ed. Brother Dauel gave his testimony. Order of the day called for. The Chair appointed Brother Earl Bicker and Brother George Wise as tellers.

Ballots for district superintendent were cast, and resulted in Brother C. H. Dauel being elected.

Ballots were now cast for assistant district superintendent, and resulted in the election of Brother John Edwards.

Brother Dauel offered his resignation which was accepted.

Ballots were now cast for district superintendent, and resulted in > Brother Reed, of the Rocky Mountain District, being elected.

J. P. Roper was then elected as district secretary and G. F. Tyrrell as district treasurer.

Brother Reed was now introduced to the Assembly and after a short Italk offered his resignation. Resignation accepted.

Ballots were now cast for district superintendent, and resulted in a tie vote between Brother John Edwards and Brother Paul Nering.

Moved and supported that we extend the time of the sitting. Carried.

Moved and supported that the Chair appoint a committee to consider the matter of the District superintendent's support. Brothers Neff, Sickler and Coleman, were appointed.

Moved and supported that the Chair sit with this committee. Carried. Motion to adjourn. Carried.

SIXTH SITTING, JUNE 11TH, 1931

First Assistant General Superintendent G. Arnold Hodgin, in chair. The song service was followed by Scripture quotations from the floor; prayer by Brother Hodgin.

The committee on the district superintendent's salary reported. Report accepted. (See reports). General Secretary P. W. Thomas was introduced to the Assembly

and seated within the bar.

The order of the day was called for. Ballots were cast for district superintendent, and resulted in Rev. Paul Nering being elected.

Moved and supported that Brother Paul Elliott be requested to wire

Brother Nering of his election. Carried. Voting for three additional members of the District Council resulted in Brother Neff, Brother Sickler and Brother Augsbury being elected.

Moved and supported that we extend the time to allow Rev. Thomas time to speak on the general budget.

Moved and supported that this district proceed to put into effect the budget system as adopted by the General Assembly. Carried.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

SEVENTH SITTING, FRIDAY, JUNE 12TH, 1931

First Assistant General Superintendent G. Arnold Hodgin, in chair. Scripture reading by Brother Hodgin; prayer by Brother Cain.

Reading of minutes suspended.

Rev. Bud Robinson, A. E. Simpson and Weaver W. Hess, Fraternal delegates from the Nazarene Church introduced to the Assembly and brought greetings from the Nazarene Assembly. Seats within the Assembly bar were given them.

Moved and supported that we return greetings to the Nazarene Assembly by these delegates.

Rev. Jefferies from Sioux City, Iowa, was introduced to the Assembly and asked to testify. He was given a seat within the bar.

Brother and Sister Hafer from San Francisco, were introduced to

the Assembly and given a seat within the bar. Order of the day was called for. Brother Roper, speaking in behalf of the Home Missions Board, asked permission to withdraw their request to present the need of Home Missionary work. Request granted.

Brother Roper offers his resignation as district secretary .. The request was not granted.

Brother Dauel offers his resignation from the Home Missions Board.

Moved and supported that the chairmanship of the Home Missions Board be changed from Brother Dauel to Brother Roper and that Brother Dauel be retained on this board. Carried.

A letter of transfer of Brother and Sister Neff from the Ohio District accepted by the Assembly.

A letter of greetings from the Ohio District superintendent, read by the Secretary.

Moved and supported that a committee be appointed by the Chair to present plans to the Assembly for raising finances for district expenses other than that of the district secretary.

Brother Roper, Brother Sickler and Brother Troyer, were appointed.

The matter of district indebtedness to Brother Dauel was presented. Moved and supported that this Assembly go on record as urging each delinquent church to recognize its obligation here and do its utmost to quickly raise this deficit. Carried.

Moved and supported that this Assembly extend to Brother Reed and family our heartfelt love and the utmost confidence in his Christian character, and that we express this by a standing vote. Carried unanimously.

Brother and Sister Evans were introduced to the Assembly and given a seat within the bar. A telegram from Rev. Paul Nering in which he resigned from the

office of district superintendent was read by the secretary. Moved and supported that the order of the day for the election of a district superintendent be set for 2 P. M. Carried.

Report of the committee appointed to formulate a letter to the foreign missionaries was read by Sister Gandier, and accepted by Assembly.

The Committee on Memoirs reported. Report accepted.

The report of the Foreign Missions Committee read and accepted. A partial report of the Examining Board read and accepted.

Moved and supported that amount of stationary to be ordered shall be the same as last year. Carried.

Moved and supported that an offering be taken to help defray the cost of district printing. Carried.

An offering was then taken and amounted to \$11.07.

The Educational Board reported. Report accepted.

At her own request the credentials of Faith Wright, Phoenix, Ariz., were canceled by the Assembly. It was understood that in taking this action that there is no charge against her character.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

EIGHTH SITTING, JUNE 12TH, 1931

Sitting opened with First Assistant General Superintendent G. Arnold Hodgin in chair. The song service was followed with prayer by Brother Scofield.

Minutes read and approved after correction.

A letter from General Superintendent Seth C. Rees read and accepted.

The credentials of Rev. W. H. Hafer of San Francisco, received by the Assembly.

Upon the recommendation of Brother Neff, pastor of Pasadena First Church, Rev. W. R. Cain, of the Free Methodist Church was received as a member of the California District.

Order of the day called for.

Ballots were now prepared for the election of a district superintendent. The vote resulted in Rev. W. R. Cain being elected.

It was moved and supported that we pay the district superintendent the sum of \$500, with \$100 additional for traveling expenses and that we raise this sum by an apportionment amounting to \$1.00 per member per year. Carried.

Moved and supported that we give our former District Superintendent and Assistant District Superintendent a standing vote of thanks. Carried.

Moved and supported that we give our Secretary and Treasurer a standing vote of thanks. Carried.

Report of the Resolution Committee read and received. (See resolutions).

Rev. Pierce and Rev. Lang of the Nazarene Church were introduced to Assembly and given a seat within the bar.

Report of the Home Missionary Board received. (See reports).

Moved and supported that a charge of forty cents be made for the district minutes. Carried.

Moved and supported that each church take an offering for district expenses. Carried.

Report of Auditing Committee read and adopted. (See reports).

Moved and supported that a vote of thanks be given to the local church and school for the splendid accommodations furnished to the Assembly. Carried.

Reports of the Educational and Examining Boards referred to the District Council.

Moved and supported that the date and place of the 1932 Assembly be referred to the District Council. Carried.

Motion to adjourn.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Greetings in Jesus Dear Name. To the Annual Assembly of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

The following is my report for year ending May 1st, 1931:

The past year has been one of many battles and gracious victories. I believe the churches as a whole are looking up and much encouraged. Nearly all our churches have had revivals this year with good results. There seems to be a revival spirit on and may God help us while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work.

Our churches on the District have all been visited at least twice this year, most of them each quarter. Some have sent in urgent calls to which we have responded quickly.

One new church has been organized this year at Keno, Oregon, with an outlay of a little over one hundred dollars of home missionary money. We received this new church and parsonage valued at \$2,500.00, practically free from debt.

Ventura has added new Sunday School rooms and redecorated the church inside. East Pasadena is finishing its church building and is already in need of additional Sunday School rooms.

Long Beach will be building a new church in the near future. District Council, class and school board meetings have been attended. Problems have been worked out in which we feel God has helped us.

Have preached 110 times; held or helped in five revivals; traveled about 20,000 miles; received for support this year from churches, \$867.76; from revivals \$95.88; on back salary, \$35.00; total \$998.64.

We have taken in some new members, and have seen souls pray through to victory even at the close of a sacrament service, also secured several subscriptions to the Advocate.

New places are calling us to enter and organize. One of the reasons for these Macedonian calls seems to be that the danger and tendency is to swing toward popular holiness, and thus shun the legitimate reproach that goes with true holiness. My heart cry to God is that He will help us to hold up the standard of Bible holiness. Brethren let us be true to the trust He has given us. Time is too short; the coming of the Lord is at hand. We must be willing to endure hardness as true soldiers of Jesus Christ. I trust that this assembly will perfect plans to finance and carry on Home Mission Work and strengthen the Home Base, so we shall be enabled to do more for Foreign Missions.

We recommend that immediate steps be taken to answer the urgent calls that have come to us from Santa Barbara, San Francisco, Medford, Ore., also Roseburg, Myrtle Creek and Portland, Ore. We should respond to the call from Tuscon, Ariz., and from points near at home in the San Gabriel Valley.

Dr. Phoebe Stone was the second daughter of a sanctified Chinese couple. Her father was a Methodist minister and she was reared in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, early giving her heart to God.

Phoebe Stone felt called to the ministry of healing through medical missionary work. She graduated from the medical school of John Hopkins University, Baltimore, Maryland, and afterward engaged in hospital work and general medical practice with her sister, Dr. Mary Stone, in Shanghai, China.

Here her capable and sacrificial services to the souls and bodies of the sick and poor were crowned with an unusual degree of success and she was greatly loved and revered by her own people as well as many of other nationalities with whom she came in contact. She was brilliant, devoted, and Spirit-filled.

In the year 1929 she became a member of First Pilgrim Holiness Church of Pasadena, California, and shortly after this was ordained to the ministry in her native land, by Rev. G. Arnold Hodgin.
