DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

April 30, 1948

To the Reverend R. A. Beltz, General Secretary of Home Missions, and the South Carolina Home Missionary District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church,

Greetings:

Through the grace and mercy of our Lord we are glad to report His great salvation, that satisfieth every desire and longing of our heart, has proven more than a match against the onslaughts of the enemy and still lifts high the banner pointing the way to greater victories in the over-ripened harvest fields that await the coming of laborers seeking the lost ere Jesus comes.

We appreciate very much the cooperation and encouragement we have received from the Department of Home Missions, and the ministers and members of the District, as we have endeavored to carry out the Lord's plan with reference to the District work.

We are very sorry to have to leave this field so soon, recognizing the great opportunities that have presented themselves to the Church; but under doctors' advice we are having to do so, due to rheumatic fever.

We shall not cease to pray and do what we can for the advancement of the work of the Lord in the South Carolina District:

We herewith submit the following report:

We have visited all of the churches twice, and some of them more. On our quarterly visit we found that the spiritual tide of the churches was rising, souls praying through, interest on the increase, pastor and people encouraged, with the exception of the Red Hill Church. They have had a struggle, being a country church, with a low spiritual tide, few members, and a pastor who has undergone two operations since coming on the field in October. The battle has been hard, but continues.

Along with our District duties we served as one of the workers in our District camp this last year. Also under the direction of the Secretary of Home Missions we conducted a short revival in our new home missionary church at Pensacola, Florida, where the Lord gave gratifying results. From there we went to our new church in Birmingham, Alabama, where the Lord gave blessed victory.

We had arranged to hold a revival in each of the churches on the District, and did hold one at Winnsboro. But due to weather conditions and sickness the pastors felt it inadvisable to have the meetings as had been scheduled.

In February we attended the district superintendents' meeting at our Church Headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana; also assisted in the General Home Missionary Convention held in that city. Following this we did some

deputation work in the interest of General Home Missions. This work took us to McEwen, Tennessee; Lexington, Kentucky; Cincinnati, Ohio; Ashland, Kentucky; Logan, and Williamson, West Virginia; Grand Rapids, Toledo, Napoleon, Lancaster, Chillicothe, and Dayton, Ohio.

We were permitted to hold two revivals off the District but held only one, this being at Groveport, Ohio.

We attended the meeting of the Board of Directors of Pilgrim Bible College, Kernersville, North Carolina.

We have conducted five revivals.

S T A N D I N G R U L E S

1. The District Council shall set the date of the District Camp and Conference and call the workers.
2. The District Council shall select the date and place for the Ministerial Convention.
3. There shall be a District Camp Meeting Association with dues of one dollar per member each year, money to be used in promoting the annual Camp.
4. All licensed and ordained ministers shall tithe the income of their ministerial labors into the District Treasury for the support of the District Superintendent.
5. The churches shall raise the following amount each month toward the support of the District Superintendent.

Winnsboro	\$3.00	Killian	\$3.00
Red Hill	3.00	Lugoff	3.00

In addition to these amounts each church shall take a free-will offering for the Superintendent on each of his visits to apply on his traveling expenses.
6. The District Superintendent's salary from the District shall be \$50.00 a month, same to be paid from the ministerial tithe and the monthly apportionment to the churches.
7. The Sunday School offerings on the fifth Sunday shall be sent to the District Treasurer for miscellaneous District expense. We urge the churches to make this a generous offering each quarter.
8. All District funds shall be forwarded to the District Treasurer on or before the 10th of each month.
9. All the church books and records shall be closed August 1st and reports prepared for the annual District Conference. The statistical reports shall be sent immediately after this date to the District Secretary.
10. Each minister on the District shall contribute at least one week's work on the camp ground each year, subject to the call of the District Superintendent.
11. Each pastor shall be expected to attend the Camp and Conference and remain until the cleaning up is finished, unless excused by the District Council.
12. The District Young People's work shall be under the supervision of the District Superintendent. There shall be a Young People's Convention held in connection with the annual Camp.
13. BE IT RESOLVED: That the week preceding Easter be a week of self-denial for the benefit of a great Easter offering for Home Missions.
