

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Twenty-Seventh Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 15, 1949 at 7:30 a.m.

Rev. Charles Riggs led the Conference in singing, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Rev. W. E. Catey led in prayer. Rev. H. J. Beecher, District Superintendent, read a letter of greeting to the Conference from Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent.

Rev. H. J. Beecher introduced Rev. P. W. Thomas to the Conference and he took the chair.

Rev. P. W. Thomas read from Gen. 8:1 and gave an inspiring and stirring message.

The Secretary called the roll.

A motion carried to seat Henry Bursinger as delegate from the Springfield Church inasmuch as the delegate and alternate were not present.

A motion prevailed to have the platform and the first eight seats in the two center sections constitute the Conference bar. A motion was made and supported that the time of meeting be from

7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The afternoon sitting to convene at the call of the chair until 5:00 p.m., and the evening sitting be from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Motion carried.

The District Superintendent appointed Rev. Robert Bell as reception committee.

The District Superintendent, Rev. H. J. Beecher, read his report. Motion carried to accept.

The Reception committee introduced the following persons to the Con-ference: Rev. and Mrs. B. H. Jackson, Rev. and Mrs. Ewing, Rev. W. C. Beard, Rev. and Mrs. Charles Riggs, and Rev. W. E. Catey.

Motion carried to receive Rev. Charles Riggs and Rev. W. E. Catey into the Conference.

The District Superintendent presented the Casey church to the Conference. A motion prevailed to receive the church into the Conference. The report of the District Treasurer was read and accepted. (Printed in

reports.)

The Auditor's report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The Camp Meeting Treasurer's report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The report of the joint meeting of the Educational and Examining Boards was read and accepted with corrections. (Printed in reports.)

A partial report of the Ways and Means Committee was read.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. and Mrs. L. A. Williams and Rev. Reiber.

A motion prevailed to set the time for the Ordination Service at 7:30 p.m. A partial report of the Committee on Memorials to the General Con-

ference was read. Mrs. W. E. Honeycutt gave a report of the Memorial Committee which was duly accepted by the Conference. The Conference then stood and sang, "I Will Meet You in The Morning." Rev. Calloway offered prayer.

As the Statistical report was not ready, a motion prevailed to refer this report to the District Council.

A motion prevailed to recess until 1:15.

Second Sitting

The Conference reconvened at 1:15 with Bro. Thomas leading the congregation in singing "The Solid Rock." Prayer by Bro. John Abernathy.

The Committee on General Conference Memorials read their final report. Motion carried to accept.

Rev. E. O. Howell was introduced to the Conference and he gave a word of testimony.

The Ways and Means Committee read their final report. Motion carried to accept. (Printed in reports.)

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read and accepted.

A motion was made and supported to charge 25 cents per copy for the

District Minutes. Carried. The District Superintendent appointed as tellers Revs. Riggs, Aber-nathy, Ross. and Adams.

After a brief exhortation by Rev. P. W. Thomas and a season of prayer the Conference proceeded with the election of officers. A motion carried that Rev. Wineinger be excused as it is necessary for

him to return home.

Ballots were cast and the following officers were elected:

Rev. L. A. Williams was elected as District Superintendent.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway was re-elected as Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. Dwight Horn was re-elected as District Secretary.

Rev. Elmer Waltrip was re-elected as District Treasurer and Statistician. Additional members of the District Council, Rev. Everett Ashley, Rev. Robert Bell, and Rev. A. O. Cassady (The District Council later appointed Sylvan Calloway and W. E. Catey on Council to fill vacancies.)

The Conference adjourned at expiration of time.

Third Sitting

The Conference reconvened at 6:45 with Rev. Chester Wilkins leading

the Conference in singing, "He Leadeth Me." Prayer by Rev. Everett Ashley. A motion prevailed that the Secretary cast a ballot for Sylvan Calloway

as member of the examining board for 3 years. Rev. W. E. Catey was elected for three years as member of the Edu-

cational Board. Ballots were cast for District Trustee. Sylvan Calloway was elected

for three years.

A Motion was made and supported that the Secretary cast a ballot for Rev. Robert Bei, the Council nominee, as Executive Secretary of Young reoples' Work Carried.

A motion prevailed to recess.

The Conference re-convened with the Ordination Service. P. W. Thomas, H. J. Beecher, Sylvan Calloway, W. C. Beard, Everett Ashley, and D. M. Horn constituted the Ordination Council. E. N. Leonard, Paul Sebree, and Lynn Hill were ordained ministers and Virginia Meeks was ordained deaconess.

A motion carried to approve the nomination of the Council for delegates to the General Conference. Ministerial delegates, Everett Ashley, A. O. Cassady, W. E. Catey, and John Abernathy; alternate ministerial delegates, W. E. Honeycutt and Charles Riggs. Lay delegates, Ed Tuttle, Orland Gibson; alternate lay delegates, Burl McCollum and Frank Pearcy.

The Conference ratified the nominations of the District Superintendent for the remaining boards and committees. (See the Official Directory.)

Because the newly elected District Superintendent, Rev. L. A. Williams declined the office after being notified of his election, it was necessary to cast ballots again.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway was elected District Superintendent and Rev. W. E. Catey was elected Assistant Superintendent. (As Sylvan Calloway and W. E. Catey resigned following Conference, the District Council requested the General Executive Council to appoint a District Superintendent. They appointed Rev. R. W. Wolfe.)

A motion prevailed that the District Council take care of all unfinished business.

A motion carried that the Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our outgoing District Superintendent, Rev. H. J. Beecher, in appreciation of his faithful service rendered and fine spirit manifested during his term of office.

With a motion prevailing the Conference marched and gave a love offering to Bro. Beecher, while singing, "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes."

The Conference adjourned.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. Inasmuch as there has been a failure on the part of some of our pastors in carrying out some of the resolutions of the District Conference; therefore, be it resolved that if any pastor shall fail to carry out any resolution as passed by the District Conference he shall be denied both voice and vote in the following District Conference unless he shows just cause.

2.(a) Be it resolved that in accordance with the request of the General Church Sunday School committee, a District Sunday School committee be appointed by the District Council, and that this committee shall give a report to the District Conference.

(b) Be it resolved that a banner be given each quarter to the Sunday School that has the largest attendance and that a banner also be given to the Sunday School that has the highest percentage of increase in attendance over the preceding quarter.

(c) Be it resolved that each Sunday School shall send a quarterly report to the District Sunday School Secretary immediately following the last Sunday of the quarter Failure to do so—the dog house! (d) Be it resolved that each church make an earnest effort to double their average attendance during the following year. The churches reaching this goal shall be awarded a special certificate and commendation at the next District Conference.

3. Be it resolved that all local ministers shall meet with the Educational Board and all licensed ministers shall meet with the Educational and Examining Boards not later than last Saturday of the camp meeting.

4 Resolved that all our evangelists and ministers arrange their slates and work so as not to conflict with the camp and conference. Be it further resolved that each pastor shall have the privilege of holding one revival off his charge with regular salary provided he supply his pulpit satisfactorily in his absence

5. Resolved that the District Secretary be instructed to have 500 copies of these minutes printed within 30 days after the close of the annual conference.

6. Each pastor shall maintain a calling list, using a card filing system which shall be the property of each succeeding pastor and the expense of same shall be borne by the local church.

7. In order to facilitate the work of the Education Board and to clarify our Conference Minutes, be it resolved, that those pursuing a Conference Course of study be classified in the Ministerial directory according to their standing.

8 (a) Resolved that the Conference Year shall end with June 30th each year and all business transacted between that and the Annual Conference shall be included in the following year's report. Also the Conference year shall be divided into four quarters ending with the following dates respectively:First Quarter, July 1st to September 30th; Second Quarter, October 1st to December 31st; Third Quarter, January 1st to March 31st; Fourth Quarter April 1st to June 30th.

(b) Be it further resolved that a quarterly meeting be held in each church within ten days following the close of each quarter, at which time reports covering the quarter shall be heard and then copied in the Church Secretary's book and mailed to the Distict Superintendent.

(c) Resolved that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10th

9 Resolved that all of our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference Minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.

10 (a) Resolved that each pastor shall keep a record of all subscribers to the Advocate in each neighborhood where he pastors and shall, about thirty days before each subscription expires, endeavor to secure a renewal of the same.

(b) Be it further resolved that each pastor shall endeavor to secure as many subscriptions to the Advocate as possible in each town or community in which his regular appointment is located.

11. Resolved that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.

12 Resolved that this Conference require its Ministerial members to attend the Conference and Camp Meeting. They shall be present on the first day and remain to the close Each church shall keep up the salary of its pastor during Camp Meeting. If any minister does not attend he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for his absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be disciplined.

13. Resolved that the District Secretary shall notify in writing all of the members of this conference who have failed to meet the requirements of the foregoing rule No 12, calling their attention to such failure and the pen alty for the same at least thirty days before our next conference.

14 Resolved that the pastor shall be responsible for the accuracy and condition of all church records and all quarterly and annual reports.

15. Resolved that the books of the course of study not now possessed by the examiners shall be purchased by the District for their use. The books shall remain the property of the District and the examiners using the same shall be responsible for their preservation and shall reimburse the District if the books are damaged or lost through their neglect.

16. Be it resolved that the District Council name the District Young People's Officers and Zone Chairmen not later than Wednesday of Camp Meeting each year

17. Be it resolved that the Zone Chairmen be expected to visit each church in his zone at least once during the Conference year in the interest of the Young People's Work. Since there are so many churches in the Central Zone we recommend that co-chairmen for this zone be named by the District Council.

18. Be it resolved that a special Young People's report blank be prepared by our District Secretary and District Young People's Executive Secretary, to be mailed along with the regular quarterly report blanks to each local church. The said special blanks to be filled out and mailed to the Executive Secretary to keep him informed as to the progress of the local Young People's Societies.

19. Be it resolved that our Young People's Committees be empowered to provide their own legislation upon the approval of the District Council.

20. Be it resolved that because of the present trend of this immodest age, our ministers and the laity be admonished to carry out the special rules of our Manual page 49, section 65.

of our Manual page 49, section 65. 21. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time.

22. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.
23. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent or the Assistant

23. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and, if possible, present when drawing up all deeds in the District.

24. Be it resolved that we have a quarterly Ministerial Zone meeting. The Zone Chairman to be appointed by the District Superintendent.

25. Be it resolved that a Ministerial Convention be held the first Tuesday of April. The Council to fix the place on invitation from the churches

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved that all preachers either come, send one, or pay the equivalent of \$2.00 per day labor for the preparation of the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.
 Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint the various

2. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint the various camp meeting committees and said chairman of each committee be authorized to purchase the necessities of his department under the direction of the District Superintendent.

3. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint some one to be deputized to patrol the camp ground during meeting and to be hereafter enforced.

4. Be it resolved that the pastors and the District Supt. present the needs of the camp meeting to the churches, and that each church be responsible for six dessert dishes, six heavy glasses, one blanket or comfort, one straw tick, three each of plates, knives, forks, and spoons and to secure donations of fruit and vegetables.

5. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the ground after 7:00 p. m. without permission from parents or the one under whom they work and they shall be expected to attend Young People's and night services.

6. Be it resolved that each pastor shall secure during the year not fewer than five new members for the Charleston Camp Meeting Association.

7. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.

8. Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting; therefore, be it resolved that special services be held for them.

9. Inasmuch as so many people bring their lunch during the camp meeting; therefore, be it resolved that wayside tables be made and placed in convenient places on the grounds for their accomodation. 10. Be it resolved that all who rent rooms during camp be advised

to bring their own bedding.

11. Be it resolved that when one has reserved a room or rooms that they notify the chairman of the entertainment committee not later than Wednesday prior to the beginning date of the camp as to when they expect to arrive and if not heard from by first Friday of camp their room may be rented to another.

12.Be it resolved that our Camp Meeting date be as follows, to begin the first Friday in August of each year.

13.Be it resolved that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register and pay the sum of \$1.00 at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall.

We recommend that the Camp Meeting Committee have a 14. Registration and Information sign made for the Office and that all campers. upon arrival, be requested to register their names and addresses and arrange for meals and lodging.

We recommend that each church be requested to furnish a bed 15. and springs for the camp.

Be it resolved that the District Council provide a meeting place 16.for Young People's services other than the tabernacle.

We recommend that the District Council provide and post signs 17. on the camp ground that they deem advisable, such as, no smoking, no parking, etc.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

Since the General Conference has adopted the budget system of administering the finances of the General Church, we strongly urge all local boards to adopt the budget system for administering the finances of their respective local churches, namely: Each church in this District shall raise an amount equal to \$1.00 per member for General Home Missions, \$1.00 per member for General Administration expense and \$2.00 per member for Foreign Missions, the same to include money raised for Missions by the Sunday School, etc.

We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for 2. his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a minimum financial support they will pay their pastor during the year. 3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all

3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of an regular Church, Sunday School, and Young People's offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents, and evangelists, and that the District Budget be prorated as follows: District Expense Fund, 75%; District Home Missions, 20%; General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible School, 2%. 4. We recommend that all pastors, District evangelists, and other licensed and ordained ministers of the District tithe their income into the local aburch of which they are a member

the local church of which they are a member 5. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary

of \$3,000.00 per year and 5c per mile traveling expense 6. Since the District Superintendent is to the District what the pastor is to the church, we recommend, that the District Superintendent shall meet with each local church board at the time of his visits and inquire into the spiritual and financial condition of the church and help them in the solution of their various problems; we further recommend, that the duties of the District Superintendent, as outlined by the District Council, be printed in the minutes.

We recommend that the District Superintendent tithe his salary into the District Treasury to be credited to the District Expense Fund. 8. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as camp

meeting treasurer and be paid the sum of \$45.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer shall act as District Statistician

and be paid the sum of \$12500 per year. 9. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of \$10.00 for each delegate attending the Camp and Conference and this is to include board and room.

10. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating device that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks 11 vacation with salary.

12.We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone

13.We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent be paid the sum of \$7.00 per day, plus 4c per mile traveling expenses while rendering services for the District.

We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first 14.

floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; and third floor, \$1.50 per cot. 15 We recommend that each local and licensed minister taking his or her examination shall pay the examiner the amount of \$1.00 for each examination taken.

We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed; the 16.amount to be decided by the District Secretary.

We recommend that each Zone take an offering for the District 17. Young People's Executive upon each visit.

We recommend that each member of the District be asked to 18. contribute \$1.00 per year for camp meeting expense.

19 We recommend that the District Council appoint a committee of three with the District Superintendent as Chairman, the same to be known as the District Home Missionary Committee. They shall have charge of all the District Home Missionary work under the direction of the District Council. We further recommend that the expenses of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.

Whereas there is a definite need for a fund on the District to 20.help in the building of new churches and others to improve their property: We recommend that there be a fund created to be known as a Church Extension Loan Fund. This fund to be created by sending a representative to our churches to present the need and raise an offering for this purpose. We further recommend that all proceeds from the sale of church property now in the hands of the District Treasurer be allocated to this fund; that all proceeds received from future sales of church property be ear-marked for this fund Loans from this fund are to be granted to churches for worth-while projects, only upon the recommendation of the District Home Missionary committee and the endorsement of the District Council. Those receiving loans from this fund shall pay it back in regular monthly 21. We recommend that the camp cottage be modernized and be used

as temporary District parsonage.

We endeavored to get a Mission group at Bloomington to unite with us. Bro. Adams reports that some of them are now attending our services. We helped to move our portable Tabernacle from Greenup to our Camp

Grounds where it has been temporarily converted into a dormitory and filled

to its capacity in the good Camp God has just given us. I planned and counciled with the Chicago Pilgrims, consequently they have purchased a building site and plan to build soon. Bro. Abernathy conducted a home missionary meeting at Greenup and we tried hard to get a good foothold but as yet have failed to establish a work.

I have conducted 62 church board meetings and all the annual church meetings except one, also conducted four special called District Council meetings, attended two General Board meetings, one Bible School Board meeting, and conducted our Ministerial Convention at Argo. I preached 125 times on the District and 26 times off the District while on vacation. Have seen a few souls find God both for pardon and purity. While I have traveled 18,000 miles in the interest of the District I am asking pay on

mileage travel on only 12,000 miles.My salary is paid in full up to August 1st. In conclusion, I will say there have been cares burdens and many problems too numerable to mention here, but it has been an enjoyable battle. Because of the magnanimous spirit of the saints, and of my assistant, and of all the council members, their fellowship has graciously enriched my life and endeared them to me. Laboring with them has been pleasant and wonderful in the Holy Ghost.

In order to clarify our position on divorce and re-marriage, be 3. it resolved, that section 165, page 111 of our Manual be amended by substituting the following: Any minister or deaconess who has been divorced from one companion and has married another without the former having died, or shall marry one who has another living former companion, shall not be licensed or ordained; and any minister or deaconess who violates this rule shall be immediately dismissed from his ministerial standing.
