JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Twenty-Eighth Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 14, 1950 at 8:30 a. m.

Rev. Bence Miller led the Conference in singing the songs, "He Whispers His Love to Me" and "It Cleanseth Me." Rev. John Abernathy led in prayer.

Rev. R. G. Flexon greeted the Conference and read the Scripture lesson from II Chron. the 30th chapter, giving an inspiring and soul stirring message on the subject of Revivals.

The District Superintendent, Rev. R. W. Wolfe presented Rev. Flexon, General Secretary of Foreign Missions, to the Conference as presiding officer.

The Secretary called the roll with 62 members answering present.

A motion carried to seat Mrs. Everett Ashley as delegate from the Argo Church.

A motion prevailed to have the platform and the first eight seats in the two center sections constitute the Conference bar.

A motion carried to receive the Pleasant Hill Church into the Conference.

A motion was made and seconded that the District Superintendent appoint a Reception Committee. Motion carried. He appointed Charles Riggs and Rev. L. S. Lancaster.

A motion carried to give Rev. and Mrs. H. J. Beecher seats within the Conference bar with the privileges of the floor.

A motion prevailed to have the time of meeting be from 7:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. The afternoon sitting to convene at the call of the chair until 5:00 p. m., and the evening sitting be from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m.

The District Superintendent, Rev. R. W. Wolfe, read his report. Motion carried to accept.

The Reception Committee introduced to the Conference Rev. Dewey Barker, California District; Rev. Wm. Hall, Tennessee District; Rev. and Mrs. Bence Miller; Rev. Reed, Michigan District; and Rev. and Mrs. Roy Davis from the Indiana District.

A motion carried to grant them an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The Auditor's report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The Reception Committee introduced to the Conference Rev. Walter Drown, District Superintendent of the Rocky Mountain District, and Rev. Wm. Thompson from the Missouri Methodist Conference.

The Campmeeting Treasurer's report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The Statistician's report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The report of the Sunday School Board was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The Secretary brought word of appreciation from Mrs. J. W. Wolfe and family for the flowers sent as an expression of sympathy in the passing of Mr. J. W. Wolfe the father of our District Superintendent.

The District Superintendent appointed Mrs. W. E. Catey, Mrs. Bence Miller, and Mrs. H. A. Zufall as Committee on Memorials.

A motion carried to adjourn. Prayer by Bro. Wolfe.

Second Sitting

The Conference reconvened at 3:00 p. m. with the congregation singing, "Beulah Land" led by Bro. Miller. Prayer by Bro. Hill.

The Reception Committee introduced the following to the Conference: Rev. and Mrs. Charles Brewbaker, and Mrs. R. W. Wolfe.

The report of the joint meeting of the Educational and Examining Boards was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read and accepted. A partial report of the Resolutions Committee was read and accepted.

A motion carried that the Conference recess.

Third Sitting

The Conference reconvened at 6:00 p. m. with prayer by Rev. Cassady. A final report of the Resolutions Committee was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

A motion prevailed that the Ordination Service be immediately following the election of officers.

A motion carried that Rev. and Mrs. Garvin Sheridan sing. They sang "I Would Like To Talk It Over With Him".

A motion was made and supported that the election of officers be the order of the day. Motion carried.

The District Superintendent appointed Rev. Paul Meeks, Rev. Bence Miller, Rev. Charles Brewbaker and Rev. H. A. Zufall as tellers.

Rev. R. G. Flexon led the conference in prayer to God for His guidance in the election.

The Conference proceeded with the election of officers. The following officers were elected:

Rev. R. W. Wolfe was elected District Superintendent.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway was re-elected Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. Dwight Horn was re-elected District Secretary.

Rev. Elmer Waltrip was re-elected District Treasurer and Statistician.

Additional members of the District Council, Rev. A. O. Cassady, Rev. W. E. Catey, and Rev. W. C. Beard.

A motion was made and supported to set aside the rules and vote by acclamation. Motion carried.

Rev. John Abernathy was elected for three years as member of the Examining Board.

Rev. W. E. Honeycutt was elected for three years as member of the Educational Board.

Rev. Everett Ashley was elected for three years as District Trustee.

The Conference ratified the District Council appointment of Rev. W. E. Honeycutt, Rev. W. C. Beard, and Rev. Charles Riggs as District Sunday School Board. Rev. Honeycutt to be Conference Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools.

The Conference ratified the District Council appointment of Rev. Garvin Sheridan as Executive Secretary of Young People's Work.

A motion carried to reconsider the former action on the Ways and Means Committees recommendation that each Sunday School send \$2 to the Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools for the operating expenses of the work of the Sunday School Board. A motion prevailed to amend it to \$3 per Sunday School.

A motion was made and supported to ratify the appointment of the remaining committees by the District Superintendent. (See the Official Directory.)

The Conference proceeded with the Ordination Service. Rev. R. G. Flexon, Rev. R. W. Wolfe, Rev. W. E. Catey, Rev. Sylvan Calloway, Rev. Cassady and Rev. Elmer Waltrip constituted the Ordination Council.

Rev. Bence Miller led the Conference in singing "A Charge to Keep". W. E. Catey led in prayer. Rev. Wolfe read the Scripture lesson from I Tim. 3:1-15. Bro. Flexon gave an ordination message on the ministers calling after which Amos Glendening and Garvin Sheridan were duly ordained

by the laying on of hands and prayer. The service concluded by singing the song, "Bless Be the Tie that Binds" with the congregation marching and shaking hands with them.

Motion carried to accept Bro. Ashley's invitation to have the Ministerial Convention at Argo.

A motion carried to give a rising vote of thanks to the General Secretary of Foreign Mission, Rev. R. G. Flexon, for his splendid chairmanship of the Conference.

A motion prevailed to have the District Council take care of all unfinished business.

Bro. Flexon gave an expression of appreciation to the conference for every kindness shown him.

A motion carried to adjourn. Bro. Wolfe dismissed with prayer.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. Inasmuch as there has been a failure on the part of some of our pastors in carrying out some of the resolutions of the District Conference; therefore, be it resolved that if any pastor shall fail to carry out any resolution as passed by the District Conference he shall be denied both voice and vote in the following District Conference unless he shows just cause.

2. (a) Be it resolved that we have a District Sunday School Committee whose manner of appointment and duties shall be that outlined by the manual. Be it further resolved that each of our pastors shall co-operate with this Committee.

(b) Be it resolved that the fifty Sundays not including the Camp Meeting Sundays constitute the Sunday School year, and averages and awards be thus based.

3. Be it resolved that all local ministers shall meet with the Educational Board and all licensed ministers shall meet with the Educational and Examining Boards not later than the last Saturday of the camp meeting.

4. (a) Be it resolved that each pastor shall have the privilege of holding one revival off his charge with regular salary provided he supply his pulpit satisfactorily in his absence.

(b) Be it further resolved that each pastor and all evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the camp and conference, and that if any minister does not attend camp and conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for his absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be dealt with by the Council.

5. Resolved that the District Secretary be instructed to have 500 copies of these minutes printed within 30 days if possible, after the close of the annual conference.

6. Each pastor shall maintain a calling list, using a card filing system which shall be the property of each succeeding pastor and the expense of same shall be borne by the local church.

7. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers duties are adopted.

8 (a) Resolved that the Conference Year shall end with June 30th each year and all business transacted between that and the Annual Conference shall be included in the following year's report. Also the Conference year shall be divided into four quarters ending with the following dates respectively: First Quarter, July 1st to September 30th; Second Quarter, October 1st to December 31st; Third Quarter, January 1st to March 31st; Fourth Quarter, April 1st to June 30th.

(b) Be it further resolved that a quarterly meeting be held in each church within ten days following the close of each quarter, at which time reports covering the quarter shall be heard and then copied in the Church Secretary's book and mailed to the District Superintendent.

(c) Resolved that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10th.

9 Resolved that all of our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference Minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.

10 (a) Resolved that each pastor shall keep a record of all subscribers to the Advocate in each neighborhood where he pastors and shall, about thirty days before each subscription expires, endeavor to secure a renewal of the same.

(b) Be it further resolved that each pastor shall endeavor to secure as many subscriptions to the Advocate as possible in each town or community in which his regular appointment is located.

11. Resolved that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.

12. Resolved that the pastor shall be responsible for the accuracy and condition of all church records and all quarterly and annual reports.

13. Resolved that the books of the course of study not now possessed by the examiners shall be purchased by the District for their use. The books shall remain the property of the District and the examiners using the same shall be responsible for their preservation and shall reimburse the District if the books are damaged or lost through their neglect.

14. Be it resolved that all local church annual business meetings be completed by June 1st of each year.

15. Be it resolved that a Ministerial Convention be held the first Tuesday of April. The Council to fix the place on invitation from the churches.

16. Be it resolved that the District Council name the District Young People's Officers and Zone Chairmen not later than Wednesday of Camp Meeting each year.

17. Be it resolved that the Zone Chairmen be expected to visit each church in his zone at least once during the Conference year in the interest of the Young People's Work. Since there are so many churches in the Central Zone we recommend that co-chairmen for this zone be named by the District Council.

18. Be it resolved that a special Young People's report blank be prepared by our District Secretary and District Young People's Executive Secretary, to be mailed along with the regular quarterly report blanks to each local church. The said special blanks to be filled out and mailed to the Executive Secretary to keep him informed as to the progress of the local Young People's Societies.

19. Be it resolved that our Young People's Committees be empowered to provide their own legislation upon the approval of the District Council.

20. Be it resolved that because of the present trend of this immodest age, our ministers and the laity be admonished to carry out the special rules of our Manual page 49, section 65.

21. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time.

22. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.

23. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and present when drawing up all the deeds in the District.

24. Be it resolved that we have a quarterly Ministerial Zone meeting. The Zone Chairman to be appointed by the District Superintendent.

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that all preachers either come, send one, or pay the equivalent of \$2.00 per day labor for the preparation of the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint the various camp meeting committees and said chairman of each committee be author-

ized to purchase the necessities of his department under the direction of the District Superintendent.

3. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint some one to be deputized to patrol the camp ground during meeting and to be hereafter enforced.

4. In the face of the present need, be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the camp meeting to the churches and that each church be responsible for six desert dishes, six heavy glasses, six heavy cups, six dish towels one blanket, one straw tick, also fruit, jelly, and vegetables.

5. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the ground after 7:00 p. m. without permission from parents or the one under whom they work and they shall be expected to attend Young People's and night services.

6. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.

7. Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting; therefore, be it resolved that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.

8. Inasmuch as all sources for raising camp meeting funds prior to the camp have been deleted; be it resolved that it be left in the hands of the Council to provide a feasible plan to supply these funds.

9. Inasmuch as so many people bring their lunch during the camp meeting; therefore, be it resolved that wayside tables be made and placed in convenient places on the grounds for their accomodation.

10. Be it resolved that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

11. Be it resolved that when one has reserved a room or rooms that they notify the chairman of the entertainment committee not later than Wednesday prior to the beginning date of the camp as to when they expect to arrive and if not heard from by first Friday of camp their room may be rented to another.

12. Be it resolved that our Camp Meeting date be as follows, to begin the first Friday in August of each year.

13. Be it resolved that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall.

14. We recommend that the Camp Meeting Committee have a Registration and Information sign made for the Office and that all campers, upon arrival, be requested to register their names and addresses and arrange for meals and lodging.

15. We recommend that each church be requested to furnish a bed and springs for the camp.

16. Be it resolved that the District Council provide a meeting place for Young People's services other than the tabernacle.

17. We recommend that the District Council provide and post signs on the camp ground that they deem advisable, such as, no smoking, no parking, etc.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. We recommend that each church in this District shall raise an amount equal to \$1 per member for General Home Missions, \$1 per member for General Administration Expense, \$2 per member for Foreign Missions 75c per member for General Church College, 50c per member for the General Home Missionary Building Loan Fund, and 25c per member for General Sunday School Work.

2. We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a minimum financial support they will pay their pastor during the year.

3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Young People's offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents, and evangelists, and that the District Budget be prorated as follows: District Expense Fund, 75%; District Home Missions, 20%; General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible School, 2%.

4. We recommend that all pastors, District evangelists, and other licensed and ordained ministers of the District tithe their income into the local church of which they are a member.

5. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,000.00 per year and 5c per mile traveling expense.

6. Since the District Superintendent is to the District what the pastor is to the church, we recommend, that the District Superintendent shall meet with each local church board at the time of his visits and inquire into the spiritual and financial condition of the church and help them in the solution of their various problems; we further recommend, that the duties of the District Superintendent, as outlined by the District Council, be printed in the minutes.

7. We recommend that the District Superintendent tithe his salary into the District Treasury to be credited to the District Expense Fund.

8. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as camp meeting treasurer and be paid the sum of \$45.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer shall act as District Statistician and be paid the sum of \$175 per year.

9. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of \$10.00 for each delegate attending the Camp and Conference and this is to include board and room.

10. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating device that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

11. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks vacation with salary.

12. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.

13. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent be paid the sum of \$7.00 per day, plus 4c per mile traveling expenses while rendering services for the District.

14. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; and third floor, \$1.50 per cot.

15. We recommend that each local and licensed minister taking his or her examination shall pay the examiner the amount of \$1.00 for each examination taken.

16. We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed; the amount to be decided by the District Secretary.

17. We recommend that each Zone take an offering for the District Young People's Executive upon each visit.

18. We recommend that the District Council appoint a committee of three with the District Superintendent as Chairman, the same to be known as the District Home Missionary Committee. They shall have charge of all the District Home Missionary work under the direction of the District Council. We further recommend that the expenses of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.

19. Since the recent purchase of a District Parsonage has involved the District in debt, we recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2 per year per member, to meet this indebtedness; And that all money received for church properties sold in the District, plus all now in the hands of the District Treasurer from this source, be added to the District Parsonage Fund.

20. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School program; We recommend that each Sunday School in the District be asked to send the District Promotional Secretary the amount of \$3 (three dollars) for this work, immediately following the District Conference.

7. That Sherman Deisher be promoted to the second year.
8. That C. N. Brewbaker, Dewey Barker and Blanche Reed be received into the Conference and placed in the second year course of study.
9. That Murl Baldwin, Jesse Carrell, Grace Catey, S. H. Glendenning, Floyd Kettwig, Elizabeth Medsker, Bence Miller, Mae Roller, John Teiffel, Edward Tuttle and Wm. Wineinger be retained in the first year course of study.
10. That Jack Hysel be received into the Conference and placed in the first year course of study.
11. That the following names be dropped from the Conference roll: Robert Bell and Marie Young by reason of transfer to other Districts. Grant Starwalt at his request, Burtle Evans and LeMoyné Rich.
12. That Ruth Meeks be Commissioned as Song Evangelist.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To The Illinois District Conference Of The Pilgrim Holiness

When in the course of events, and the providence of God, we travel life's highway and pursue various courses of labor, in the vineyard, which ultimate-

ly and finally brings us to the end of another year, we are constrained to look up from our labors and give praise to God who will do all things according to his own plan and purpose.

This has been a year of many battles, and struggles with problems which are incident to the work of a District Superintendent. Some victories have been won, and at times we felt we were gaining some ground with the many duties. But at no time were we ever tempted to give up the battle.

In September 1949, we took up our duties as District Superintendent of the Illinois District, having been appointed to this field by the General Superintendent, and some weeks later moved to our field of labor, and have been at the post of duty ever since. A District Parsonage was purchased in the city of Charleston and we have resided at this place since coming to the District.

God has been good to us, in trying to get our bearings on a new field of labor. Having spent some years on the Evangelistic field, it was not easy to suddenly grasp the perspective of new situations. Many things have been accomplished, in this short time, however it all seems so little compared to the potentialities and possibilities of this one of the greatest fields of aggressive endeavor we have been privileged to look upon.

This great State presents to us as a Church, one great challenge for souls and the Kingdom of God and our Church. It would be very difficult to enumerate the many little advances, along the line, as we know each church on the District throughout the year have improved church property and some a great deal, but some definite advances have been made we feel in some places.

At Bloomington, we have sold the old property, which was a dwelling house, and have purchased new property across the street, and now we have a nice six room parsonage, and at this time we have our new cement block church building well on the way and expect to be able to worship in the basement at a near date. Rev. Forest Adams, who has spent some years on this field, has done a fine piece of work in Bloomington, which is a credit to our church.

At Springfield Brother Beard has just about completed a nice new parsonage next to the church, which is also a credit to the District. Brother Beard has done most of the work himself, and we are glad to see him get moved from his quarters in the basement of the church.

At Bridgeport, Brother Ford accomplished almost a miracle in erecting a new parsonage. We purchased a prefabricated building and it was moved in and put up within a fortnight, which was an astounding feat of accomplishment, and the community was amazed at what was done in such a short time. It is a fine building, and is also a credit to the church and community.

The church at Charleston has installed new stained glass windows, and Brother Horn certainly has made a wonderful improvement, which was made at no small cost and labor.

The church at Lawrenceville has put on a reconstruction program in the parsonage. Under the leadership of Brother Honeycutt they have added new rooms which has virtually made a new building out of the old one. The value of our property has been increased many hundreds of dollars.

At Martinsville improvements have been made on the grounds outside, and the church has been made new on the interior, until you would hardly recognize it. Brother Tuttle certainly has done nice work there.

At Oblong Brother Cassidy has made and is still in the process of improving the church until it is one of our nicest plants of frame structure. Our old building has been almost completely renovated.

Quite a little work of improvement as you can see has been done on the District Camp grounds, in new buildings. The care and work done by our caretaker on the camp grounds is almost inestimable, and Brother Hash is constantly on the job.

And as it has already been stated we have purchased a District parsonage at 1115 4th Street, in the city of Charleston.

One new church will have been organized by Brother Johnson at or near the town of Lexington, Ill., which is about 18 miles north of Bloomington. When the charter membership was to have been completed they will have

about eleven members and we are told they are in their new quarters of worship.

The spiritual morale of our District personnel is above the average, and we have a fine field and a mind to work. Our trips over the District have been many and varied, and in various interests. Some have thought we have come and gone to stay gone. Some have seen us quite frequently. And a few thought they would never see us. But all seemed to be patient with our short comings and our incessant goings. We have made one complete trip over the entire District and to some churches, emergencies have made it necessary for us to turn up quite frequently.

Our District Y. P. S. department we feel, has kept up its normal interest, enthusiasm and work. When Brother Bell the District Leader transferred, Sister Honeycutt was appointed to take his place, and has kept the work in good shape.

The S. S. Department of the District it appears, has been growing in interest, and we feel the Committee has a well organized program and have worked hard at the job which has increased interest and attendance in all of Sunday Schools.

Our District Ministerial meeting held at Lawrenceburg in April, was well attended, by some it was said to be one of the best in years.

We have traveled approximately 36 thousand miles on the District and only mileage sufficient to carry on the work has been expended. We have received our salary in full, have held three revivals on the District, and one Camp off the District. In many ways this has been a strenuous year, and fraught with many perplexing problems, yet not with any worse battles with the enemy of our souls than any other year. We trust that our ministry has at least been accepted among our Brethren and we believe it has.
