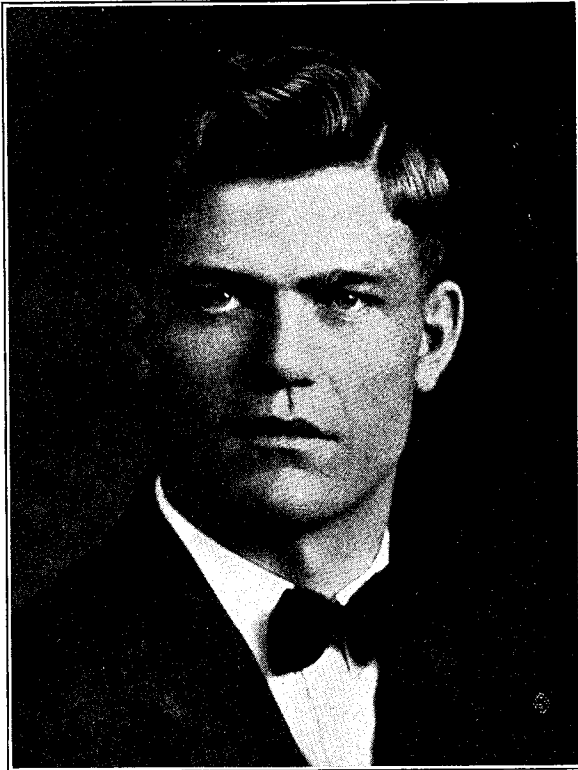

## JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Morning Session—Monday, August 27, 1928.

The Sixth Annual Assembly of the Illinois and Missouri District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, Monday morning, August 27, 1928 at 9:00 A. M. with General Superintendent, Rev. W. R. Cox in the chair.

Rev. O. C. Myers led the Assembly in singing, "In My Heart There Rings a Melody."

Bro. Cox read the fourth chapter of Acts and followed it with a stirring address to the Assembly.

Miss Myrtle Roush was elected to assist the Secretary.

The roll was called.

Moved and supported that the first four rows of seats constitute the conference bar. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the times of meeting shall be from 9:00 to 11:30 A. M., 1:30 to 4:30 P. M., and 7:00 to 9:30 P. M. Motion carried.

The reports from the Carlinville church were read and accepted.

The reports from the Casey church with the exception of the Pastor's report were read and accepted.

Moved and supported that the new churches at Joplin, Missouri; Caruthersville, Missouri; Peoria, Illinois be received into the Assembly. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the following be given seats in the conference bar as Advisory Members: Alvin Wright, William Kelley, Ruth Kelley, A. S. Rhodes, Gertrude Rhodes, L. W. Goddard, Owen Sprunger, and Millie Sprunger. Motion carried.

The reports from the following churches were read and accepted: Dogwood, Springfield, Dow, Jerseyville, Lawrenceville, Oblong, and Palestine.

Moved and supported that Rev. George Huff of Terre Haute, Indiana be received into the Assembly as an Advisory Member and that he make a speech. Motion carried and Bro. Huff gave his testimony.

The reports from the St. Louis church were read and accepted.

The District Superintendent made appointments to fill vacancies in the committees as follows: Examining Board, A. R. Higgs and T. G. Alldaffer; Ways and Means Committee, S. W. Maness; Statistical Committee, R. F. Bradley and A. S. Rhodes; Resolution Committee, Alma Shearer and Pearl Roush.

Moved and supported we adjourn. Motion carried.

Benediction by Bro. Catey.

Afternoon Session—Monday, August 27, 1928.

The session was opened by singing, "God Will Take Care of You."

Rev. C. Eskew led the Assembly in prayer.

The Chairman gave a splendid address on the subject of "Prayer."

The roll was called and the Minutes of the last session were read and approved after two corrections.

The Resolution Committee made a partial report. (See Resolution Committee's report.)

The Ways and Means Committee made a partial report. (See Ways and Means Committee's report.)

Moved and supported that all the rules and recommendations adopted by this Assembly remain in force until they are annulled by

this Assembly instead of for only one year. Motion carried.

District Superintendent, Rev. D. C. Shearer gave his report which was accepted.

The reports from the Peoria and Joplin churches were read and accepted.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Motion carried.

Benediction by Bro. Myers.

### Night Session—Monday, August 27, 1928.

The session was opened by singing the songs, "Wonderful Peace" and "I Lost the World."

Led in prayer by Rev. Eskew.

Bro. Cox gave an address on the subject, "Increasing and Advancing the Work of the Lord."

Moved and supported that we dispense with the roll call. Carried.

The Minutes of the last session were read and approved.

The final report of the Resolution Committee was read and adopted. (See Resolution Committee's report.)

The Ways and Means Committee gave a partial report which was adopted. A resolution regarding a Home Missionary was referred to the committee for redrafting. Three more recommendations were read and adopted. (See Ways and Means Committee's report.)

Moved and supported that the election of officers be the next in order. Motion carried.

The Assembly then bowed for a few moments of silent prayer.

While the blackboard was being arranged Bro. and Sister Beltz and Bro. Myers sang a special song.

The following officers were elected by ballot: District Superintendent, D. C. Shearer; Assistant District Superintendent, W. E. Catey; District Secretary, R. A. Beltz; District Treasurer, Geo. A. Smith; Additional Members of the District Council, Harold J. Kemp, O. C. Myers and C. C. Breen.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Motion carried.

Benediction by Sister Myers.

### Morning Session—Tuesday, August 28, 1928.

The session was opened by singing the song, "When They Ring the Golden Bells."

Prayer followed and several led in prayer.

Bro. Cox addressed the Assembly on the subject, "Financing the Local Church."

On motion the roll call was dispensed with.

The Minutes of the last session were read and approved.

The Ways and Means Committee read a recommendation regarding a District Home Missionary which was adopted. (See Ways and Means Committee's report.)

The Examining Board gave a partial report which was adopted. (See Examining Board's report.)

The reports of the Charleston church were read and accepted.

Moved and supported we adjourn. Motion carried.

### Afternoon Session—Tuesday, August 28, 1928.

The session was opened by singing the song, "He Abides."

Led in prayer by Sister Willis.

The Chairman addressed the Assembly on the subject, "Dealing With Trouble in the Church."

The Minutes of the last session were read and approved.

The Ways and Means Committee gave its final report which was adopted with the exception of a recommendation regarding the forming of classes for the Licensed Ministers who are taking the Course of Study. (See Ways and Means Committee's report.)

Moved and supported that the church and ministers' reports that have not been read be turned over at once to the Statistical Committee without being read to the Assembly. Motion carried.

An offering was taken to meet the \$115.97 owed the District Superintendent on his support for last year and it was raised in full in cash or pledges to be paid within thirty days.

A partial report of the Examining Board was read and accepted. (See Examining Board's report.)

Moved and supported that the debt of \$32 the Springfield church owes the District Home Mission Fund be cancelled. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the ordination service be held immediately following the preliminaries of the night session. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that we adjourn. Motion carried.

Benediction by Bro. Higgs.

### Night Session—Tuesday, August 28, 1928.

The session was opened with song and prayer. Special prayer was offered for the healing of Sister Medsker.

The Chairman addressed the Assembly and spoke favorably of the progress of the District Camp.

The Minutes of the last session were read and approved.

The Examining Board brought a recommendation regarding A. S. Rhodes which was adopted. (See Examining Board's report.)

The ordination service followed and Mrs. Fannie D. Higgs was ordained.

The Statistical Committee gave a partial report consisting of the Young People's Society, Pastor's, Sunday School, and Evangelists' and Unstationed Ministers' reports which was accepted.

Rev. W. R. Cox, the Chairman, had to leave and Rev. D. C. Shearer took the chair.

A letter was read from Brother and Sister Meeks, our missionaries in India. A motion prevailed that we accept this letter and now kneel in prayer in their behalf, also the Secretary be instructed to send them greetings. Bro. Catey led in prayer.

The final report of the Examining Board was read and adopted. (See Examining Board's report.)

Moved and supported that inasmuch as the custom of all our Ordained Ministers going before the Examining Board every year is not a rule of the Manual but a custom of this Assembly, be it resolved that this custom be dropped and only those who have charges preferred against them go before this board. Motion carried.

The Auditing Committee gave the following report which was accepted: "We, the Auditing Committee have examined the books of the District Treasurer and also the Campmeeting Treasurer and have found

them to be correct." Submitted by C. Eskew and W. O. Beard, Auditing Committee.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

Moved and supported that the \$8.75 in the District Tent fund be transferred to the District Home Missionary fund. Motion carried.

Inasmuch as Alvin and Myra Shaffer were not present for the previous ordination service and had been recommended by the Examining Board for Ordination a second Ordination service was held and they were duly ordained.

Moved and supported that we extend the time. Motion carried.

The Campmeeting Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The matter of a Ministerial Convention was brought before the Assembly. A motion prevailed that we have a Ministerial Convention. It was moved and supported and carried that the Convention begin at 1:00 P. M. on the first Tuesday in April. Moved and supported that the matter of securing help for the Convention be left to the District Council. Motion carried. The place of the Convention was next discussed and invitations were extended from the following churches: St. Louis, Springfield and Oblong. The vote was taken and St. Louis received a majority.

Moved and supported that the Subject Committee for the 1930 Ministerial Convention be appointed immediately by the District Council and that no person be placed on this committee who has served during the two previous years. Motion carried.

On motion the following matters were delegated to the District Council to be settled by them: The date of next Assembly, location of the tabernacle, and charging for meals at next Camp.

Bro. Higgs was excused but before leaving the Assembly rose and said, "God bless Brother and Sister Higgs."

Moved and supported that the matter of disposing of the East St. Louis property be delegated to the District Council. Carried.

### Report of Ways and Means Committee as Adopted by the Assembly.

1. We recommend that each pastor conduct a special prayer service for Foreign Missions once a month and that an offering for this work be taken at the close of each service, same to be sent to the District Treasurer.
2. We recommend that each pastor take an offering in his church or Sunday School at least once a month for District Home Missions.
3. We recommend that each pastor shall by April 1, 1929 raise and send to the Campmeeting Treasurer an amount equal to one dollar per member to help build the new Campground Tabernacle.
4. We recommend that each church be assessed an amount equal to one dollar per member, seventy-five per cent to be used for miscellaneous district expense and twenty-five per cent for the support of our General Superintendents, and that it be raised quarterly and sent to the District Treasurer.
5. We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid one thousand dollars and traveling expenses for his services this year.
6. We recommend that the District Superintendent visit each church twice during the year and that he devote the remainder of his time to evangelistic work.

7. We recommend that the remuneration which the District Superintendent shall receive for his evangelistic work be applied on his salary and that the District be given due credit for the same.

8. We recommend that each church raise for the District Superintendent's support as follows:

9. We recommend that the District Secretary be paid ten dollars for editing the Minutes.

10. We recommend that the District Secretary publish three hundred copies of the Minutes and send them to the pastors to be distributed among the members.

11. We recommend that all our preachers and people secure a copy of our Church Manual and the Minutes of this Assembly and that they read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all their provisions and requirements.

12. We recommend that our people do not send money direct to any of our General Church interests, but that they remit to their local Church Treasurer who shall send same to the District Treasurer, who shall then forward these amounts to the place for which they are intended.

13. We recommend that all the ministerial members of this Assembly, except the District Superintendent pay one tenth of their income form ministerial labor into their local church treasury and that the local Church Treasurer remit same to the District Treasurer for the support of the District Superintendent.

14. We recommend that the District Superintendent tithe his income from ministerial labor into the District Treasury for the support of the General Superintendents.

15. We recommend that each pastor urge his church to adopt the tithe system and insist that his members place their tithe in the local church treasury and that from this a stipulated amount be paid the pastor sufficient for his support, and that at the last quarterly meeting the church shall decide what support their pastor shall receive the following year.

16. We recommend that the District Council elect a District Home Missionary to devote at least one half of his time to the Home Missionary and Church Extension work of the District, that he be paid twenty dollars per week and traveling expenses when he is doing Home Missionary and Church Extension work, that the current expenses of said work be paid out of the Home Missionary funds, that he be diligent in taking offerings and otherwise raising funds which he shall turn into the Home Missionary treasury from which source all his remuneration for Home Missionary and Church Extension work shall come; and, furthermore if he shall need any assistance in any of the said work he shall be granted the privilege of securing the same and that said help

or helpers be paid out of the Home Missionary funds an amount agreed upon by the District Council for the time they are engaged.

17. We recommend that each pastor and evangelist be responsible for one comforter for Campmeeting purposes and that the name of the donor be inscribed.

18. We recommend that each church donate for Campmeeting purposes the following articles to be used in the kitchen and dining room: three knives, forks, and spoons; three plates, cups and saucers; one tray; three dish towels; three dessert dishes; one paring knife; one dish pan or skillet or large kettle.

19. We recommend that all ministers have their reports made out in full before the Assembly convenes.

20. We recommend that the District Secretary keep in touch with the pastors and remind them of the plans of this Assembly and encourage and help them to carry out said plans.

21. We recommend that all the officers, boards, and committees necessary to conduct the work of this District other than the District Council and the District Home Missionary be elected by the incoming District Council and that they shall hold office until the close of the next Annual Assembly.

22. We recommend that this Assembly require the ministerial members to attend Assembly and Campmeeting and that they be present on the first day and remain until the close, that the churches keep up the salary of their pastors while attending the same, and that if they do not attend they shall send a report of their work and an excuse for their absence, and furthermore if they fail to do so for two consecutive years their names shall be dropped from the Assembly roll.

23. We recommend that the District Secretary notify in writing all members of this Assembly who have failed to meet the requirements of recommendation number "twenty-two" calling their attention to such failure and to the penalty for the same at least thirty days before our next Assembly.

## REPORTS

### District Superintendent's Report

I beg to submit the following report of my labors as District Superintendent of the Illinois and Missouri District:

I might say in the beginning that while many trials have come our way this year, notwithstanding God has intervened and graciously delivered. For His blessings, deliverances, and manifestations of His presence we are thankful.

Some time was consumed soon after last Assembly in soliciting together with Brother Hall among the business men of Charleston money for this campground. Perhaps as much as three or four weeks was consumed in getting the permit from the Chamber of Commerce and getting the work done. I labored in a meeting at Hutchison, Kansas and also held a meeting at Humbolt, Kansas. I helped Bro. Catey about two weeks at Janesville, Illinois. I was in Peoria, Illinois ten days and organized a church there February 8, with fourteen charter members. I made two trips to Joplin, Missouri. The first time we organized February 19 with thirteen charter members. The second time we helped Brother Beltz, the pastor in a tent meeting. Also held a meeting at Randles, Missouri. I made a trip to Caruthersville, Missouri, where our General Superintendent, Brother Cox, had organized a church. There is an opportunity there for the right man. Considerable time of course was consumed in visiting the churches and holding quarterly meetings.

I have preached during the year 224 times. I have received \$1036.65. My expenses have been \$177.42. This leaves me for my support \$859.23. I am thankful for the splendid spirit of co-operation which has been manifested by the preachers and churches of the District. Plainly speaking we have no large churches on the District. The most of them are small and struggling. This condition causes a difficulty in obtaining sufficient Home Missionary funds to accomplish what we would like to see accomplished. But our territory is a Home Missionary field. We need more Home Missionary funds. There are of course some local vexing problems, however we have much to praise God for.

They brought conviction to the unsaved and unsanctified and a good number sought and found the Lord. Several of the District preachers preached at the morning services. General Superintendent, Rev. W. R. Cox, was with us the last three days of the Camp. He brought the closing message on Sunday night and there were a number of seekers. Rev. O. C. Myers of Charleston, Illinois, had charge of the singing and he did his part well.

The crowds were good. The people gave liberally in the offerings. All the expenses of the Camp were met and all the improvements made on the ground before the beginning of the Camp were paid for. The last Sunday afternoon there was \$600 raised in cash and pledges for a new tabernacle. Brother Catey, Assistant District Superintendent is going to saw the frame for the tabernacle from the timber on his farm and donate it. We expect to have a new tabernacle for next year. We believe that this will be a great Campmeeting in the near future. We are sure that all left feeling that we had had a splendid Camp and were glad they came. We want to praise God for the good Campmeeting and the beautiful spirit that prevailed.
