**CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS**

The Fourth Annual Conference of the Louisiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the District Campgrounds at Simms, Louisiana, July 8, 1952 at 10:00 A. M. The conference was opened with prayer and song, after which Rev. R. A. Beltz, Secretary of Church Extension, read a lesson from the 18th chapter of The Acts of the Apostles and brought us a stirring message from the problems that Paul found in the Corinthian Church and of the methods for solving them.

After the roll call of the ministers and delegates, the first four rows across the tabernacle were declared the conference bar.

Conference hours were set from 9:00 A. M. to 12:00 Noon and from 2:00 P. M. to 4:00 P. M.

The following ministers were introduced to the conference:

- Rev. Otho Jennings, Michigan
- Rev. Glenn Warren, Indiana
- Rev. J. E. Ab'l'a, West Virginia

After each was introduced, he gave his testimony to the conference and it was moved and seconded that they be received into our conference bar.

Superintendent Williams read his good report of his work on

the district. This report was accepted as read.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Statistical report was read and accepted.

The Youth Leader's report was read and accepted.

Motion was made to adjourn until 2:00 P. M.

The afternoon session convened at 2:00 P. M. The service was opened by singing, "Holiness Forevermore," after which Rev. Glenn Warren led the conference in prayer.

The report of the Examining Board was given. Sis. Nellie Ablu was recommended for Ordination. This report was accepted.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read and accepted. The previous recommendations of last conference were used except to amend the 5th recommendation and to delegate the 12th recommendation.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read and accepted. The third resolution of the previous conference committee was deleted and the subsequent resolutions were re-numbered accordingly until the 11th resolution. There was a new resolution made for the 12th resolution, an amendment was made for the 16th resolution and the 17th resolution was deleted.

The conference decided to combine the Education and the Examining Boards in the future and elected the committee members accordingly.

Rev. R. A. Beltz, Chairman of the Conference, asked Rev. J. E. Ablu to address the conference since he is to be the new District Superintendent. The theme of his exhortation was "Go Forward." At the close of his message, it was recommended that this exhortation be printed in the minutes of this conference.

A splendid report was given by the Women's Missionary Society President, which was commenced and accepted. A letter was read from our work in Mexico. This letter praised the liberality of the people on the home front. This liberality made their work possible.

The conference was adjourned until tomorrow's session.

The third sitting of this Conference convened at 9:00 A. M. Wednesday, July 9, 1952. The conference was opened by singing "Near the Cross," after which Rev. Lee Hollingsworth led in prayer. Rev. Beltz brought a splendid address on the subject, "His Windows Being Opened" from Daniel 6:10.

At this time the election of officers for the coming year was held. Sister Mabel Rathbun was elected as Missionary Vice President and Sister Nellie Ablu as Missionary Secretary for the district.

It was moved and ratified that the council for the district be empowered to take care of any unfinished business of the conference.

Rev. and Mrs. S. P. Creech, who are going into the Evangelistic Field, gave their farewell exhortations to the district.

Rev. J. C. Williams, who is resigning the work of District Superintendent to do Deputation Work for the Church Extension Office, gave

his farewell address.

All other business of this conference being completed, Rev. R. A. Beltz brought a wonderful Ordination Message. After this message, Sister Nellie Abla, our New District Superintendent's wife, was ordained.

Rev. J. E. Abla, District Superintendent dismissed the conference with prayer.

Conference was adjourned.

### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

We have survived and come through another year's activities for the Lord and the church. This survival has only been possible through the mercies of the Master, whose Presence has been very near and dear to my soul. The battles have been many and the victories great. I can truthfully say that this year has been one of the busiest of my ministry—most of our time has been devoted to the work of Evangelism and Deputational work for the Department of Church Extension.

I am pleased to report to this conference that the work of our Home Missions Church Extension is being regarded as one of the strong arms of the church. In general, the fine response to the Easter Offerings proved this fact and the many testimonies that we have heard from the lips of many preachers and laymen across our church further substantiate this statement.

There are some outstanding reasons for these past few years revelations of this fact. Our people are generally realizing as never before that we need to evangelize this country or fall under the influences of false creeds and doctrines of the devil.

The leadership, which we have at the head of our Department of Church Extension, Rev. Beltz, and the type of men that he has been able to acquire as well as the type of work that is being done by this department is responsible for this awakening. We have been building substantial structures and building spiritually as well as numerically and all of this is helping to build up a faith in our people for the work of home missions. We predict better days ahead for Rev. Beltz's work.

Today we stand in dire need of much prayer for as the work advances, the enemy will do his best to stall and even to stop some and all if it is possible. We see the need of much more prayer and better cooperation between the laymen and the leaders of the conference in Louisiana.

As we are to take our departure from this field, this year and another man comes on the field, we know that he will have the same loyalty and cooperation that we have had. For the past seven years we have labored with some of the finest men in our church. I predict a great future for the work here in Louisiana.

Some of our pastors have had to labor under large handicaps this past year. Brother and Sister Rimmer have had a lot of sickness and it looks like that they will be compelled to leave the south on this account. Rev. Grant at Lake Charles has been a sick man and he, too, will have to go back north.

Because of these changes to be made this year and the sickness on the district, the churches have suffered losses this past year. Let us be much in prayer for the coming year.

The church at Simms has shown a splendid gain and the pastor with his people have set us an example of what a little work can do. The reports will show what they have done.

The church at Pineville will show a gain in their Sunday School and also, we find that they have added new members to their role. We have a lively church at Pineville and we can look forward to better things there in the future. I understand that the Pineville church has a project on for the new year to re-model their church and this need is great.

The Rathbuns are on the march with their people at Oakdale and they show the largest increase in membership of any church in the district. They have taken in over twenty members this past year. They are reaching a lot of new people and their finances are increasing. May the Lord bless them in their work.

Rev. Grant and his fold are emerging with victory and will be able to show some gains there. This year, their Sunday School has increased. While they are heavily in debt, they have been able to meet all of their obligations so far. There are many problems attached to all of God's work these days and the new work is not exempted from them. While there has been many at Lake Charles, we can look for a bright future for the Pilgrims there. The Saunders from West Virginia District have been called as their pastor and we feel that under their leadership, the work will go right on.

The work at Baton Rouge showed a very good report this past year. Rev. and Mrs. Crews felt led to go back to school and, as they have been gone for some time, we have had to try and take care of this work along with our other duties.

Rev. and Sister McDonald and their fine people at Bogalusa have had a great year, with some gains in the church membership and Sunday School. For several years, this church has struggled under the handicap of the need of finances. The minutes will show you what they have been able to raise. This report is marvelous. We were not able to promise these people over \$10.00 weekly, but they went to work on the side to be able to run and maintain an automobile as they felt that this was necessary to help people to get to church. They, also, worked quite a bit on the remodeling of the outside of the church and it shows that they have been busy.

We have fields lying in wait for us to work—Monroe has been an open door for sometime, Alexandria affords us a grand opportunity, Winnfield is ripe for harvest and Sulphur is ready and would have been started this year, but for the lack of funds and my having to be away so much this year.

I want to say a word about our Missionary Societies. I think that we have an active group of missionaries on this district as we will find anywhere else. To this group of women will go a lot of the credit for promoting projects in the district. They have furnished money for both local and district as well as for foreign work. I think that they deserve much credit and a rising vote of appreciation in this conference.

Sister Rathbun, District Youth Leader, has had some very worthwhile meetings in the district and will give her report here or through the minutes.

At this point, I would like to give my own personal testimony and report:

I appreciate the fact that God has let me have the strength and health enough this year to be able to carry on most of my duties.

I have preached 202 times, traveled in the interest of the General Extension Department of the Church and for the district work 43,000 miles this past year and visited each church two times or more working on different projects on the district for three weeks.

I visited the Texas District for Rev. Beltz one time, organized one church in Texas, held 8 revivals and helped to solicit funds for the work of the district.

I have had personal dealings with over twenty people about their souls outside the church, dedicated over twenty persons to the Lord and some of them to the work of God, worked in two preacher's meetings, visited seven campmeetings and twenty-five churches in the interest of Church Extensions, have annointed five to be healed, made several house to house calls while in meetings, had had two conversions in the homes, had 102 seekers for regenerations or sanctification, held two council meetings, filed the pulpit in Baton Rouge, La. for 4 Sundays, preached one funeral and married one couple.

Now in leaving the district, we can truthfully say, "Thank God for the battles and victories." I have made mistakes—but then there have been many problems that only God could solve. These problems have made me a much stronger, better child of God. I appreciate the many kindnesses shown us by the laymen and ministers whom we have been privileged to work with here in the state of Louisiana. I request prayer from one and all of the good people that God will lead me every step of the way from here to Glory.

## WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

1. We recommend that all ordained and licensed ministers pay their ministerial tithe into the District Treasury.

2. We recommend that all birthday offerings be paid to the District Treasurer to be applied on the District Home Missions.

3. We recommend that each church pay five per cent of all regular tithes and offerings to the District Treasurer to be applied on the District Budget.

4. We recommend that the District Superintendent's traveling expenses while traveling in the interest of the District be paid at the rate of five cents a mile and also that the district correspondence and communications be paid by the District Treasurer.

5. We recommend that on each visit by the District Superintendent, each church take an offering on the Superintendent's expenses, but send the money to the District Treasurer.

6. We recommend that all monies be sent to the District Treasurer not later than the tenth of each month.

7. We recommend that all monies from the local churches destined to the General Treasurer be sent to the District Treasurer.

8. We recommend that each church pay the equivalent of \$1.00 per member per year to be applied on General Conference expense, the last payment to be made not later than May 1, 1954.

9. We recommend that there be a campmeeting registration fee of \$1.00 per person above the age of twelve years of age, to be applied on the expense of the camp.

10. We recommend that a campmeeting committee be elected by the council at conference and that said committee visit each church in the district once each year and raise an offering from each church to be used to promote the camp—said money to be sent to the District Treasurer to hold until called for by the camp committee.

11. We recommend that five per cent of the District Budget be paid to our Zone Bible School.

12. We recommend that the District continue in operation the Pilgrim Pension Plan: that each church pay into the District treasury monthly the sum of four per cent of its pastor's salary to be forwarded to the Board of Pensions. Be it further resolved that the four per cent of the evangelists' salaries be paid from the District Treasurer's funds providing the evangelists are paying their tithes into the District.

13. We recommend that when the council has passed on a time and place to begin a new church, a fee of \$1.00 be assessed each voting member of the District to be applied on the property.

14. We recommend that the District pay our District Superintendent \$75.00 monthly.

15. We recommend that all who have any books of the study course for licensed ministers or deaconess send a list of same to the District Secretary; that the District purchase the remaining needed books to complete the courses, that these books be placed with the District Secretary to be on loan to any who are taking the courses but who do not have the means to purchase same; and the care of the books or loss of same be chargeable to the borrower as well as the mailing charges both ways.



### RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

1. Resolved that the quarterly reports be mailed to the District Superintendent, and that the yearly reports be made in duplicate—one copy being mailed immediately to the District Statistician and the other to be brought by the delegate to the conference.

2. Resolved that each preacher and deaconess send a copy of his or her report to the District Statistician not later than ten days after the conference year closes, which is May 31; and that the statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved that the District Treasurer's books close at noon, June 10.

3. Resolved that each church give a pounding for the pastor the first prayermeeting of each month.

4. Resolved that the minister's license shall not be granted to anyone who does not tithe to the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

5. Resolved that the churches pay their pastors while they are attending camp and conference the same as if they were on their charge.

6. Resolved that there be an offering taken in the local church to defray the pastor's expense to and from camp—this offering to be taken by the District Superintendent at his annual meeting with the local church.

7. Resolved that the campmeeting begin on Wednesday night and continue until Friday night of the following week.

8. Resolved that all register who come to camp.

9. Resolved that every person attending the camp bring his own bed linens.

10. Resolved that since our conference is not large, it be conducted on Tuesday and Wednesday after the first Sunday of the camp.

11. Resolved that each pastor be given a vacation of two weeks each year with pay.

12. Resolved that all ministers pursuing the Course of Study take the examinations through the Pilgrim Bible College at Kearnersville, North Carolina.

13. Resolved that the Conference show our appreciation to our District Superintendent by a rising vote of thanks and a "God Bless You."

14. Resolved that we, the Louisiana District, are heartily in favor with the evangelicial program that the General Church made in regards to personal evangelism.

15. Resolved that we, as a conference, show our Secretary of Church Extension, Rev. R. A. Beltz, that we appreciate his presence with us, and that we pledge our utmost loyalty to him by a rising vote of thanks and a "God Bless You."

16. Resolved that by a standing vote, this conference express its appreciation to Rev. and Mrs. Otho Jennings, our camp evangelists and children's worker, and to our song leader, Julius Hooter.

17. Resolved that we as a conference show our appreciation to our District Secretary, District Treasurer, Statistician, District Sunday School Secretary, and District Young People's President by a rising vote of thanks.

Some of the projects for the past year were: making three quilts, aprons, pillow, crochet work, towels, potholders, dish towels and pillow cases to sell; sold canned goods; gave coffee parties; gave out clothing and shoes; baked and so'd cakes; made scrap books of missions fields; furnished the study course books, church furniture, church piano, hot water heater for damp and bath house for the camp; packed boxes for mission fields and Bible Schools and gave several Bible School showers for students, wedding showers and baby showers.

### ADDRESS TO CONFERENCE

Christian Friends of the Louisiana Conference in the Name of Christ I greet you:

After much prayer and waiting on God, I have tried to formulate a program which I trust is both reasonable, workable and acceptable to this conference. We must not allow ourselves to think in terms of our limitations but we must keep constantly be'ore us our glorious possibilities. Discouragement and despondency are the parents of failure. Battles may be our lot but they are only stepping stones to victory. I do not profess to have pre-solved the problems that are ours, but I firmly believe that we can meet each problem as it comes with the confidence that God will not fail us.

I would like to suggest the following as a program for this coming conference year:

1. Let us realize first of all that we are PILGRIMS. We are an intergal part of the finest church in existance. We should plan not only to make converts but, also, to make Pilgrims.
2. In the second place, we must place great stress upon the importance of the program of our church as a whole.
3. We should emphasize our Youth and Sunday School work. If we have a church tomorrow, we MUST have young people TODAY. Let us push Sunday School Rallies and Youth rallies throughout the District.
4. Our plans should include the Foreign Missionary Department of our church.
5. We should, also, hold in high esteem the work of our school at Kernersville.

6. Nearest to all of our hearts is the work of one of the strongest arms of our church, namely—that of the Church Extension. Let us give it a large place in our program.

7. Our aims for this conference year should be:

At least a 10% gain in Sunday School Attendance,

At least a 10% gain in membership exclusive of any new projects.

We should, also, plan one major home missionary project and if possible, two. This would mean a 25% gain in churches for the district.

Wherever possible our pastors and people should endeavor to start Sunday Schools and prayer meetings in adjoining towns and cities.

Let us stress the tithing plan as God's method of financing His work. It is important that we strive for and attain at the earliest time possible financial maturity so that our dependence upon the General Church for financial assistance becomes unnecessary.

In conclusion, let me say that we should strive to be void of self-interest and egotism—realizing that this is God's work and while we will have battles, we MUST not have defeat. Let us rise up and build—in the Name of Him who loved us and gave Himself for us. We shall triumph.
