The Third Annual Assembly of the Tennessee-Alabama District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at Cumberland Grove Camp Ground, Jamestown, Tennessee, August 3, 1936. District Superintendent Rev. R. 10. Be it resolved that each church furnish one quilt, sheet, pillow, set of knives, forks and spoons for Camp equipment.
11. Resolved that each pastor put the necessity of garden stuff for Camp Meeting before his people and that all members that possibly can, plant something in their individual gardens for the Camp Meeting menu next year. Those that cannot provide a garden should give a good, liberal offering.
12. Be it resolved that all monies of the local churches be sent in by the tenth of each month.
13. Whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, be it resolved that each local church appoint one or more prayer meeting nights each month, as the need may be, as donations nights.
14. Due to much laxity heretofore on the part of our pastors, be it resolved that all pastors be at the Camp and Assembly by the first Sunday, and that they remain until the closing service, unless excused by the Assembly, or in case of sickness. And furthermore that all pastors who disregard this resolution shall be assessed to the amount of \$5.00, same to be applied on Camp Meeting expenses.

15. Due to somewhat of a complication of keeping two sets of books, be it resolved that all monies be sent direct to the District Treasurer and not handed to the Superintendent. This includes preachers' tithes, budgets and missions. (Recommended by the District Superintendent.)
16. Be it resolved that we have a weekly prayer meeting for Home and Foreign Missions.
17. Resolved that no pastor's wife be elected to serve as a delegate to the Assembly where the church has a sufficient number of members to elect from.
18. Tabled.
19. Resolved that each pastor organize a Young People's Society where possible, and to encourage same. Furthermore, that they take Missionary offerings monthly at regular Young People's services.
20. Resolved that the District Superintendent confer with the local church board as to specified foodstuffs and the amounts to be exacted from each church for the Camp Meeting menu next year.
21. Be it resolved that the District Council be empowered to regulate the zoning of the District for each quarterly church regional meeting.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We, the Ways and Means Committee, recommend that each church pay the equivalent of 25 cents per member each month into the local church treasury, the same to be sent to the District Treasurer to be used for district interests.
2. We recommend that all stationed ministers and evangelists pay their tithes to the District Treasurer, same to be applied on the District Superintendent's support.
3. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid \$800.00 this year.
4. Recommended that the District Superintendent or his Assistant be paid two and one half cents per mile on traveling expenses for services rendered on the District to the Church, same to be pro-rated among the churches as follows: East Chattanooga, \$18.00; Chattanooga Main St., \$10.00; Clinton, \$19.00; Jamestown, \$39.00; McEwen, \$17.00; New Tazwell, \$9.00; Poplar Cove, \$8.00; LaFollette, \$2.00; York's Chapel, \$5.00; Coal Creek, \$8.00.
5. Resolved that birthday offerings be paid to the District Treasurer for tent fund.
6. Resolved that the District Superintendent, or one directed by the District Superintendent, shall hold at least one revival during the year in each church. We further recommend that the District Council be empowered to set the budget for each local church, said revival meeting to raise an amount in proportion to the strength of each said church, and that said amount be given credit in said budget.
7. Resolved that 10 per cent of District Budget be used to create a sinking fund for incidentals.

To the Third Annual District Assembly convened at Cumberland Grove Camp Ground, Tennessee-Alabama District, July 31st, 1936.

This, the Third Annual Camp and Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Tennessee-Alabama District, shows the hand of God on His own work through every department of the work, as well as on the Camp and Camp Ground equipment. We have had a blessed year of victory, though we have worked long and hard, but we can report victory. We have made substantial gains on all lines.

I have traveled 21,000 miles this year, and to my knowledge every mile has been for the glory of God. I have been ably assisted by our Assistant Superintendent for the most part of the entire year.
