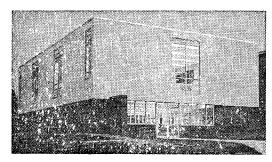

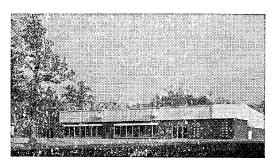

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### CONFERENCE MINUTES

#### MORNING SITTING

The Forty Third Annual Conference of the Virginia District, Pilgrim Holines Church, convened on the District Camp Grounds at Roanoke, Virginia at 9:00 A.M. on August 10, 1964. Rev. Byrd Puffenbarger led the group in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers", after which Dr. R. D. Gunsalas led in prayer.

Rev. W. A. Massey introduced Rev. J. D. Abbott, General Secretary-Treasurer, as the presiding chairman for the District Conference inasmuch as Dr. Snyder could not be present to preside, due to the fact that he had to preside at a conference in England, and the date of this conference could not be changed.

Rev. Abbott conveyed greetings to the District Conference from Dr. Snyder, who also sent an expression of his concern for the gathering here and his regrets for not being able to be present.

Rev. Abbott then spoke from the scriptures, I Tim. 1:11 and II Tim. 1:14, on being Trustees of the gospel. The gospel with which I have been intrusted. It becomes a part of our stewardship to each of us. He quoted, The gospel is God's greatest answer to man's greatest needs. It is the one answer to the problem of sin; the one answer to man's greatest sorrow that plagues the human family today. He said that it is almost a frightening thing that something so vital to the happiness of humanity should be entrusted to man.

"We are trustees for the truth. In Jude we read of the faith once delivered to the saints. What a trust! Some abuse this trust. Some betray it! There are those who misplace it. There are those who misinterpret it. Yet it is given to us and what we do with it is up to us. Of course we, in the end, will bear the consequences. May we in the Virginia Conference be known for the fact that we cherish the truth. Part of our responsibility is to uphold the integrety and authority of the Bible. This is our text book. It is the book by which our lives will be judged in the end. We should work for it's wide and universal circulation. To what book do we refer the most? It seems that to some it has become second place. As trustees of the truth we need to stand for the spiritual teaching of the significant and the soul saving truths that are found here in. Our ministry is a spiritual one and based upon the spiritual truths as found in the Bible.

We are charged as trustees that we shall uphold the integrety and the authority of the word of God. That we shall do all we can to propagate the truth and emphasize its spiritual tone that it may have full effect in the hearts of men and women for we are trustees of the truth. We should not give so much of our time to the other matters of the church that we have no time for the spiritual emphasis of the truth. God has given us the message for men! What shall we do with it?

We are trustees for our own age and time. It is said of David that he served his own generation by the will of God. The song writer said. To serve this present age, our calling to fulfill. We are to have a ministry to our own times. God wants us to live in this century. We should relate to our times the full effect of the gospel of Jesus Christ. We need to be aware of the spiritual conditions of our times. There must be a relatedness between what we profess as our faith and what is going on in our day; for these are days of urgent and crying needs of the people. We must have an awareness of the word of God and the need of the individual. There should be a language from the pulpit that can be applied to everyday life, on the job and elsewhere, under adverse conditions, where the people have to work under all kinds of temptations. We must be aware of the emergencies that arise and things to which our people are subjected. 'See then that we walk circumspectly,' that is, aware of what is going on around you.

We are trustees for the future. We must pass this great heritage on to the future generations undiminished and enlarged if at all possible to those who shall follow after us. How much effect will our generation have upon the diminishing of the truth? Will there be a deterioration of faith today because of our carelessness and indolence. Those who follow after us shall receive only what we pass on to them. David didn't build the temple but he had the privilege of passing on the material for his son to build. The stability of the foundation is entirely up to us.

We are trustees for our country and for our community. We have been in the background for too long. Christian people should have a controling interest in their communities. We should pray for the public affairs and those in public responsibility.

We are trustees for our children. What are we doing for them? Is the Church rising to the challenge? In our school system there is an increasing atmosphere which may be classed as materialistic and hostile to the Bible and christianity. As a church there must be strong prayers for our boys and girls. We need to revive our family altars; revive family discipline if we are going to serve as proper and effective trustees for our children. We are setting patterns for their future.

We are trustees for the saving of the lost — here and elsewhere.

What kind of trustees will we be? What effect will the gospel have upon the men and women that come under our influence according to the way we cherish it and live by it?

As we enter into this Conference may we bear in mind this truth! We are trustees of the gospel of Jesus Christ."

Following the completion of the Chairman's message to the Conference the roll call was completed by the secretary.

A motion prevailed to accept the transfers, to our district, of: Rev. David Kipfinger, Rev. R. W. Clark and Rev. Atwood Berry.

It was moved and carried to set the Conference Bar to include the first seven seats of the center and right section and the Platform.

By motion the time of the sittings of the Conference were declared to be the same as last year. Morning Sittings: 9:00 A.M. to 12:00, Afternoon Sittings: 1:30 P.M. to 4:00 P.M., Evening Sittings: 6:30 P.M. until closing.

The Reception Committee presented the Rev. R. A. Beltz and Dr. R. D. Gunsalas to the Conference, who were given a seat within the Conference Bar and asked to sit on the platform.

A motion prevailed to ask, Rev R. A. Beltz, to give his report after the report of the District Superintendent.

Report of the District Superintendent was then presented to the Conference and was received with gratitude and a standing vote of thanks for the fine and faithful labors of Rev. W. A. Massey.

The Assistant Superintendent then gave his report. The Conference accepted it with thanks to Rev. Byrd Puffenbarger for his work in this field.

Rev. R. A. Beltz gave his report on the Pilgrim Pension Plan and the Ministerial Burial Benefit Association. This was accepted by the Conference with appreciation for a program like this and the faithful manner in which Rev. Beltz has promoted it.

Report of the Auditing Committee was given by, Rev. J. A. Howard and was accepted by vote of the Conference.

A motion was passed by the Conference to wait until memographed copies of the Treasurer's report could be obtained before having this report.

Report of the District Sunday School Secretary was presented to the Conference. At this time the "Decade Of Progress" trophy ship was presented to Rev. Dale Reynolds, for the achievement of the Beulah Sunday School. (See S. S. Secretary report for other awards).

Report of the District Treasurer was given by Rev. Arlie Cook. A motion carried to accept it with appreciation. Also the Camp-meeting Treasurer report was read and accepted.

A motion was then made to extend the time of this sitting until 12:15. Carried.

Report of the District Missionary President was given by, Mrs. W. A. Massey. A motion prevailed to accept this report with sincere appreciation.

Report of the District Statiscian, C. A. Simmons was given and was accepted by motion, with appreciation.

Report of the President of the Southern Pilgrim College was read by the Secretary and was accepted by the Conference.

Report of the Pastors were then read.

Conference recessed at 12:15.

Rev. Abbott spoke congratulating the District for the gain in United Stewardship, and District Budget funds and also membership gain.

He also spoke concerning the value of the United Stewardship Fund along with other Budgets, to the General Church as well as the District program.

He also presented a poster portraying the plans for Stewardship Sunday. He gave an outlay of plans for this occasion, and urged the Pastors to take advantage of it to help raise the Budgets.

Reports of the Pastors were then continued. These reports were accepted by the Conference.

The Condolence Committee report was presented by, Mrs. Dale Reynolds. A motion prevailed to accept this report.

It was moved, and carried that the Conference recess for ten minutes.

Conference was called to order at 3:00 P.M. after the recess of ten minutes.

The Reception Committee then presented, Rev. and Mrs. A. E. Blann to the Conference. They were accepted with great appreciation for their labors in the Church in past years and also asked to give their testimony.

The Resolution Committee gave a report to the Conference. Resolution number three was deleted as it had served it purpose.

Resolution number one was accepted

Resolution number two was accepted as ammended

Resolution number three was referred back to the Committee for redrafting.

Resolution number four was accepted by the Conference

A motion prevailed to extend the time of this sitting until 4:30

Report of the Ways and Means Committee was then given by Rev. Arlie Cook.

Resolution number one (No. 3 in old Minutes, Page 31) was read and accepted as ammended.

Resolution number two (No. 5 under Dist. Council, page 31)

Resolution number three passed as ammended.

Resolution number 5 concerning Tabernacle passed as ammended after an extension of time to do so. The extension was for ten minutes.

This sitting recessed at 4:40 P. M.

#### THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the forty-third Conference was called to order at 6:30 P.M. by the Chairman, Rev. J. D. Abbott. Rev. Abbott spoke concerning the shortage of ministers and mentioned the fact that it now has become a great concern for our own Denomination, though it has affected others sooner than we have felt it

Resolution number 4 was accepted

Resolution number 6 carried

Resolution number 7 was accepted

Resolution number 8 carried

Report of the Examining and Education Board was read and accepted by the Conference.

Tellers appointed by Rev. Massey were: Atwood Berry, Charles Carroll, Robert Green, Eldon Hotle, Dale Reynolds, Paul Sherwood and Wayne Clark.

Rev. Howard was appointed to take care of the black board Though the District Superintendent was not to be voted on this year, the Conference did give a rising vote of thanks to him for services in the past and a pledge of cooperation in the future.

See Official Directory for officers elected.

Motion carried to have the District Council approve the Minutes of the last Conference Sitting

A rising vote of thanks was given to our Chairman, Rev. J. D. Abbott for the very capable manner in which he presided over the Conference.

A call was announced for each Pastor to give the number of District Minutes for his church.

Motions were carried to adopt the two resolutions presented by the Alcohol Education Council of which this District is a member. These resolutions have to do with liquor by the drink and stricter enforcement of the laws. Also a resolution urging the General Assembly to consider a Hospital for Alcoholics.

Rev. Abbott spoke briefly before the closing vote.

Motion carried that the Conference Adjourn, Adjourned at 9:10 P.M.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Christian greetings and a sincere welcome to our presiding officer and General Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. J. D. Abbott and the delegates and friends of the forty-third conference of the Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

In the providence and mercy of God we are privileged to gather here to do business for the Lord and the district we represent. Today we shall review the work of the past year, and lay plans for the future. The reports will indicate both our accomp-

lishments and our weaknesses. For every soul won to Christ and for every step of progress that has been taken, we are grateful to God. Such should be a source of inspiration for future advancement. On the other hand, honesty and courage are required to face our failures squarely, and then, to change them into victories. May the Spirit of God so direct in our deliberations and planning that we may go from this conference with renewed faith and determined effort to accomplish Christ's mission for us as a district.

During the past year we have suffered the loss of one of our district ministers, Rev. Edward Bayse. He is missed by the church of which he was a member and at the district gatherings. He was devoted to the Lord and had a keen interest in the work of the church. His Godly influence continues to live among his family and those associated with him.

#### STATISTICAL AND FINANCIAL STATUS

I regret to report that we have shown a small loss in church membership. Many of the churches showed a loss while others showed some gain. The churches leading in net gains are Hopewell with an increase of 15, Newport News 6, and Christiansburg 4. There are others that made smaller gains. Some of our churches have been making adjustments in the membership rolls, yet our lack of gains should be a matter of concern to all of us. The Sunday Schools have shown a very small increase.

The Resolutions Committee will be presenting some goals to this Conference for us to work toward for the coming year. I urge that all the pastors and churches cooperate by striving to realize the proposed gains.

The Treasurer's report will indicate a good year in district finances. The amount of District Budget paid exceeds any previous years. We fell far short on the United Stewardship Fund. However, this is the best year since 1960 with 61.4 per cent paid as compared with 54.2 per cent last year. It is hoped that substantial progress may be made in both the General Church and District finances the coming year. Good increase can be realized if all pastors and churches will assume their obligation to the full program. It is recognized that the pastor must take the lead in promoting and urging wholehearted support. With united, cooperative effort we can do much better. Ten churches paid the United Stewardship Fund, District Budget, and Pastor's tithe 100 percent and are worthy of honorable mention. They are: Beulah, Danville, Newport News, Norfolk, Remlik, Richmond First, Roanoke, Salem, Staunton, and Warwick.

#### PROPERTY GAINS AND IMPROVEMENTS

Since the churches are afforded the opportunity of reporting through the "Virginia Pilgrim" I shall not take the time or space for a detailed report, but will report the major gains. The old church property of the Newport News Church has been sold and a new church building is now under construction at the new location in Hampton. Warwick plans to begin construction of the first unit of the new church in a few days. Beulah has under construction a four room Sunday School addition and the installation of a new heating system for the entire church plant. Wavnesboro plans to soon begin construction of eight new Sunday School rooms and the installation of a new heating system for both the present building and the new addition. Richmond Emmanuel has been enjoying for some months the four new Sunday School rooms reported under construction last conference. The Roanoke Church has acquired beautiful lots in an excellent location for a new church building and a parsonage. The lots are valued at approximately \$25,000.00. A new unit has been added on the District Camp Dining Hall building and some painting done in both buildings.

#### YOUTH CAMP

The Youth Camp proved to be one of the best in the district with 132 young people in attendance. Many of them sought and found help at the altar of prayer. Our District Youth President, Rev. D. L. Reynolds, the Youth Council and staff of workers, are to be commended for a job well done. Increased facilities on the Camp Ground have become a necessity if we are to continue a growing youth camp.

#### HOME MISSIONS

The work at Warwick is coming along nicely. The pastor, Rev. B. L. Puffenbarger, has done an efficient job not only in giving spiritual leadership, but in directing the church in the business affairs that have made possible the securing of a construction loan. The church has set a noble example of denominational interest in that all budgets for the past conference year were paid in full. With the early prospect of the new building I predict a bright future for this Church.

Under the leadership of Rev. J. A. Howard, a new work was started in Petersburg in April of this year. The reports of attendance to date have been encouraging. It is hoped that a permanent location may be found and that this work may develop into a Pilgrim Holiness Church.

We should by all means open at least one new work a year. However, this can be realized only as individual churches or groups of churches will sponsor new works. The District Home Missionary funds are inadaquate to make possible a new church each year. Much more could be accomplished if our established churches would catch the vision and open a branch Sunday School or a new preaching point.

#### OUTLOOK

The past is reviewed with gratitude to God for all past victories, but also with a recognition that we are doing too little. I say this with no thought of censoring anyone, for I share this responsibility with you. However, I repeat we are doing too little in the light of the great need of our day. We are told there are 70 million unchurched people in the United States. Thirty million of the churched only attend now and then. Of the 314,000 churches and synagogues in this country only 20 per cent could be considered evangelical. In addition to this, the population of our country is increasing at the rate of five million a year. The population is increasing much more rapidly than church membership. Some of these unchurched, and many unsaved church members, are to be found in every community. We cannot evade the fact that we are responsible to do our utmost to reach as many of these as possible for Christ and the church. In the light of the great need we should follow the exhortation of Christ to, "Pray ve therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest."

The above stated facts, plus the moral break-down and lawlessness within our country, and the rapid spread of Atheistic Materialism throughout the world are sufficient cause for alarm. The world needs the Gospel. We must stir ourselves to our very best effort to get it to them. In our various gatherings we have spent time discussing means and methods of reaching new people, but all of our discussions are to no avail unless we give ourselves to the task of applying these methods. We readily acknowledge the necessity of hard work if success is to be realized in other fields of service. The church is no exception. There is no substitute for hard work by ministers and laymen alike. I trust and pray we may go from this conference with a stronger determination then ever to pray and work for the salvation of the lost. There are many things we cannot do, but all can pray and work. William Carey, the noted missionary to India once said to his son. "If they say I am a genius, it is not true, but if they say I can plod, that is true. Yes, I can plod, I can plod." Let it be said of us that we can plod, for it takes no less than this if we are to do the job.

It is with a feeling of gratitude for the measure of success over the past few years that I present this report. May I take this opportunity to say thank you to all who have helped to make the work of the S. P. C. a success.

It is most gratifying to look about our campus and see the physical plant that God has made possible. How can we doubt that Southern Pilgrim College is not a vine of His own planting? May God help each one of us to see the potential that is wrapped up in our school as we continue to train the young people of our denomination and other like faiths.

Last conference we can well remember that we were just beginning the construction of our Science Building. Today it is a reality. We feel that we have a most functional building with the best of laboratory furnishings. In the future we are anticipating purchasing other science equipment to help in the instructions of our science program.

#### DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENTS REPORT

Jesus has tarried and in His providence has allowed us to meet in this business meeting again. The labors and services of the past year are now history, and I trust it is an encouragement as we realize that as Christ said to the Churches in The Book of Revelation, "I know thy labor". We are here to hear reports of these labors and make plans for future service. May the spirit of God direct our planning.

It has been a privilege to labor with our Youth Council, District officials and other Youth Leaders throughout the District. Your cooperation has been sincerely appreciated.

#### ZONES

Your decision last year to revise the Zone boundaries has proven to have been a wise one. The attendance and interest was definitely increased in each Zone. Two Zones suffered some setback after a good beginning, but we trust they will be able to make a new start and continue in the new year. I was able to visit six of the Zones this year in interest of the youth work. Five of the Zones have held nine rallies, one for each month of the school year, as stipulated by the Youth Conference. This is a real improvement over previous year, but let us strive for this in each Zone during the coming year.

#### YOUTH CAMP

We had an overflow attendance again this year in Youth Camp, with 132 registered Campers plus workers. The increase that we are experiencing in our Youth Camp is indicative of the trend to Christian Camping throughout Christian circles. If we as Virginia Pilgrims fail to keep stride in this field of Christian service we will do our youth and Church a great injustice. A resolution will be presented to this conference for two youth Camps in the coming years, which I feel will be a step in the right direction.

My deep appreciation goes to each member of the staff who cooperated so well during the Camp. The young people seemed exceptionally well behaved and problems were kept at a mini1 mum.

#### NATIONAL YOUTH CONVENTION

Our National Youth Convention had to be postponed from its regular planned date of June 1964 to June 23-27, 1965. It will be held at Anderson College, Anderson, Indiana. We hope a number of our Youth will be able to attend this grand meeting of the Youth of our Church.

The Bible Quiz, which will have its final's in The Youth Convention, did not seem to find much support in our District. One Team, however, from Salem, is working on the Quiz and we trust will be competing in the Contest this summer. We hope they win.

#### C. Y. C.

A new program is being introduced this year in Our Church called, C.Y.C. ("Christian Youth Crusaders" program). It is for ages 6-14. C.Y.C. is Based on the national Scouting program and it has been successfully used by other Holiness Churches. A Director will be designated by the Conference to launch and promote this in our District. We trust each church will soon have a CYC Program.

#### LOCAL YOUTH SOCIETIES

We are glad to report a net gain of 18 in membership in our Youth Societies and a net gain of 26 in attendance. The gains are not large but at least they are in the right direction. One alarming thing, however, in our statisticial report is that out of 29 Churches, 14 youth societies either failed to report or there is no active Society in the Church. Some Churches due to the lack of any young people can not have a Youth Society, but others if

proper effort was put forth, could have a Youth group. Let me urge each Pastor to try to have a Society in your Church if at all possible. If we can be of any assistance in helping you to organize a Youth group, we will be glad to do what we can.

#### GOALS

- 1. Two Youth Camps next year with 75 in each Camp.
- 2. Each organized Society to become a Chartered Society.
- 3. A CYC Program in each Church.

For example: Let each of us at this conference think of the many unsaved people of our Sunday schools who do not attend the preaching services, and the only interests that they have in our churches are the activities of the Sunday school hour. May God help us to reach these people through the Sunday school and may we always have an evangelistic emphasis.

For our report I have three divisions: statistical reports, personal reports and future plans.

I am happy to report to you that our district reversed the trend of last year and showed a gain in attendance for this conference year. As we examine the records we find a larger number of our Sunday schools showing gains. There were 13 schools showing a gain, 13 showing a loss and 2 remaining the same. Not included in the above is a new Sunday school at Petersburg, Va., that had an average of 21 for the last two and a half months of the conference year. We congratulate Rev. Howard and his fine group at Petersburg for such excellent progress since April 19th. We are praying that the future will be filled with many successes for this new school.

There are several outstanding Sunday schools that have had good numerical and percentage gains. They are as follows:

Doran has the honor of being the largest Sunday school in the district with an average of 139 attendance. For three years Doran has shown excellent gains and now has the number one rating. Martinsville has the honor of having the largest numerical gain. Beulah and Preston are tied for largest percentage gains.

Ten of our schools are now participating in the "Standard of Excellence" and the same number in the "Decade of Progress." The beautiful ship trophy will be awarded this year to the Beulah church with 15,960 points. This is the highest yearly accumulation of points that any of the Virginia Sunday schools have had since this program began four years ago. We would like to see all of our Sunday schools participating in this program in the coming year.

#### PERSONAL

I have endeavored to promote the Sunday school of our district through a monthly report and have tried to augment on a district level the "Citizens for Sunday school" contest that is being sponsored by the General Sunday School Department. The

"Citizens for Sunday School" contest is an excellent program for promotion of attendance with individuals pledging to enroll 4 in '64, 5 in '65 and 6 in '66. To date there are 15 churches listing "Citizens" for Sunday School' totaling 143 in the Virginia district. Eight churches have "citizens' who have been successful in reaching their goal of 4 in '64. The district winner for "Citizen of the Year" is Mr. Samuel Massey, Jr. of the Beulah church who enrolled 12 persons since the program began last September. Mr. Frank Reese from the Staunton church is 2nd with 9 enrolled by his invitation.

#### Looking Toward The Future

There are four things more that I would like every Sunday school superintendent and pastor to consider when planning for the coming year.

- 1st Plans are being laid for district Sunday school area meetings. The workers are to be Rev. and Mrs. Mark Bowman of Denton, Md. The tentative dates are Oct. 20-23rd.
- 2nd The Fall Enlargement Campaign entitled "Vote Sunday School". The Pastors and Superintendents have already received these fine promotional materials. Let's use them!
- 3rd "The Christian Youth Crusaders" program. (or CYC) Here is a program designed for Pilgrim youth that is simular to scouting but ties our young people very definitely into the Pilgrim Holiness Church. There are three groups listed in the directors manual: The Heralds, The Cadets, and The Crusaders.
- 4th The Pilgrim Evangelical Leadership Training (or P.E.L.T.)
  Here are accredited courses of study in the Bible and Christian education to provide leaders in the local church. Certificates are awarded at completion of a Preliminary Teachers Course and also an Advanced Teachers Courst.

In closing I wish to thank each pastor and Sunday school worker for the wonderful cooperation they have given me this year. Let each of us make our Sunday school a matter of first concern so that we shall see real revivals and victorious accomplishments this coming year, God being our helper!

#### DISTRICT RESOLUTIONS

#### YOUTH

- 1. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two of its members to serve with the Youth Council in planning the date and place of the Youth Camp and other related activities. This Committee to meet at least twice a year.
- 2. Be it resolved that the Youth Zone Chairman plan a rally each month during the school year and be it further resolved that the Zone Chairman shall co-ordinate all Zone Rallies and that the Youth President of the District be informed of said rallies and, if possible, be present at the first Zone rally during the Conference year. At this rally an offering shall be taken to help defray the travel expense of the District Youth President.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOLS

- 1. Be it resolved that Sunday School enrollment for each school be corrected at the beginning of each calendar quarter. Names shall not be dropped from the roll unless they were absent at least four Sundays of the quarter, sickness excepted.
- 2. Be it resolved that Sunday School Workers meetings be held in strategic locations over the District so as to accommodate groups of Churches.

#### DISTRICT CAMP

- 1. Be it resolved that we have a District Camp Committee. The District Superintendent shall serve as Chairman. Other members of the Committee shall be chairmen of the following sub-committees: Advertising, Finance, Tabernacle and Dining Room.
- 2. Be it resolved that a set of rules be drawn up by the District Council governing the dormitory and camp grounds. Said rules shall be posted in conspicuous places. Further that the District Council shall appoint two men to serve as policemen to enforce these rules.
- 4. The District Camp Committee met July 19, 1964, in the afternoon at the Staunton Pilgrim Holiness Church, with two members present. After discussion the following resolutions were made relative to the building of cottages on the camp grounds:
- a. Resolved that all cottages shall be constructed of cinder block with concrete floors and asphalt composition roof. Single cottages should be  $24' \times 22'$  and double cottages should be  $32' \times 22'$ . Each owner shall have the privilege of finishing the inside as he chooses.
- b. As long as the grounds are keep clean, electric costs paid and everything conducted properly, owners of cottages may use them at times other than during camp period.

- c. The District shall charge a fee of \$30.00 to lease space for a single cottage and \$50.00 for a double cottage space. Futhermore, any transfer of ownership of cottages may be done only after District Council and Camp Board approval.
- d. A fee of \$2.00 shall be charged for a cottage for the period of the annual Camp to cover cost of lights and ironing privileges. Cottages with additional appliances such as electric refrigerators, ets., shall be charged \$6.00 for the same period.
- e. The workmanship of each cottage must meet the standards establishe by the Camp Committee. A contract of regulations is to be drawn up between each cottage owner and the Camp Committee.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- 1. Be it resolved that whenever there is a change in the office of the District Superintendent, the District Council shall endeavor to place the retiring Superintendent in a satisfactory pastorate, if he so desires.
- 2. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to inform each church board whose deeds are not filed correctly according to the Manual to make such necessary changes within the Conference year. In the future it is further resolved that copies of deeds of all newly acquired properties be filed with the District Superintendent.
- 3. Be it resolved that a report on the amount of insurance carried on various properties in the District be filed with the District Superintendent.
- 4. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a home Missionary Committee of two members to serve along with him in formulating the District Home Missionary program.
- 5. The District Superintendent shall be granted a two weeks vacation with pay.

#### ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Be it resolved that as far as possible all appointments of Committees be made so that all committees can meet simultaneously. Further, that all committees shall meet at the call of the chairman and have their business ready for presentation at the opening session of the Annual Conference.

#### LOCAL PASTORS

1. Be it resolved that each pastor support the District Camp with his presence and that he strongly urge his people to attend and support the camp. Local churches shall provide the regular support of the Pastors while they are in attendance at camp.

- 2. Be it resolved that each pastor strive to bring the total Advocate subscription to the total number of families represented within his Church and Sunday School membership.
- 3 Be it resolved that all pastors within the radius of one hundred miles of the camp grounds be required to come on a date set by the District Council prior to the Youth Camp and regular Camp to make preparations and clean the buildings and grounds. If those who are supposed to come cannot be present, they shall send a fee of \$10.00 to secure local help. At the close of the District Camp the same shall apply to those living over one hundred miles from the Camp Grounds.
- 4. Whereas no standard procedure has been established by the General Church to determine what shall constitute a pastoral call; Therefore, be resolved that the Virginia District shall establish the following as it's procedure for reporting pastoral calls. Each personal call to the home or hospital shall constitute a pastoral call. Futher, that each person called on shall be counted as one call. (Example—if a father and mother with three children are visited by the pastor and only the father and mother are church members the pastor shall report it as two pastoral calls on members and three pastoral calls on non-members. Futher that a call at a home where no one is home shall be counted as one call.

#### LOCAL CHURCHES

- 1. Be it resolved that each local Church in the Conference shal provide the utilities for the parsonage. The Conference shall provide the utilities for the District Superintendent.
- 2. Be it resolved that each local Church Treasurer furnish a monthly financial report for the Church bulletin board, covering all receipts and disbursements. The local church board shall then endeavor to make the necessary adjustments to bring up the financial obligations to both the District and General Church.
- 3. Whereas we as a District have not realized the desired gains in the various departments of our local churches; Therefore, be it resolved that we as a Conference strive this year to obtain the following goals.
  - a. That a prayer and fasting league be organized in each church to pray for the Pilgrim Holiness Church—General, District and Local.
  - b. To realize a five per-cent net gain in Church membership.
  - c. To realize a five percent gain in the Sunday School Department.
  - d. To pay the United Stewardship Fund, District Budget, Pastor's tithe in full and encourage the support of the Penny-a-meal offering for District Home Missions.

4. To better acquaint new members received into the Pilgrim Holiness Church; resolve that each church give one year's Subscription of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and a copy of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual to said members home.

#### JOURNAL MINUTES

- 1. Be it resolved that the report of receipts and expenditures for the District Camp be prepared and placed in the District Minutes of the following year.
- 2. Be it resolved that the Editing Committe classify all resolutions appearing in the Conference Journal under appropriate headings, such as Youth, Annual Resolutions, etc.

#### DISTRICT AND GENERAL CHURCH

1. Whereas the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of Pilgrim Holiness Church Districts:

Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of the District that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials, be, and they are authorized to do and perform all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans of local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this District, subject however, to the limitations set forth in said resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

- 2. Be it resolved that the Virginia District assume its proportionate part of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Advancement Program as outlined by the recent General Conference. The goals for our District are: One new Church organized each year for the next four years with the overall 7% increase in Church membership.
- 3. Be it resolved that a permanent date be set for the District Ministerial Convention with the District Council making arrangements for the program and the workers.

#### WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS

#### DISTRICT COUNCIL

1. Each representative and pastor of each church who comes up to the end of the conference year without budgets paid in full, shall meet with the District Council, prior to the Conference and give an explanation for its failure to meet such committments. (Budgets shall include, District, General Stewardship and Ministerial tithe.)

- 2. Paragraphs 2 and 3 of section 149 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be brought to the attention of the local church boards and treasurers by the pastors. The provision of the Manual relative to specified giving shall be adhered to and a sound financial plan be worked out for the raising of budget quotas.
- 3. Four hundred feet across the front of the Camp Grounds be sold at a price of approximate one hundred dollars per front foot. The proceeds from this sale would be used to pay off the indebtness on the Camp Ground and provide much needed facilities.

#### LOCAL CHURCHES

- 1. Each local treasurer shall forward to the District Treasurer all offerings for general and district funds and the pastor's tithe, by the last day of each month and that a receipt for same be sent to the sender immediately. All general church funds shall be sent to the General Treasurer by the last day of each month.
- 2. The local treasurer shall withold the tithe of the pastor's salary and shall send this to the District Treasurer each month along with other district and general funds.
- 3. Our churches shall be advised of the General Board Resolution of May 12, 1960 relative to a recommendation that each church pay the assessment fees for pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the District cover fees for the District Superintendent and his wife.
- 4. Where churches have no adequate method of raising District and General Funds the dime book system shall be used.
- 5. Travel expenses of the District Superintendent on his visits to the churches shall be raised as follows: Churches with less than 40 members shall pay eight dollars per visit and churches with over 40 members shall pay twelve dollars.
- 6. Each local church shall pay the Conference fee of \$4.00 per Ministerial delegate; the church shall pay the fee for the unstationed ministers who are members and present at the Conference.
- 7. Each church shall contribute 10% of the regular offerings of the Church and Sunday School to be sent to the District Treasurer each month for district obligations. Each church shall raise its United Stewardship Fund of \$8.00 per member by the method best suited. General monies shall be sent to the District Treasurer on a monthly basis.
- 8. We recommend that each church pay their pastor's hospitalization insurance if at all possible, unless a working pastor has insurance through the company where he is working.
- 9. We recommend that each pastor present pledge cards to his congregation along with a sketch, specifications and approximate cost of Tabernacle as outlined by the District Council.

- 10. Whereas, the need of a District Parsonage is evident and an effort to build one has been hindered by lack of funds, be it resolved that at least \$500.00 of the Superintendent Fund be set aside each year, if possible until sufficient money is accumulated to make a substancial down payment. The balance could be handled by the rental allowance.
- 11. We recommend that each church send \$5.00 to the District Treasurer to support Alcohol Education Council, by February 15th.
- 12. Whereas our United Stewardship Fund is prorated to a Home Missionary Church in the following manner:  $\frac{1}{4}$  the first year,  $\frac{1}{2}$  the second year and  $\frac{3}{4}$  the third year, full responsibility the fourth year, therefore be it resolved that our district budget of 10% be prorated in the following manner:
- 2% the first year; 4% the second year; 6% the third year and the full 10% the fourth year.

#### YOUTH

1. Each Youth Society shall send \$1.00 per month to the District Youth Treasurer and each church or organized Society send a free-will offering to the District Y. P. Treasurer. This sum shall be used for operational expenses, and any balance shall be reserved for the next District Youth Camp. The District Treasurer shall send quarterly notices of the assessments to the Youth Society Presidents which shall be read in a regular Young People's Society meeting.

#### DISTRICT

1. The District Conference shall pay the following amounts to the respective district officers:

District Statistician	\$	45.00
District Treasurer	\$2	25.00
District Secretary	\$1	25.00
District Sunday School Promotional Secretary	\$	50.00
District Youth President	\$	50.00

- 2. The District Council is authorized to rent the District Parsonage with the provision that the premises be vacated during Youth and Regular Camps. The proceeds from this rental shall go into the regular treasury to help defray expenses.
  - 3. Each of the following shall apply to the respective groups:
- a. Each pastor and local church board shall raise an offering on the First Sunday of May for the iDstrict Camp Meeting Expenses and forward the same to the District Treasurer. If this free-will offering does not amount to \$1.00 per member, the needed amount to make the difference is to be taken from the Church Treasurery.

- b. The engaged singers for the District Camp Meeting shall be paid a sum not to exceed that paid the Evangelist. This sum shall be reserved to pay the singers whether the party consists of one, two or more workers.
- c. The assessment of ten dollars for all ministers with the salary of \$40.00 or les per week and \$15.00 for those ministers whose salaries exceed \$40.00 per week and these amounts be placed in the Camp Expense Fund.
- 4. The District Council is authorized to work with any local church in securing loans using the financial standings of the Conference as reflected in the property statements of the Journal, the combined Conference equity and the current District Treasurer Balance Sheet, as the basis of negotiation for such loans
- 5. The Home Missionary (Church Extension) Calendars shall be used by our churches as the method of raising funds for District Church Extension.
- 6. All official travel in District shall present it's pastor with a donation of food etc., at least monthly.
- 8. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at ninety dollars per week, with the addition of utilities, gas, lights, phone and fuel .The District shall pay his remittance to the Pilgrim Pension Fund and his hospitalization Insurance. Official travel shall be covered by district funds at the rate of seven cents per mile, plus meals, lodgings and road talls.
- 9. A determined effort shall be made throughout the District to secure one hundred or more friends who will pledge ten dollars per year as a supplimentary fund for the District Camp Meeting expense.
- 10. The District Superintendent shall be paid the equivalent of one weeks salary as a Christmas gift.

## DISTRICT YOUTH CONFERENCE REPORT

The Youth Conference of the Virginia District convened on August 8,1964 at approximately 1:30 P.M.

After the conference was opened by Rev. Dale Reynolds, the group was led by Rev. R. W. Clark in the singing of the song, "This Is My Story": Rev. Atwood Berry led in prayer.

The conference was then turned over to Rev. Byrd Puffenbar,-ger, who presided in the absence of the district suprintendent.

The minutes of the previous annual conference were approved as read.

The roll call was then taken.

A motion was made, seconded and carried that pastors be authorized to appoint a delegate or additional delegates from eligible youth members to take part in this annual conference.

By motion, seconded, and carried it was established that the first seven rows of seats on the right would constitute the conference bar.

Mr. Alfred Hurlburt was appointed by the chairman as sergeant-at-arms.

Reports were then heard.

Rev Dale Reynolds gave a fine report which was approved as read.

Rev. Charles Carroll's report was approved as given.

Due to the absence of the district treasurer, the financial report was read by Rev. Robert Clough and approved as read.

The youth camp financial report was given by Rev. Eldon Hotle and was approved as read.

Reports of seven of the eight zones were next given, mostly by the zone chairmen.

Reports of ten of our youth societies were given, mostly by the local youth presidents.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the reports of the zone chairmen and youth presidents be received with appreciation and thanks.

Rev. Eldon Hotle reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1 It died for lack of a motion to bring it before the conference for discussion.

Resolution No. 2 "Whereas, there seems to be some dissatisfaction concerning the present point system in attendance at zone rallies, therefore, be it recommended that an extra point be given each one attending the zone rally, age 13-35." This was recommended by the committee. It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt.

Resolution No. 3 "Whereas, the youth camp has outgrown our present facilities: therefore, be it resolved that we have two separate youth camps in the future-ages 9-12 and 13 through teens; Further, that the district youth council schedule the dates for said camps."

This was recommended by the committee. It was moved, seconded, and carried to adopt.

Resolution No. 4 "Whereas, in the event of a change in the local youth president, therefore, be it resolved that the outgoing youth president prepare a yearly written report for the incoming president to give at the district youth conference." This was recommended by the committee. It was moved, seconded, and carried to adopt.

Rv. Paul Sherwood reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1 "Be it resolved that the district youth president be paid \$50.00 expense to attend the National Youth Convention at Anderson, Indiana June 23-27, 1965." This was recommended by the committee, and there was a motion, which was seconded, to adopt. The resolution was amended as follows: The phrase '\$50.00 expense to attend the National Youth Convetnion' was struck out and this clause 'all expenses to attend the National Youth Convention' was adopted. The resolution as amended was adopted.

Resolution No. 2 "Whereas, it has been the policy that after all zone expenses have been paid, the balance remaining in the zone treasury be forwarded to the district youth treasurer, therefore, be it resolved that this be a standing rule." This was moved and seconded to adopt. It was moved and seconded to amend as follows: "Be it resolved that after all zone expenses have been paid, 50% of balance remaining in the zone treasury be retained by zone and 50% of balance to be forwarded to district youth treasurer, and be it further resolved that this be a standing rule." The amendment was adopted, and the resolution as amended was adopted.

Next, the election of officers took place.

The district youth president, at the request of the chairman, appointed the following as tellers: Mr. Alfred Nurlburt, Mr. Jerry Miller, Mr. Nelson Puffenbarger, and Mr. Bobby Simmons.

Rev. Dale Reynolds was re-elected as district youth president for a two-year term on the first ballot, receiving 31 out of 43 ballots cast.

Rev. R. W. Clark was elected as district youth vice-president on the second ballot, receiving 22 out of 43 ballots cast.

Rev. Robert Clough was re-elected as district youth secretary on the first ballot, receiving 24 out of 39 ballots cast.

Rev. Paul Sherwood was elected as district youth treasurer on the first ballot, receiving 32 out of 44 ballots cast.

The election of zone chairmen next took place.

It was moved, seconded and carried that there be three sets of tellers to count ballots secretly, in order to save time. Revs. Green and Simmons were appointed by Rev. Reynolds as additional tellers.
