Conference Proceedings

FIRST SESSION

The Second Annual Conference of the Florida Home Missionary District opened in the Morrison Memorial Church, Intercession City, Florida, at 9:30 a.m., February 1, 1955.

Rev. J. H. Morningstar led the congregation in the singing while Mrs. Amos Glenning presided at the piano. Rev. Russell Howard led in prayer.

District Superintendent Burcham introduced Rev. A. L. Luttrull, the pastor of Morrison Memorial, who in turn gave the conference a brief but hearty welcome.

The District Superintendent then introduced Rev. Richard Hawkins, the General Secretary of Church Extension for the Pilgrim Holiness Church, who became the permanent chairman of the conference.

Rev. Hawkins then read from Acts 2:42-47 and commented upon it. He said that what happened after Pentecost is similar to what a second annual conference ought to see happen in their district. He also said that much effort should be put forth to make new Sunday School scholars and new converts fixed additions to these two groups. He mentioned that the divine love in the sanctified hearts of the early church melted differences and blended them together in Christian love. The theme of his entire devotional message was "Continuing On", in all phases of the Lord's fields of labor. He followed this with a special message to the ministry of the district to encourage them to work until the job is done.

The ministerial and lay delegate rolls were then called.

The conference bar was set by a motion from Rev. Burcham that the bar consist of the first three rows of seats across the sanctuary.

A motion prevailed to invite Rev. A. L. Luttrull and Rev. Amos Glendenning to sit within the conference bar.

The Reception Committee then introduced Rev. and Mrs. Amos Glendenning, who have been serving out the unexpired pastoral term of the Bradenton pastor, who resigned.

A motion prevailed to adjourn this morning session at 11:30 a.m. and reconvene the afternoon session at 1:30 p.m.

The District Superintendent read his district report which was accepted with gratitude by a hearty Amen. He followed with a report of his personal activities, a detailed report of his work as the district's executive officer.

The Auditing Committee reported and commended the District Treasurer on his neatness and correctness.

Following the Auditor's report the District Treasurer reported.

The District Statistician reported. Following this report the chairman, Rev. Hawkins gave some timely advice to the pastors as to

their responsibility to see that all reports are correct before sending them to the statistician.

The young people's executive secretary gave a verbal report.

The Committee on Ways and Means reported:

Recommendations numbers 1 and 2 were passed by the conference.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. F. D. Reed, of Detroit, Michigan, Bro. and Sr. Cox of Owosso, Michigan, and Sr. Shearer, from Ohio, the widow of a former Illinois District Superintendent.

SECOND SESSION

The second session opened for business at 1:30 p.m. with Rev. Richard Hawkins presiding.

The Committee on Resolutions reported. Resolutions number 1, 2, and 3 were passed.

The Committee on Memoirs reported and each of their proposals were favorably accepted.

The chairman, the General Secretary of Church Extension, announced the appointments by the General Board of the District's executive officers. Their names and repetitive offices as announced are as follows: J. M. Burcham, District Superintendent; Moreland Yundt, District Secretary; and Ray Richards, District Treasurer.

A motion prevailed to instruct the Secretary to notify the district pastors, unstationed ministers and churches of their responsibility to the district budget.

A motion prevailed to have the District Council approve the closing Minutes of this conference and to administer any unfinished business.

The Conference closed with a devotional service with J. Byron Crouse and wife in charge of the music and singing. Rev. Paul F. Elliott, General Secretary of Youth and Sunday Schools, and Rev. R. G. Flexon, General Secretary of Foreign Missions both spoke briefly to the assembled conference and its many visitors. Rev. Hawkins, conference chairman closed the conference with a stirring message.



The District Superintendent's Report

To the Second Annual Conference of the Florida Home Missionary District, greetings in the Name of Christ our coming King.

This is a happy occasion indeed. We are celebrating our second anniversary as a District. We have moved through another year of battles and triumphs. Today we can say, by the grace of God, our present days are better than our beginnings.

Under the splendid leadership and guidance of the Secretary of Church Extension, Rev. R. C. Hawkins, plus a sacrificing ministry, a faithful laity, and a host of friends we have been able to see the Lord's work go forward.

We wish the accomplishments of the year had been greater in many respects. However, we are happy to report that for the amount invested this past year we have received very satisfactory returns.

This report could have been a disappointing one indeed. It could have shown a loss of territory already taken for God. It could have shown the stagnation. But thanks be to the Lord it has shown a gain in many ways as the following report will bear out.

AVON PARK

Recently Rev. Howard, the pastor, sent to me a very encouraging report. Although the enemy has fought diligently to hinder the progress of this work, we are made to feel God is leading them out of their difficulties. They report good services with people praying through at their altar. They plan a new program for the forthcoming year in order to make greater strides toward liquidating their loan fund obligation. There are real signs of new faith and vision for this people. It is our prayer that God will make this new year the greatest ever.

BRADENTON

This church brings to this conference a very encouraging report. With their church free of debt, with faith they have moved steadily forward. Recently they purchased a new parsonage for ten thousand six hundred dollars. The newly appointed pastor, Rev. Amos Glendenning, has worked hard at his duties. They recently reported having a very good revival, their future looks brighter.

KISSIMMEE

The recently appointed pastor, Rev. William Beirnes, has been some what like Abraham of old who "...looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God." This pastor has been looking for a church with foundations and sufficient facilities to house the people of God. He has put forth much effort to establish a work in Kissimmee. Although our Pilgrims in this area are pitching their tents here and there for the present, we do believe they will find a permanent place of worship.

FORT LAUDERDALE

This church under the capable leadership of Rev. Ray Richards has gone forward with a good stride. They recently made the final payment on the beautiful pews that seats the auditorium and the platform. This is quite an accomplishment. They have hard surfaced the entire parking area. They have also installed a heating system and a new sprinkling system in the church lawn. Every effort is being put forth to liquidate their church loan as soon as possible. They are now assuming the full support of their pastor. If a good spiritual tide is any sign of the future victories, this church is well on its way to some wonderful days

SAINT PETERSBURG

This church has just closed its best year. There has been much evidence of God's presence in the services. Some of the most difficult people to reach for Christ, such as a Catholic family, have been born again. The people have sacrificed deeply to pay on the church debt. They have reduced the original loan of ten thousand dollars to approximately one quarter its original size. They have built on a new class room at a very reasonable cost with the assistance of donated labor from members of the congregation. Some widows' mites and hard work made it possible. The church also shows its best gain in membership since its founding. The people and pastor are planning a strong program of progress for the ensuing year.

MIAMI

The Miami church became a brighter spot in our district this year. It has faced many a storm. In every instance under the faithful leadership of its pastor, Rev. Moreland Yundt, they have met the challenge successfully. Much credit for the reduction of their debt should go to the pastor. The people have made some progress along these lines. The last reports show a gain in Sunday School attendance over a year ago. During my visit to this church for its annual meeting I detected a most excellent spirit prevailing. The presence of God could be felt keenly. It is my firm belief that this church has grown deeper in real piety and Christian warmth. They have completed another big step forward.

NEW PROSPECTS — ORLANDO

We have chosen this city for the launching of a new church project. This program is sponsored by the Department of Pilgrim Youth. It is led, directed and promoted by the outstanding leadership of Dr. Paul F. Elliott, the General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Dr. Elliott has already given much valuable time to this great Operation Orlando. He has worked in harmony with the Secretary of Church Extension and the District Superintendent. We believe this team of workers, backed by the hundreds of praying Pilgrims and supported by our Pilgrim youth, will give another new church to this district and the denomination.

WEST PALM BEACH

This city has a very definite need for a Pilgrim Holiness Church. We have some very loyal Christians there who deserve and need our church. Only a shortage of funds has kept us from entering this community. Our sincere prayers is that the Lord will open the way for another new church there soon.

We also have Pilgrims located in the following cities: Key West, Tampa, and Jacksonville who are calling for churches. God help us to trust the One, who specializes in the impossible, to meet these challenges.

MY PERSONAL REPORT

The District has been honored by the presence of God this past year. It is a real pleasure to report that we have had the finest Christian fellowship with our district pastors. In all our meetings and councils with the ministry and the laity there has been radiant at all times a wholesome Christ-like atmosphere. For all this I am very grateful, for it has made our task a pleasant one. It is not flattery to say that the men in this field of Church Extension have been kind and considerate and a harmonious group with which to labor. Their tolerance and willingness to cooperate in the various programs and needs of the District is greatly appreciated. This spirit continued throughout our annual meetings. The final reports of our churches shows each pastor being recalled with a strong vote of confidence. We praise God for this manifestation of appreciation on the part of the laity.

In my labors as your District Superintendent I have:

Held four annual meetings.

Conducted five board meetings.

Supervised the purchase of one new parsonage.

Met with pastors on three occasions to make necessary plans for building improvements.

Made personal investigation of four prospective communities for new Pilgrim churches.

Met once with our District Home Missionary Committee.

Have to our knowledge answered all mail regarding the District interests.

Met with our Secretary of Church Extension on several occasions in the interest of the District.

Visited each church two or three times.

Donated several hours of manual labor.

Met with the District Council four times.

Preached twenty-eight times.

Raised funds on two occasions.

Held two revival meetings on the District.

Attended the General Conference.

Attended one Pastors and Wives Conference.

Attended one Superintendents and Leaders Conference.

I have traveled 6,518 miles for the District.

I have received my salary in full.

And my report shows a gain in membership over a year ago.

In conclusion may I express my sincere appreciation to the leader of the Department of Church Extension, Rev. R. C. Hawkins, our District Council, every pastor and their companion, and all laymen for their splendid cooperation this past year. I have very deeply appreciated your prayers and kind words of encouragement. Without a doubt God is leading this District forward. We are by the Grace of God farther up the road than a year ago. Almost everywhere we look

there are many more victories to be won if we accept the challenge. It is my most sincere desire and prayer that in unison we move steadily ahead as we enter this new year. May we have the venture-some faith needed for the job our Lord has called us to do.

The Report Of The Committee On Ways And Means

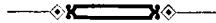
1. We recommend that the district officials shall be reimbursed, when using their automobiles, at the rate of five cents per mile plus meals and lodging when traveling in the district's interest.
2. We recommend that all ordained and licensed ministers of the conference be required to pay fifty per cent (or one-half) of their tithes from their ministerial labors into the district treasury through the local church where their membership is held.
3. We recommend that each district church be assessed 5 per cent of all the regular offerings of the church, Sunday School and Young Peoples' services as their portion of the district budget.
4. We recommend that, inasmuch as Home Missionary Districts are exempted from paying the General Budget, we give special emphasis to the three yearly offerings for the General Church's interests, namely; the Rally Day offering for Sunday Schools, the November Self-denial offering for Foreign Missions and the Easter offering for Church Extension.
5. We recommend that the District Budget be pro-rated as follows: General Conferences 15%, District Conference 10%, District Church Extension 22%, District Administration 50% and a District Contingent Fund 3%.



The Report Of The Committee On Resolutions

1. We recommend that our annual conference year shall end with April 30 and that the annual conference shall convene on the Wednesday following the last Sunday in May.
2. We recommend that the District Superintendent shall appoint all committees.
3. We recommend that 200 copies of the Journal of Proceedings of the Second annual conference of the Florida District be printed and we further recommend that they be sold for 35¢ each.
4. We recommend that the local church treasurers balance their books at the close of each month and send all district and general funds at once to the district treasurer.

5. Whereas there are many groups engaged in gospel work that continue to solicit the co-operation and financial support of our people, and,
Whereas, the Pilgrim Holiness Church furnishes us with a full program of gospel work in the local church, the district and the world wide program of church extension and missionary work, and,
Whereas while we do recognize that there are many other worthy groups engaged in gospel work, and we bid them God's speed, but we further believe that our own church deserves our full support,
Therefore be it resolved that we advice and encourage all our Pilgrims in the Florida district to give undivided loyalty and entire support to the work of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
6. We recommend that all ministers accepted as members by the annual conference of the Florida Home Missionary District, shall place their membership in some local church in the district within thirty days following the close of that conference.
