STANDING RULES ANNUAL CONFERENENCE

No. 1 -- CONFERENCE YEAR

The district fiscal year shall be July 1 to June 30.

No. 2 - DATE OF CONFERENCE AND CAMP MEETING

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding camp meeting. Camp meeting shall start Friday preceding the first full week in August.

The place of the annual session of the district conference shall be determined by the District Board of Administration.

No. 3 – CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first ten rows and the platform area of the tabernacle shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m., and 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

No delegates shall be seated in the conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

No. 4 --- ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers shall be the first item of business on Friday morning of conference.

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the District Conference Nominating Committee.

No. 5 - ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of conference shall be the ordination service, with a thrity minute intermission before the opening of business.

The companion of each candidate shall be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the ordination service.

No. 6 - RESOLUTIONS

The District Conference Action Committee and all other committees appointed by the conference for the purpose of presenting resolutions to the annual conference shall meet at the call of the district superintendent to prepare resolutions for the next conference.

All proposed resolutions shall be in the hands of the respective committees by May 15. Any resolution received after this date shall be considered only at the discretion of the committees. All resolutions shall be typewritten and signed.

The committees shall mail copies of the resolutions to the pastors and delegates by July 1.

The secretaries of the committees shall provide the conference chairman, district superintendent, and conference secretary with copies of the resolutions before reading them to the conference.

BOARDS, DISTRICT

No. 7 - DISTRICT BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION

The District Board of Administration shall consist of eleven members, including four laymen.

No. 8 - DISTRICT BOARD OF EDUCATION

The District Board of Christian Education shall consist only of the district director of Christian education, the district secretary of Sunday schools, the district president of Wesleyan Youth, the district director of Christian Youth Crusaders, the district director of the Young Missionary Workers Band, and the district educational secretary.

No. 9 - DISTRICT BOARD OF MINISTERIAL STANDING

The District Board of Ministerial Standing shall consist of the assistant district superintendent as chairman and five members, including one layman.

No. 10 - DISTRICT BOARD OF MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM

The number of members at large on the District Board of Missions and Evangelism shall be two, one elder and one layman. (See Par. 552 of the Discipline for ex-officio members.)

No. 11 -- DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The District Board of Trustees shall consist of three members.

DISTRICT COMMITTEES, DIRECTORS

No. 12 - DISTRICT CONFERENCE ACTION COMMITTEE

The District Board of Administration shall determine the size of the District Conference Action Committee and shall elect the members thereof.

No. 13 – DISTRICT BUILDING COMMITTEE

The District Board of Administration shall act as the District Building Committee.

No. 14 – DISTRICT CONFERENCE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The District Conference Nominating Committee shall consist of nine members, including the district superintendent, four elders, and four laymen.

No. 15 - DISTRICT STATISTICAL COMMITTEE

The District Statistical Committee shall be appointed by the District Board of Administration.

No. 16 - DISTRICT COMMITTEES, OTHER

The District Board of Administration shall appoint the members of the following committees: Baptismal Service, Church Extension Loan Fund, Editing, Insurance, Memoirs, Ministerial Convention, and Reception.

No. 17 -- DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF LEADERSHIP TRAINING

The duties of the District Director of Leadership Training (Par. 590, the Discipline) shall be delegated to the District Director of Christian Education.

CAMP

No. 18 – CAMP BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Camp Board of Directors shall consist of five men elected by the district conference. Two members shall be elected annually for three-year terms, one to be elected from nominations presented by the District Board of Administration and one to be elected from nominations presented by the youth council. The chairman of this board shall be appointed by the District Board of Administration.

The Board of Directors shall elect one of their number to be treasurer for all specified camp development funds.

The duties of the board shall be as follows:

- 1. Design a progressive and orderly program for the development of Hopkins Camp. These plans shall be in accordance with the master plan accepted by the 1961 annual conference.
- 2. Report to the district conference annually through the board chairman the progress of the development program.
- 3. Submit annually to the district conference a specified development project for the current year.
- 4. Present to the conference plans for financing the development program.
- 5. The chairman shall present the board's plans and recommendations in the form of resolutions to the conference at the time of the annual report.
- 6. The board shall be in charge of the renting of the camp ground.
- 7. The board shall be responsible for directing work week.

The Camp Board shall consist of three members elected by the district conference. One member shall be elected annually for a three-year term from nominations presented by the District Board of Administration. One of the elected members shall be appointed chairman by the District Board of Administration.

The board shall organize and supervise all activities necessary for the functioning of the district camp and conference. This is to include:

1. Securing all manual workers.

- 2. Supervising grounds and buildings during camp and conference.
- 3. Advertising and promoting the annual camp meeting.
- 4. Making necessary purchases of camp supplies.

No. 20 - CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSIONS

On the two Sundays during camp meeting there shall be a Sunday school session from 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. The session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday school committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance. Each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local Sunday school secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.

No. 21 — MINISTERS' EXPENSES

Recognized actively engaged ministers of The Wesleyan Church shall pay a registration fee of \$10 for conference and camp. Their wives and their children, eleven years old and under, and all district retired ministers shall be entertained free. The registration fee shall cover the cost of dormitory privileges, meals, and trailer court and tent facilities. Ministers who do not pay the registration fee shall be charged full current rates for their room, board, and trailer and tent facilities. Ministers accepting an assignment of work for camp and conference from the camp board are to be exempted from the registration fee.

Delegated general church representatives, camp evangelists, singers, and other special camp or convention speakers shall be entertained free for the duration of their engagement.

No. 22 - WORK WEEK

The third week of May shall be designated as camp work week.

Each church shall be responsible for five days work per year to the conference, or \$50 is to be paid to the district treasurer by the first of May that help may be hired. The camp board is authorized to hire help to complete any work that is not completed during work week.

FINANCE

No. 23 - CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall remit for general and district budgets the equivalent of 11.5% of the total receipts of the church and all of its departments for the previous fiscal year (excluding building cost, building debt retirement, interest, and major inprovements).

The equivalent of 4.5% of the total receipts shall be for the United Stewardship Fund, 2.2% shall be for the Educational Institutions Fund, and 4.8% shall be for the District Budget.

The District Budget shall be divided as follows: Administrative Fund 24%, Church Extension 26%, Camp Maintenance 17.4%, Camp and Conference Fund 4.3%, Ministerial Relief 6.7%, Youth Department 4.3%, Sunday School Department 4.3%, Owosso College 8.7%, and International Conference Fund 4.3%.

Each church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury.

No. 24 – ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the district treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund. The pastor shall have the responsibility of seeing that this is done.

No. 25 - CONTINGENCY FUND

Five per cent of all district budget receipts, excluding the Owosso College Fund and the International Conference Fund shall be credited to the district Contingency Fund. This fund shall be used for emergency loans to any district department.

No. 26 – DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUNDS

All monies raised in the local church for district and general church work shall be sent to the district treasurer, who shall forward the general church funds to the general church treasurer.

To be included in the treasurer's annual report to the conference, funds must be received by him no later than July 10.

District treasurer: Rev. K. P. Boileau, 3765 N. Chapin, Merrill 48637.

No. 27 - AUDITOR

The District Board of Administration shall employ a recognized public accountant for auditing all district treasurers' books. The auditor's report shall be available to the annual conference.

No. 28 – SALARIES

The district superintendent's salary shall be \$6,900 per year, the equivalent of his social security, full pension plan, family hospital insurance, and eight cents a mile traveling expenses.

The annual salaries of other district officials shall be as follows: treasurer, \$600; secretary, \$250; statistician, \$100; insurance secretary, \$100; Sunday school secretary, \$100; Sunday school treasurer, \$50; Camp Board of Directors treasurer, \$50; Church Extension treasurer, \$50; and missionary treasurer, \$50. Each department shall be responsible for payment of their respective salaries.

All district officials shall receive eight cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the district, except for transportation to and from any meetng (business or otherwise) when said transportation serves the purpose of attendance at the annual conference, camp meeting, work week, the annual ministerial convention, and the annual pastor's seminar.

Secretarial or clerical help shall be provided for the district superintendent's office. The District Board of Administration's permission must be granted for other district secretarial work.

Prior to an annual adjustment of salaries and mileage for the various district departments the salaries and mileage (with the exception of those of the youth department) shall be reviewed by the District Conference Action Committee and approved by the district conference. The salary and expenses of the district superintendent shall be reviewed by the District Board of Administration and recommendations made to the District Conference Action Committee for approval by the district conference.

No. 29 - MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists, and ministers of the district, and their wives, shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. The cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the departments that employ them.

Each local church shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Association and pay the expenses of their membership and each call.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives receiving their principal

support from their meetings shall be enrolled in the Association. The cost of membership and each call shall be paid by the church of which they are members.

Membership expense for the district superintendent and his wife shall be paid from the Administrative Fund.

Membership expense for ministers, and their wives, employed at Owosso College shall be paid from the Owosso College treasury.

Membership expense for home missionary pastors shall be paid from the Church Extension Fund.

Membership expense for retired elderly ministers and their wives shall be paid from the Ministerial Relief Fund.

OWOSSO COLLEGE

No. 30 - OWOSSO COLLEGE DAY

The Sunday following Mother's Day shall be designated Owosso College Day. On this day the college shall be represented and an offering shall be taken for the college with a goal of \$3 per member.

MINISTERIAL CONVENTIONS

No. 31 - MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

A ministerial convention committee shall be appointed annually by the district superintendent to plan and provide a joint ministerial convention with the East Michigan District.

No. 32 – FALL MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

An annual ministerial convention shall be held sometime in the early part of the conference year, the date to be set by the District Board of Administration. The convention shall be held in one of the local churches. The district superintendent shall appoint a committee of five persons to prepare the convention program.

PASTORS

No. 33 - PASTORS AT CAMP MEETNG

Inasmuch as the pastors are expected to support and attend the annual camp meeting, each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.

No. 34 - CAR ALLOWANCE

The Conference recommends that each church provide a car allowance for its pastor.

No. 35 – HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

The churches shall enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitalization plan that is in effect in the Michigan District.

Failure to pay premiums for a period of two months shall cancel insurance coverage. A letter shall be sent to the pastor before the insurance expires.

No. 36 – SEMINAR EXPENSE

To make it possible for the pastors to attend the annual pastors' seminar, the Conference recommends that each church pay its pastor's seminar registration fee and mileage allowance.

Prior to the seminar the district superintendent shall send a copy of this resolution with a letter of reminder to all local church secretaires.

No. 37 - UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The district shall provide the same for the district parsonage.

No. 38 - VACATIONS

Vacations with pay for all district pastors shall range from a minimum of two weeks to a maximum of four weeks. The length of vacations shall be based on the years of service in the ministry of The Wesleyan Church as follows:

Full-time service – a minimum of two weeks.

Fifteen years of service - three weeks.

Twenty years, or more, of service – four weeks.

No. 39 - RECALL OF PASTORS

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of the district to vote on the recall of the pastor.

No. 40 - MOVING DATE

The minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the last Sunday in the fiscal year.

REPORTS

No. 41 --- ANNUAL REPORTS

Complete annual reports must be reviewed by the local church boards and forwarded directly to the district statistician, Rev. J. H. Koteskey, 728 Pine Ave., Alma, Mich. 48801, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the statistician's report.

No. 42 - REPORTING OF PASTORAL CALLS

In order to have a uniform system of reporting pastoral calls the following guide shall be used:

- a. Each visit to a home shall constitute a pastoral call.
- b. A call shall be recorded for each person ministered to in an institution.
- c. The pastor shall determine whether the call shall be recorded as a member or non-member.

No. 43 - REPORTING SEEKERS

The number of seekers during a revival shall be included in the report of the pastor of the church, as well as in the report of the evangelist.

No. 44 – MONTHLY REPORTS

The average attendance of the Sunday morning, Sunday evening, and prayer meeting services shall be reported monthly.

Report forms will be supplied by the district. Reports shall be submitted on the first day of each month as directed by the District Board of Administration. A monthly compilation of the reports shall be sent to the churches.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

No. 45 - DISTRICT EXPENSE

To provide finances for District Sunday school work, each Sunday school shall send annually to the District Sunday school treasurer the amount shown for its category.

No. 46 - SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE WEEK

The third full week of September shall be known as Sunday School Institute Week.

No. 47 - SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNT

Each Sunday school shall cease counting the attendance at the end of the first one-half of the Sunday school session.

SUPERINTENDENT

No. 48 - MEETINGS WITH LOCAL BOARDS

The district superintendent shall meet with each local board at least once annually to discuss specifically the importance of the United Stewardship Fund and the district budget.

He shall also discuss with the board the needs of the pastor relative to salary and the provisions specified in the manual and conference journal concerning parsonage, utilities, hospitalization insurance, pension plan and car allowance.

This meeting shall be arranged only with the knowledge and full concurrence of the pastor.

No. 49 - RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another superintendent, the conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to the church as a pastor. The District Board of Administration may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

No. 50 - REVIVALS

The superintendant shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the district, other than his regular work.

No. 51 - VACATIONS

The conference superintendent shall be granted a vacation period of 30 days with pay per conference year.

YOUTH

No. 52 - EXECUTIVE MEETINGS

The conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

No. 53 - CONVENTION PROGRAM

The youth convention shall consist of four services: a Friday evening evangelistic service, Saturday morning business session, Saturday afternoon service, and a rally Saturday evening.

No. 54 - CAMP YOUTH PROGRAM

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

No. 55 - TERMS OF SERVICE

Incumbents of the district youth council, though not re-elected, shall serve until the close of camp.

No. 56 - NOMINATIONS OF ZONE OFFICERS

The zone officers and zone pastors shall present nominations for the offices of zone secretary and zone treasurer.

No. 57 - JOINT COUNCIL MEETINGS

There shall be two combined meetings of the District Board of Administration and the youth council each year. The first meeting shall be in the first six months of the church fiscal year and the second meeting shall be in the second six months of the church year. These meetings shall be called expressly for the purpose of joint businness.

OTHER

No. 58 - ASSOCIATE CHURCHES

Upon a temporary working agreement being effected between the Michigan District and an independent group, that group shall be considered as an "associate church." All assets and properties shall be legally transferred to the Wesleyan Church before final acceptance of the group by the conference.

No. 59 - CALENDAR

A calendar showing the dates of district activities shall be drafted by the District Board of Administration each year.

No. 60 - YOUTH PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT CAMP

The youth program for the district camp, as printed in the 1963 Journal, Rule No. 48, is printed in the youth section.

No. 61 - CHURCH EXTENSION

Standing Rules in regard to Church Extension policy, Church Extension Fellowship, and Church Extension Loan Fund (Rules 15, 16, and 17 of the 1963 Journal) are included in the 1966 District Handbook.

No. 62 - COURSE OF STUDY

Information regarding the course of study for ordination can be obtained from the district secretary.

No. 63 - MISSIONARY REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the conference journal.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS Annual Conference August 1-2, 1968

FIRST SITTING

The first annual conference of the Michigan District of The Wesleyan Church (68th for the Michigan District) convened at 9 a.m., August 1, 1968, at the district camp grounds, Hopkins, Michigan.

The district superintendent, Rev. C. M. Marshall, opened the conference with prayer.

With his wife at the piano, Rev. L. L. Keesor led in the singing of "In the Sweet Bye and Bye."

Prayer was offered by Rev. J. H. Koteskey, assistant district superintendent.

Rev. C. M. Marshall then persented Dr. Melvin Snyder, general superintendent, as the presiding officer. Dr. Snyder read John 17, taking as his text John 17:21, "One that the world may believe." He stated that this was the theme of the merger conference at Anderson, Indiana. He spoke of the characteristics of the unity in the early church: a unity of separation from the world, a unity of purity, a unity of love, and a unity of mission. He closed with the thought that the Christians are completely separated in spirit from this world that they may be involved in bringing souls out of the world and into God's kingdom.

The Conference then joined in the singing of "I Love Him."

Rev. C. E. Messer, district secretary, called the conference roll of pastors and delegates, Delegates present were: ministerial, 67; lay,83.

Greetings from Rev. M. L.Goodman were read by the Secretary. Rev. Goodman is conducting a camp meeting in Orleans, Indiana, and cannot be present. A motion carried that a telegram be sent to him, informing him that he is missed in our conference, and that our prayers are with him and his camp meeting.

A letter was also read from Rev. Joseph Jackson, who could not attend conference due to illness. A motion carried that we acknowledge receipt of this letter.

Rev. C. M. Marshall then stated that two new churches were organized in our district this year, Chesaning and Crystal. Rev. Norman Kessler, pastor at Crystal, was presented to Dr. Melvin Snyder. Rev. Ronald King, Chesaning pastor, was unable to attend. A motion was carried to received both of these churches into the conference.

Rev. C. E. Messer presented a recommendation from the District Council that the following ministers be accepted into the Conference by letter of transfer:

Rev. Arlen B. Morgan from the East Michigan District.

Rev. Joseph Jackson from the Texas District.

Rev. William Kinnan from the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District.

Rev. Lawrence Orcena from the Ohio Wesleyan Methodist District.

These brethren were then presented to the Conference and to Dr. Snyder. after which each gave a word of testimony.

The report of the Educational and Examining Boards was read by the Secretary. A motion to approve the report was carried.

The District Superintendent presented his report. A motion prevailed that we accept this excellent report by a rising vote of appreciation.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Guy Rayle from the North Wesleyan Conference, who gave his testimony. A motion was carried to give Rev. Guy Rayle an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The assistant superintendent, Rev. J. H. Koteskey, reported. A motion carried to received this report with appreciation.

The Reception Committee then presented Rev. Louis Ames from the Michigan Conference of The Wesleyan Church. A motion carried to receive Rev. Ames into the Conference as an honorary member. The Secretary read the auditors' reports for the treasurers' books for the following departments: Church Extension, Sunday School, District Missionary Societies, and the Michigan Conference. A motion to receive these reports carried.

Rev. K. P. Boileau, district treasurer, reported. A motion carried to receive this report with appreciation.

The Conference adjourned for lunch, with Dr. H. T. Mills dismissing with prayer.

SECOND SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 p.m. at the call of the District Superintendent.

Rev. L. L. Keesor led in the singing of "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes." Mrs. Keesor was at the piano.

Rev. Ernest Klein, pastor at Wyoming, led in prayer.

The minutes of the first sitting were read by the Secretary and approved as read.

Rev. L. J. Laubaugh, district statistician, reported. A motion carried that this report be accepted, with the privilege of making necessary adjustments in order to bring the report up to date.

By motion the reports of the following district officers were received:

Mrs. Carl Barrett, District Missionary Society treasurer.

Rev. Fred Gibbs, District Sunday School treasurer.

Rev. E. B. Woirol, treasurer and secretary of the Church Extension Dept. Rev. David Leamon, Camp Board of Directors treasurer.

Rev. L. L. Keesor, District Sunday School promotional secretary.

Rev. Keesor then presented the Pilgrim Ship award to the Battle Creek First pastor, Rev. G. Vaughn Drummonds, and delegates for the largest numerical gain (66) in Sunday School.

Rev. Norman Kessler was presented a certificate of recognition on behalf of the Crystal church for having the highest precentage gain in the district.

Rev. C. M. Marshall then presented Rev. Keesor and delegates from Jackson with the national award for Division A in the March to Sunday School in March campaign. They also received the Rally Day award plaque and a certificate for placing second in numerical gain.

Ribbons were presented by Rev. The Conference recessed for a short term.

The Conference reconvened with Dr. Snyder presenting Rev. Daniel Bursch, president of Owosso College, who spoke briefly to the Conference. A motion carried to receive with appreciation Rev. Bursch's report.

Rev. Bob Nelson reported for the Insurance Committee. A motion carried to receive this report.

Inasmuch as there was a change in the Missionary Society presidency during the conference year, there was no report given.

A motion prevailed that we implement the new Discipline insofar as is practical in this conference.

Rev. E. B. Woirol reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding Resolution No. 4 on Page 29 of the 1967 Journal, was adopted.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the Michigan Conference Merger Study Committee, was adopted.

Resolution No. 3, regarding time of pastoral change, was adopted.

Resolution No. 4, regarding Standing Rule No. 9 in the 1967 Journal, was adopted.

Resolution No. 5, regarding Standing Rule No. 50 in the 1967 Journal, was adopted.

Resolution No. 6, regarding Standing Rule No. 33 in the 1967 Journal, was adopted.

Resolution No. 7, regarding all Standing Rules being made to comply with The Discipline, was adopted.

Rev. G. Vaughn Drummonds reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding the International Conference Fund deficit, was adopted.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the district treasurer's budget reports, was adopted.

Resolution No. 3, regarding the salary of the district superintendent, was adopted.

Resolution No. 4, regarding mileage expense for all district officials, was adopted.

Resolution No. 5, regarding the district budget, was presented to the Conference. Due to expiration of time, the Conference was adjourned.

Rev. Daniel Bursch, president of Owosso College, dismissed in prayer.

THIRD SITTING

The ordination service began promply at 7 p.m. with Rev. C. M. Marshall, district superintendent, reading from the following Scriptures: Isaiah 52:7, I Cor. 1:21-24, and II Cor. 4:5-6.

Rev. G. V. Drummonds led in the singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have," with Mrs. Drummond at the piano. Rev. J. H. Koteskey, assistant superintendent, led in prayer.

Dr. M. H. Snyder read from II Chronicles 16:7, and spoke about the kind of man God wants: a man who is quiet enough to hear His voice, a man who is courageous enough to preach His message, and a man who is honest enough to live God's message.

The canidates, Arthur O'Dell, Richard N. Workman, and Clifford Van Sickle, were presented to Dr. Snyder by Rev. C. M. Marshall, who stated that these brethren were to be ordained as elders in the church of God.

Rev. K. P. Boileau then read from Eph. 3:7-9, Eph. 4:11-13, and John 10:7a, 9-16.

Dr. Snyder then gave the charge to the candidates, after which he administered the examination of ordination.

Rev. C. E. Messer then led in the prayer of thanksgiving and purpose.

The candidates and their wives knelt at the altar for the ritual of ordination. Rev. L. L. Keesor led in a prayer of enduement.

The Ordination Council then congratulated the newly ordained elders, after which the congregation offered their congratulations.

Just before a short recess, the Conference sang, "The Old Rugged Cross."

The Conference reconvened with the reading of the minutes of the second sitting. They were approved as read and corrected.

Rev. G. V. Drummonds reported again for the Ways and Means Committee. Resolution No. 5, regarding the district budget, was adopted.

The Secretary presented two District Council resolutions to the Conference.

Resolution No. 1, regarding the District Board of Administration, was amended to read "11 members, including 4 laymen." It was adopted as amended.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the Conference Nominating Committee, was lost. Due to the expiration of time, the Conference was adjourned. The Conference was called to order August 2, 1968, at 9 a.m., by Rev. C. M. Marshall, district superintendent.

Rev. M. V. Goodrich, pastor at Muskegon First church, led in the singing of "Glory to His Name" with Mrs. L. L. Keesor at the piano.

The district superintendent then presented Dr. M. H. Snyder. For the devotional period Dr. Snyder asked for several persons to quote a Scripture verse which had been a blessing to them this past year. A wonderful spirit prevailed as God's promises were quoted by His children.

The minutes of the thrid sitting were read and approved.

The secretary read greetings from Rev. C. J. Adams, who could not attend conference. A motion carried that we acknowledge this letter.

A motion was carried to suspend the order of the day at 10 a.m. in order to hear the proposal on the district alignment.

The Conference then proceeded with the election of officers. The district superintendent appointed the following tellers: recording secretary, Richard Workman; head teller, E. B. Woirol; Merlin Goodrich, Estle Engle, Alvin Ransom, Donald Lichty, Aaron Rummage, David Leamon, Purlin Wesseling, Roy Tripp, Leonard Strait, Douglas Knight, Stanley Dean, Dale Brugger and G. E. Petterson.

The Reception Committee presented Mr. Archie Stevens of the Stevens Van Lines. Mr. Stevens brought greetings to the Conference.

Ballots were cast for assistant district superintendent.

While ballots were being counted, Dr. M. H. Snyder informed the Conference that no provisions are made in The Discipline for the Board of Administration to act as a nominating committee. By mutual consent the District Council again presented Resolution No. 2, regarding the Nominating Committee. The resolution was adopted.

The nominations for office of District Secretary of World Missions were read by the Secretary. Rev. Fred Gibbs was elected.

The report of the balloting for assistant district superintendent was given. There was no election. (Rev. J. H. Koteskey had previously asked that his name not be considered for re-election this year.)

A motion to vote on the four highest names was ruled out of order by the chair. Ballots were cast again, and there was no election.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary of Extension and Evangelism.

At 10 a.m. Rev. C. M. Marshall introduced the members of the Comity Committee. The members were: Dr. H. T. Sheridan, chairman, Rev. R. W. Cooper, Rev. E. W. Zuber, Rev. Roy Webster and Rev. J. H. Koteskey. Each member brought a word of greetings to the Conference.

A motion carried that these brethren be given an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

A recommendation from the Comity Committee proposing a three-district plan for the State of Michigan was read by Rev. J. H. Koteskey.

By motion it was brought before the Conference for discussion.

The members of the Comity Committee spoke regarding the proposal.

Questions were presentd by members of the Conference and responded to by members of the committee.

The Conference adjourned due to expiration of time. A closing prayer was offered by Dr. M. H. Snyder.

FIFTH SITTING

Rev. C. M. Marshall, district superintendent, called the conference to order at 1:30 p.m., August 2.

Rev. William Watkins, pastor at Cheboygan, led the Conference in the singing of "I Will Praise Him." Mrs. Keesor was at the piano.

Prayer was requested for Mrs. John Coffey, who is to undergo surgery Saturday morning. Rev. Stanley Dean, pastor at Breckenridge, led in prayer.

The Reception Committee presented to Dr.M.H. Snyder the following guests: Rev. and Mrs. Louis Ames, Rev. Harold Rickner, Rev. James Kreider, Rev. and Mrs. T. M. Fast, and Rev. Carl Coffey. Each gave a word of greeting. A motion carried to grant these friends an honorary seat within the bar.

The minutes of the fourth sitting were read and approved.

Discussion continued regarding district alignment.

A motion was made to refer the resolution from the Comity Committee back to the Board of Administration. This motion was ruled out of order by the chairman.

A motion was made to close debate on the resolution, and vote by secret ballot. The motion carried.

The Conference then voted by secret ballot and the resolution lost. The vote was: no, 96; yes, 35.

The Conference voted to go on record as expressing their sincere appreciation to the Comity Committee for their work and effort on the study of churches and district boundaries.

A motion prevailed that the Conference authorize the Board of Administration to make proposals to the Comity Committee, taking into consideration the discussion and feelings of the Conference.

Rev. E. B. Woirol, head teller, reported on the results of the previous balloting. Rev. Bob Nelson was elected to the office of District Secretary of Church Extension and Evangelism.

Ballots were cast again for the office of assistant district superintendent. Rev. William H. Osborne was elected.

The nominations were read for the office of district secretary. Rev. C. E. Messer was re-elected on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for district treasurer. Rev. K. P. Boileau was re-elected on the first ballot.

The Secretary read Resolution No. 12 from the District Council, regarding the number of members on the Board of Missions and Evangelism. The resolution was adopted.

Ballots were cast for members of the Board of Missions and Evangelism. Rev. William F. Kinnan and Mrs. Ivah Schultz were elected.

District Council Resolution No. 7, regarding the Board of Ministerial Standing, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 11, regarding the present Educational and Examining Board, was presented. The Chairman ruled that the present members should continue as members on the District Board of Ministerial Standing.

Inasmuch as Rev. William F. Osborne will automatically be a member of this board, due to his new position as assistant superintendent, Council nominations were presented. Rev. Roy Rummage was elected. Leonard Mills was elected as lay member of the board.

Ballots were cast for District Director of Christian Education. Rev. Merlin Goodrich was elected.

Ballots were cast for 3 elders to be members of the District Board of Administration. The following were elected: Rev. L. L. Keesor, Rev. J. H. Koteskey, and Rev. G. V. Drummonds.

The Conference recessed for a brief period.

Ballots were then cast for District Sunday School Secretary. Rev. L. L. Keesor was elected.

Ballots were cast for Director of Christian Youth Crusaders. Rev. Richard N. Workman was elected.

A motion carried that nominations for lay representation on the District Board of Administration be made from the floor. It was also suggested that no more than one layman from each church be nominated.

The following laymen were elected: Lloyd Thompson of Owosso, Edwin Petter of Ellsworth, Leonard Schultz of Jackson, and Burdette Shattuck of Owosso.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers; Rev. Jack Gladding, Rev. Bernard Churchill, and Rev. Ronald Diehl.

District Council Resolution No. 15, regarding the Camp Board continuing on, was carried with the authorization of the District Board of Administration to appoint the third member.

District Council Resolution No. 18, regarding the Camp Board of Directors continuing on, was adopted with the authorization of the District Board of Administration to appoint the fourth and fifth members.

A motion prevailed that the Conference give a rising vote of thanks to the Camp Board and Camp Board of Directors for the fine job they have done this past year.

Rev. C. M. Marshall gave special recognition to Rev. Carl Barrett, chairman of the Camp Board of Directors, for the many hours he worked on the camp grounds this past year. A motion carried to show appreciation to Rev. Barrett by a "cheery" Amen!

Ballots were cast for the office of Educational Secretary. Dr. C. W. Thomas was elected.

District Council Resolution No. 3, regarding the District Board of Administration determining the size of the District Conference Action Committee and making the necessary appointments, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 4, regarding the place of the annual conference, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 5, regarding the district fiscal year, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 6, regarding the District Board of Trustees, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 8, regarding an auditor, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 9, regarding the District Board of Administration acting as a District Building Committee, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 10, regarding the Statistical Committee being appointed by the District Board of Administration, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 13, regarding the duties of the District Director of Leadership Training, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 14, regarding the number of members of the Board of Christian Education, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 16, regarding the continuation of various district committees, was adopted.

District Council Resolution No. 17, regarding the election of officers of the Women's Missionary Society, was adopted.

A motion prevailed that inasmuch as the Memoirs Committee was not prepared to report, that the responsibility for preparing this year's report be delegated to the Board of Administration.

A motion carried that the nominations for the District Nominating Committee come from the floor, and it was suggested that representation of all areas of the district be considered in the nominations.

Nominations were made for both lay and ministerial representation on the District Nominating Committee. Inasmuch as it was close to adjournment time, a motion carried to accept the results on a plurality basis. The following laymen were elected: Leonard Mills of Kalamazoo, D. A. Harper of Berkley Hills, Ray Loew of Battle Creek First, and Loren Hartman of Owosso. The ministerial members elected were: E. L. Downey, C. F. Barrett, Roy Rummage, and Ronald Diehl.

A motion carried that the District Board of Administration be authorized to care for any unfinished business.

A motion carried that the District Board of Administration ratify the minutes of the last sitting.

A motion was carried to extend the time of the conference to hear from the Resolutions Committee. Rev. G. E. Petterson reported.

The following resolutions were adopted by motion:

Resolution No. 8. RESOLVED, That a rising vote of thanks be given to General Superintendent M. H. Snyder for his leadership in this conference.

Resolution No. 9. RESOLVED, That a rising vote of thanks be given to District Superintendent C. M. Marshall for his leadership during the past year

Resolution No. 10. RESOLVED, That a vote of thanks be given to Mrs. Évan Downey for her assistance in the secretarial department.

Resolution No. 11. RESOLVED, That a vote of thanks be given to the Camp Board and kitchen help and all others working on the camp grounds to make this conference as pleasant as it has been.

Resolution No. 12. RESOLVED, That a vote of thanks be given to the youth president, Rev. Evan Downey, and his helpers for the fine youth program and youth camps throughout the district.

Certificates were awarded by Rev. K. P. Boileau, district treasurer, to the following churches for having at least 80 per cent of their United Stewardship Fund paid. Three-star churches, having 100 per cent paid: Alma, Almira, Battle Creek First, Bellaire, Brady Center, Burnips, Coleman, Eaton Rapids, Edgetts, Frankfort, Grand Rapids Berkley Hills, Hastings, Honor, Ithaca, Jackson, Lansing Trinity, Owosso, Rockford, and Traverse City. Two-star church: Ellsworth, 92 per cent paid. One-star church: Merrill, 84 per cent paid.

A motion was made to adjourn. The motion carried. The conference closed with prayer by General Superintendent M. H. Snyder.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To General Superintendent M. H. Snyder, pastors, delegates, and friends of the first session of the Michigan Conference of The Wesleyan Church, greetings in the name of Jesus, our Lord!

The merging general conference held at Anderson, Indiana, June 26 through July 1, 1968, has consummated the uniting of the former Pilgrim Holiness and the former Wesleyan Methodist denominations into a new denomination known as "The Wesleyan Church."

The presence of the Holy Spirit on both the devotional periods and the business sessions gave evidence to God's approval of this epochal event in the history of our ecclesia. However, that which thrills me more is the knowledge that we now have a Sunday school enrollment of 300,000 scholars; a church membership of 122,340; mission work on every continent with 282 missionares serving in 30 nations; 25,000 active youth members; 36,000 members in the women's missionary organization; 3,196 students enrolled in our colleges; and a publishing operation staffed and equipped to serve the publicational interests of our denomination.

As a result of this merger, we convene our district conference under unprecedented circumstances. In the State of Michigan, we discover that our Zion has literally become double its size in one year. We now have in the state approximately 160 churches; nearly 10,000 full members; a Sunday school enrollment of more than 20,000; and, a combined annual income of all churches of more than two and one-half million dollars.

The task of restructuring our district organization to bring it in line with the Wesleyan Discipline and the realignment of district boundaries so as to most effectively utilize our resources and realize our potential is the main concern of this conference. It will challenge both the consecration of our hearts and tax the best judgment of our minds. I trust that the "spirit of Anderson" will characterize our district conference.

The most difficult decision confronting this conference is the realignment of district boundaries. Let us realistically face the fact that the overlapping of district jurisdictions makes it mandatory to eventually realign district boundaries in such a manner as to most effectively proclaim the message of full salvation through the ministries of both the local church and the district church.

May God help us to create a spirit of tolerance and understanding in this conference that will permit every delegate to speak boldly and plainly in the spirit of Christ that which is upon his heart without fear of ridicule or censorship. After the debate is over and the ballots are counted, may God give each of us the grace to accept the decision, to close our ranks, and to work effectively to consummate the express will of the majority.

The statistical reports of the departments will reveal one of the most progressive years on both the local church and district church levels. I shall not preempt the reports of the departments but shall call attention to other areas of interest.

This has been a year of merger. The Traverse City First and the Traverse Heights churches have merged to form the "College Terrace Wesleyan Church" of Traverse City. The Midland First and the Midland Grace churches have united to form a new church in Midland; and the Lansing Grace and the Lansing Emmanuel churches voted to merge and plan to have their first Sunday service together on August 11.

The main thrust of the Church Extension Committee has been a continuation of support for the Holland project. Special mention should be made of the benevolence of the Burnips church toward the Holland church. An offering is received each month for Holland during the Sunday school hour by the Burnips church. They have given thousands of dollars. There are a number of larger churches that could do likewise. If each well established church would lend a helping hand to a new church or a small, struggling church, it would amount to the greatest possible evangelistic and extension effort.

The youth, in my estimation, have arrived at a most productive and satisfactory organization for youth camps. They have three camps. The camp for the ages 9 through 12 is becoming a CYC camp. There were about 140 in attendance this year. The camp for ages 13 through 15 was well attended with more than 80 campers. The third camp is primarily for the older teen-agers and will run consecutively with the regular district camp. Interest is increasing among the youth and a good enrollment is expected. I should like to eventually see a camp for young married couples.

The Sunday school has again done an outstanding job of promotion. We did well in the national Sunday school rally and have a substantial attendance increase for the year.

Through the supreme efforts of the camp board of directors and its chairman, and those who gave unstintingly of their time, we will enjoy the facilities of the new dining room and kitchen. Also, the purchase of a tractor and several pieces of machinery has made it possible to better maintain the camp grounds. Vandalism, this year, amounted to more than \$2,000 in damages to buildings and equipment. About one-half of this amount was recovered from insurance. However, it does point up the need for a resident caretaker. The camp board has again done an excellent job of providing for the conference and camp. They have become proficient in the area of estimating the cost of conference and camp. Last year they came within a very few dollars of their projected budget of camp expenses of \$6,235 and camp receipts of \$7,050. They were able to transfer several dollars to the camp development and maintenance fund. The "Camp 500 Club" has been a great benefit in raising camp offerings.

The leadership of the missionary society was changed in the middle of the fiscal year because of its president being called back to the mission field. This year, they have set a goal of \$2,000 for the annual missionary camp offering. This amount has been broken down and assigned to each society to raise their portion of the annual camp offering during the year. If each society will respond and bring in their offering, it will elimiate the pressure of a prolonged appeal each annual camp missionary day.

The district treasurer reports that 82.6 per cent of the United Stewardship Fund is paid, and 80.1 per cent of the district budget was paid. The total giving to these interests is increasing each year. The combined unified budget of the general church (4.5 per cent) and the educational budget (2.2 per cent) as set by the merging general conference will amount to 6.7 per cent of the total offerings of the local church excluding building fund offerings.

Under the able leadership of the pastors and church boards, and because of the faithfulness of dedicated laymen, most churches have made physical improvements, numerical gains, and spiritual progress. For this we give God the glory.

Because of merger, demands on my time and physical strength have been greater than usual this year. But with the help of a good assistant superintendent, the excellent cooperation of the district council, and the understanding of pastors and churches, you have made me feel, to quote the Psalmist, "The lines are fallen unto me in pleasant places; yea, I have a goodly heritage." Ps. 16:6.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

To General Superintendent Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, District Superintendent Rev. C. M. Marshall, fellow ministers, delegates, and visitors to the first annual conference of the Michigan District, greetings in the name of our wonderful Lord.

You've often heard it said that "Nothing succeeds like success." As we examine the Sunday schools of the Michigan District and its program, we can't help but feel that this has been a successful year in the Lord.

We started the year off on the right foot in the month of September with over 1,000 in attendance at our district-wide Sunday school conventions. This turned out to be the largest attendance yet at any convention. Many have said that it was the finest convention that we have had to date. The key-note speaker, work-

shops, and Sunday school promotional material were accepted with much enthusiasm. We all went away feeling that we had been more than repaid for our efforts.

Our year continued with a successful "March to Sunday School in March" campaign. This year the Michigan District led the way in the national contest as it has for five consecutive years. We have placed more Sunday Schools in the winner's circle than all other districts put togather. In previous years we have placed five or six in the top bracket. This year we reached an all time high by placing eight in the winner's circle. Honor should be given to the following Sunday schools for winning national recognition: Division A, Jackson, 1st place; Division B, Ithaca, 3rd place and Coleman, 5th place; Division C, Witmer Memorial, 2nd place, and Edgetts, 4th place; Division D, Crystal, 2nd place, Honor 3rd place, and Frankfort 5th place. Each of these schools, along with the pastor and superintendent is to be commended for the fine work. I desire also to pay tribute to the Sunday schools who won the \$25 gift certificates for being winners in their district groupings. They are as follows: Group AA, Jackson; Group A, Eaton Rapids; Group B, Lansing First; Group C, Witmer Memorial; and Group D, Crystal.

This year's district Sunday school average attendance has topped all previous years. We have shown a gain of 148 over last year. We take our hats off to the Battle Creek First Church for leading the district with a 66 numerical gain. Jackson came in a close second with a 59 numerical gain. Special mention ought to be made of the following Sunday schools who were in double figures in gain this year: Eaton Rapids 33, Lansing First and Witmer Memorial 24; Crystal and Ithaca 18; Rockford and Sterling 15, and Lansing Grace and Traverse City with 12. This year's Rally Day award goes to the Jackson Church and the percentage gain to Crystal.

This report may sound as if the promotional secretary is tooting a horn for the Michigan District. If you get this impression, you are right. I am proud of our district and the fine leadership our district superintendent has given us and the cooperation and unity of every pastor and layman that has made this year the best in the history of this great district. I for one am proud that God has honored us with His presence and blessings and smiled upon us this past year. The song says, "To God be the glory, great things He hath done."

Plans have already been formulated for our fall promotion. The district-wide Sunday school conventions will be held September 16-20 in accordance with conference action. Our program will cover the following: Sunday school literature, promotion of attendance, Sunday school involvement, visual aids, Sunday school promotional material, films, and key-note speaker. A special award will be given to each Sunday school superintendent who has 100 per cent of staff present. One may be able to send substitute teachers to fill the quota. BE IT RESOLVED, That Resolution No. 4 on Page 29 of the 1967 Conference Journal be rescinded. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 2. WHEREAS the former Wesleyan Methodist Church, in its merger study committees, sometimes uses laymen and sometimes ministers,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Resolution No. 6 on Page 29 of the 1967 Conference Journal be amended to read: "The conference shall authorize the District Board of Administration to appoint a Michigan Conference Merger Study Committee. This committee shall consist of four members; the district superintendent shall have the authority to appoint an alternate to this committee. The committee shall work with similar committees from the Michigan conferences of the (former) Wesleyan Methodist Church and the East Michigan Conference of the (former) Pilgrim Holiness Church and will recommend merger proposals for the State of Michigan. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 3. INASMUCH as it causes a great hardship on both church and pastor to change so late in the year,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 32 on Page 15 of the 1967 Conference Journal be amended to read: "The minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the last Sunday in the fiscal year." (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 4. INASMUCH as itemized reports of all funds are regularly given,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 9 on Page 12 of the 1967 Conference Journal be deleted. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 5. INASMUCH as the District Youth Council serves until the close of camp,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the last sentence of Standing Rule No. 50 on Page 18 of the 1967 Conference Journal be deleted. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 6. INASMUCH as Standing Rule No. 33 on Page 16 of the 1967 Conference Journal is covered by Section 194 (Page 120) of the Pilgrim Holiness Manual and also by the Discipline of The Wesleyan Church, BE IT RESOLVED, That said Standing Rule be deleted. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 7. WHEREAS we are now The Wesleyan Chruch, and WHEREAS the Wesleyan Discipline is now in force,

BE IT RESOLVED, That all standing rules be made to comply with the Discipline by the Conference Action Committee and that the District Board of Administration give final approval. (Adopted.)

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

RESOLUTION NO. 1. INASMUCH as there is a deficit in the International Conference Fund due to the expense of the Merger Conference,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the funds necessary to cover this deficit be transferred from the Contingency Fund. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 2. WHEREAS the district treasurer's budget reports will be incorporated in the Michigan Pilgrim,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 17, page 13 of the 1967 Conference Journal, be deleted. (Adopted.) RESOLUTION NO. 3. BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 19, page 13 of the 1967 Conference Journal, be amended to read, "The district superintendent's salary shall be \$6,900 per year" (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 4. INASMUCH as it is a recognized fact that car expense is greater than our present allowance for official travel for the district,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 19, page 14 of the 1967 Conference Journal, be amended to read, "All district officials shall receive eight cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the district" (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 5. INASMUCH as the United Stewardship Fund is figured on a percentage basis, and it would be more practical and less confusing to figure all budgets in the same manner,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the district budget be raised on a percentage basis and that the said percentage be 4.8 percent of all receipts (excluding building costs, building dept retirement, interest, and major improvements).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the district budget shall be divided as follows: Administrative Fund 24 percent, Church Extension 26 percent, Camp Maintenance 17.4 percent, Camp and Conference Fund 4.3 percent, Ministerial Relief 6.7 percent, Youth Department 4.3 percent, Sunday School Department 4.3 percent, Owosso College 8.7 percent, and International Conference Fund 4.3 percent.

RESOLUTION NO. 4. RESOLVED, The place of the annual session of the district conference shall be determined by the District Board of Administration. (473.11) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 5. RESOLVED, The district fiscal year shall be the same as in the past, i. e., July 1 to June 30. (473.19) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 6. RESOLVED, The District Board of Trustees shall consist of three members. (473.23) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 7. RESOLVED, The District Board of Ministerial Standing shall consist of the assistant district superintendent as chairman and 5 members, including 1 layman. (532) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 8. RESOLVED, The District Board of Administration shall employ an accountant for auditing all district treasurers' books. (521) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 9. RESOLVED, The District Board of Administration shall act as a District Building Committee. (523) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 10. RESOLVED, The District Statistical Committee shall be appointed by the District Board of Administration. (525) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 11. RESOLVED, The following members of the present Educational and Examining Boards shall be appointed to the new District Board of Ministerial Standing (532): J. H. Koteskey, 1971; Bertha Kienbaum, 1970; William H. Osborne, 1969; and A. C. Doehring, 1969.

(The chairman ruled that the present members should continue on this board. Inasmuch as Rev. William H. Osborne became a member of this board by his election as assistant district superintendent, another elder, Rev. Roy J. Rummage, was elected to the board.)

RESOLUTION NO. 12. RESOLVED, The number of members at large on the District Board of Missions and Evangelism (552) be two, one elder and one layman. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 13. RESOLVED, The duties of the District Director of Leadership Training (590) shall be delegated to the District Director of Christian Education. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 14. INASMUCH as the District Board of Christian Education automatically consists of seven ex-officio members (572).

BE IT RESOLVED, That no members at large shall be elected to this board. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 15. RESOLVED, The Camp Board shall be continued with the present officers and the District Board of Administration shall be authorized to appoint the third member. (473.21) (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 16. RESOLVED, The following district committees shall be continued and the District Board of Administration shall be authorized to appoint the committee members: Baptismal Service, Church Extension Loan Fund, Editing, Insurance, Memoirs, Ministerial Convention, Reception, and Statistical. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 17. RESOLVED, The District Board of Administration shall be anthorized to elect the officers of the Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society (563). The elected officers shall be authorized to arrange for a spring convention. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 18. RESOLVED, The Camp Board of Directors shall be continued with the present officers and the District Board of Administration shall be authorized to appoint the fourth and fifth members. (Adopted.)

The above resolutions were presented to the Conference as recommendations from the District Council.

COMITY COMMITTEE RESOLUTION

In order that, under God, we may more wisely use the talents and resources of The Wesleyan Church in the State of Michigan in the proclamation of salvation and scriptural holiness and in effectively pursuing a vigorous program of outreach through church extension and evangelism, we the members of the comity committee of The Wesleyan Church in Michigan present the following resolution:

WHEREAS the merging General Conference held at Anderson, Indiana, on June 26, 1968, has consummated the uniting of the former Pilgrim Holiness and the former Wesleyan Methodist churches into The Wesleyan Church, and

WHEREAS a readjustment of district boundaries would allow for the initiation of a greater program of outreach and a broadening of ministries, and,

WHEREAS the new Discipline provides for even greater cooperative ministries on a state-wide basis (see paragraph 428), and,

WHEREAS the comity committee, under the supervision of a general superintendent, consisting of twenty members (five from each former Pilgrim Holiness district and five from each of the former Wesleyan Methodist conferences) has studied in depth various geographical alignments as well as various economic and cultural factors and has evaluated all of the churches of each district on this basis;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that realignment of the State of Michigan of The Wesleyan Church into three districts be implemented during the calendar year of 1969, the exact dates to be established by the joint boards of administration of the districts involved, and that said alignment be as follows:

THE East Michigan District shall comprise all that part of the State of Michigan east of the following boundaries: Starting from the north-west corner of Tuscola County, thence south to the north boundary of Genesee County, thence west following the Genesee County line to the north west corner of Genesee County, thence south to the north boundary of Livingston County, thence west along the Livingston County line to the north west corner of Livingston County, thence south to the northern boundary of Lenawee County, thence west to U.S. Route 127, thence south to the Ohio border and including Williams, Fulton, and Lucas counties in the State of Ohio.

The West Michigan District shall comprise all that part of the State of Michigan not included in the East Michigan District and south of a line starting from the north west corner of Ottawa County, thence running due east to the west boundary of Shiawassee County, thence north to the north west corner of Shiawassee County, thence east to the north west corner of Genesee County.

The North Michigan District shall comprise all that part of Michigan not included in the East Michigan District and the West Michigan District.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Administration be and hereby is authorized to act in behalf of the conference in the implementation of all details of said redistricting including the securing of legal advice in technical matters.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the General Board of Administration be petitioned to allow for such redistricting.

(Resolution lost, 35 to 96.)

IN MEMORIAM REV. MRS. LYDIA BRIGGS Rev. Mrs. Lydia Briggs was born April 8, 1879, in Waterloo, Ontario, the daughter of Jacob L. and Nancy Ernst Miller. Upon moving to Michigan she attended school at Mancelona. On Dec-ember 26, 1911, she was married to Arthur E. Briggs in Ovid. An ordained minister in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Mrs. Briggs lived in the Ovid and Elsie areas for two years before moving to Houghton Lake. She was a charter member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Houghton Lake. Following a long illness, Mrs. Briggs died March 12, 1968, at Good Samaritan Hospital in Phoenix, Arizona. DISTRICT YOUTH SOCIETY STANDING RULES Annual Conference

NO. 1 – CONFERENCE DATE

The district youth conference shall be held on Saturday morning of the youth convention and shall convene at 9 a.m.

NO. 2 – CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first ten rows of the center section and the platform area of the tabernacle shall constitute the conference bar.

The hours for conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. until finished.

NO. 3 – DELEGATES TO CONFERENCE

Only duly elected delegates of the youth society shall be seated in the conference bar. Only the vice president can be seated in the president's place.

NO. 4 – REPORTS TO CONFERENCE

Reports to the conference shall be given by the district youth president, the district youth treasurer, and each zone president.

FINANCE

NO. 5 – FINANCIAL PROGRAM

The local youth society treasurer shall send 30% of the total offerings to the district youth treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month. One-sixth of this money shall be sent to the General Department of Youth. The district youth treasurer shall send quarterly 40% of the remainder received from the local youth treasurer to the zone youth treasurer.

NO. 6 - SALARIES

The annual salaries for district youth officers shall be as follows: president, \$250; secretary, \$75; treasurer, \$100.

NO. 7 - MILEAGE

The members of the executive committee shall receive eight cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district work.

The zone presidents shall be paid a minimum of four cents per mile for travel to and from zone rallies.

The zone shall pay one-half of the mileage traveled by the zone president to all district youth council business meetings.

NO. 8 – FINANCIAL REPORT

The district youth treasurer shall send a quarterly financial report to the district youth president and the district superintendent.

NO. 9 - CONFERENCE AND CONVENTION FEES

Each local society sending a president and duly appointed delegate to the youth conference and/or convention shall be required to pay a \$3 registration fee for each person sent. It is recommended that each local society offer to pay the expenses to and from the conference for each delegate.

All youth, ages 12 through 20, shall be entertained free Friday through Saturday during the youth convention upon payment of a \$3 registration fee. The fee for the total camp meeting will be \$20 with minimum of work, or \$10 part time work. The rate for single days will be \$3. Young people who have completed high school or are 18 years of age, who choose to pay full current rates for rooms and meals, will not be required to register in the youth program at the annual district camp meeting.

No. 10 EDITING OF MINUTES

The district youth conference minutes shall be edited by the youth. The district youth secretary shall serve as chairman of an editing committee composed of three or more additional members to be appointed by the district youth president. The youth conference minutes shall be placed in the conference journal in a portion set aside for this purpose.

No. 11 LIST OF PRESIDENTS

A list of the names and addresses of the local youth society presidents shall be published in the conference journal. Where there is no organized or chartered society the pastor shall submit the name and address of the local leader

YOUTH CAMPS

No. 12 JUNIOR AND SENIOR CAMPS

The facilities at Hopkins Camp shall be used for two separate youth camps consisting of two age groups. The senior youth camp shall be held in conjunction with the regular Hopkins Camp; the district Youth Council shall be in charge.

A Youth Camp Board consisting of the Youth Executive Council and the District CYC Director shall be formed for the purpose of planning and promoting the youth camps.

No. 13 ADVANCE REGISTRATION

A one dollar registration fee shall be sent with a youth camp registration card by each applicant to the district youth treasurer fifteen days prior to youth camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration.

No. 14 PURCHASING AGENTS

A committee composed of the district youth treasurer and one other member shall be appointed by the Youth Council as purchasing agents.

ZONE RULES

No. 15 RALLIES

There shall be at least six youth rallies held in each zone during the conference year. A schedule of rallies shall be sent to the district superintendent and the district youth president.

No. 16 ZONE OFFICERS

The officers of the zone shall be a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. Each one must be a member of The Wesleyan Church and a member of a local youth society. The pastors and youth presidents shall be active voting members of the business session.

No. 17 ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of all zone officers shall be held at the annual youth conference. (See District Standing Rule No. 56.)

No. 18 DUTIES OF ZONE OFFICERS

The duties of the zone officers shall be as listed below. President

- 1. Meet with the zone committee and plan dates in advance for zone rallies.
- 2. Send dates of zone rallies to the district youth president and to all pastors in the zone
- 3. Plan and promote all zone rallies.
- 4. Preside at all zone rallies
- 5. Give attention to financial matters of the zone.
- 6. Serve on the district youth council.
- 7. Cooperate in promoting the district and national youth program.
- 8. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
- 9. Give a report to the annual district youth conference.

Vice President

- 1. Serve on the zone committee.
- 2. Serve for one year as the zone president requests.

Treasurer

- 1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the zone committee.
- 2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
- 3. Send a treasurer's report at least twice a year to the zone pastors.
- 4. Serve on the zone committee.

Secretary

- 1.Keep minutes of all zone committee meetings.
- 2. Help the zone president with zone correspondence.
- 3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
- 4. Report each zone rally to the district youth president as soon as possible after each rally.

OTHER

No. 19 DISTRICT RALLY

A joint rally with all Wesleyan Youth of Michigan shall be held on the first Saturday of November at Owosso College. This rally shall be counted as a zone rally. The program shall be geared to all youth.

No. 20 PROMOTION COMMITTEE

A youth promotion committee shall be appointed by the youth council. This committee shall be responsible for the origination and distribution of materials for promotion of all district youth activities.

No. 21 ATTIRE

The conference recommends that action be taken not to allow any person to work during camp or conference wearing make-up, immodest forms of dress, or anything contrary to church standards as stated in the Manual.

YOUTH PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT CAMP

(STANDING RULE NO. 60 OF DISTRICT CONFERENCE)

1. A youth director shall be hired to organize, plan, and direct all activities of the youth (recreational, spiritual, and social) at the district camp. The director shall be contacted and appointed at least six months prior to the conference.

His duties shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for the registration of all youth.
- b. Assignment of sleeping quarters, squads, and work details.
- c. Plan and organize all recreational activities.
- d. Make available a list of all games and sheets to be signed by the youth for the area in which he wishes to participate.
- e. Appoint a counselor to oversee and direct each area of recreational activity.
- f. Responsibility for seeing that all youth participate in the required spiritual activities.
- g. Collect a health form from each young person and see that the forms are filed with the camp nurse.
- h. Handle all matters requiring discipline, along with the head counselor and, if need be, the district youth president.

II. Two head counselors shall be hired, one for boys and one for girls. These counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the youth director and shall give him complete co-operation.

The duties of the head counselors shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for the execution of all rules and regulations.
- b. Responsibility for morning and evening devotions.
- c. Supervision of the squad counselors in the execution of their duties and responsibilities.
- d. See that all youth are in service with the squad counselors during required periods.
- e. Check all sleeping quarters for lights out and quietness.
- f. Periodically check with squad counselors during recreational activities.
- g. May excuse any young person who is ill, or has a good reason, from an activity.
- h. Inspect sleeping quarters at designated time each day

III. A counselor shall be acquired for each squad. The squad counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the head counselor and the youth director.

The duties of the squad counselors shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for his or her squad at all times except during recreational periods.
- b. See that all work is done properly during work periods.
- c. Shall not leave the grounds without first notifying the head counselor and another person placed in charge of the squad.
- d. Sit in all required services in the area reserved for the youth.
- e. Check roll at all activities and see that every squad member is accounted for.
- f. See that sleeping quarters are kept clean, beds made, and ready for inspection at the designated time.
- g. Take bed check, see that every one is in bed, lights out, and maintain quietness. Any person missing or violating the rules shall be reported to the head counselor.
- IV. The squads shall be no larger than fifteen persons.

V. The camp fee for youth shall be set by the district youth council, to be approved by the District Council. The registration fee is to be included in this amount. One dollar of the set fee is to paid to the district youth treasurer.

VI. The camp board shall submit a list of the work details expected to be done by the youth to the youth director and/or the youth council four weeks prior to the conference.

VII. Camp staff applications, evaluation forms, and the camper evaluation forms shall be used.

YOUTH CONFERENCE FIRST SITTING August 3, 1968

The first sitting of the first annual conference of the Michigan District Wesleyan Youth convened at 9 a.m., August 3, 1968, at the district camp grounds, Hopkins, Michigan. Rev. E. L. Downey, youth president, called the meeting to order.

Rev. A. J. Ranson, pastor at Scottville, led the conference in the singing of "I Will Sing The Wondrous Story," with Mrs. Ransom at the piano.

Prayer was requested for Mrs. John Coffey, who is to undergo surgery this morning. Rev. Merlin Goodrich, pastor at Muskegon First, led in prayer.

Rev. E. L. Downey then presented Rev. C. M. Marshall as the presiding officer.

For a devotional period, Rev. Marshall spoke from II Cor. 6:2 on the subject, "The NOW Gospel." He presented three questions of interest: What causes youth to drop out of youth meetings? How can we prevent our youth from dropping out? Do those that drop out often return? He closed with the challenge that "NOW is the time to evangelize our generation."

Rev. Aaron Rummage, secretary, called the roll.

After the establishing of the conference bar, the next business on the agenda was the report of Rev. E. L. Downey.

In his report, Rev. Downey submitted his resignation as district youth president, but pledged his full support in all aspects of the youth department.

A motion carried that a rising vote of appreciation be given to Rev. Downey for his report, and also to express appreciation for his fine leadership as youth president.

The district youth secretary, Rev. Aaron Rummage, reported that the auditor's report for the treasurer's books was in transit from the Hungerford Incorporation and had not arrived.

A motion prevailed that the new Youth Council be given permission to approve the auditor's report.

Rev. A. J. Ranson, youth treasurer, reported. A motion carried to receive this report.

The following zone presidents reported:

Rev. Donald Lichty from the North Central Zone

Rev. David Leamon from the Capital Zone

Rev. Bernard Churchill from the Fruitful Zone

Rev. Ronald Diehl from the Western Pioneer Zone

Rev. David Cheyne from the Northern Light Zone

A motion was carried to accept these good reports.

The following churches reported, regarding the activities of their local youth societies: Sterling, Lansing Trinity, Owosso, Frankfort, Lansing Grace, Almira, Ithaca, Kalamazoo, Rockford, Burnips, Merrill, Berkley Hills, Muskegon I, Coleman and Alma. These reports were received by a vote of gratitude to the representatives of the various churches. Rev. E. B. Woirol reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1. regarding Standing Rule 15 on Page 43 of the Journal, was adopted.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the amendment of Standing Rule 17 on Page 44 of the 1967 Journal, was adopted.

Resolution No. 3, regarding the song, "Forward Ever," was adopted.

Resolution No. 4, regarding placing Resolution No. 1 on page 50 of the 1967 Journal in the Standing Rules, was adopted.

Resolution No. 5, regarding placing Resolution No. 2 on Page 50 and 51 of the 1967 Journal in the Standing Rules, was amended to read that the Youth Council shall be authorized to set the appropriate dates. The resolution was adopted as amended.

Resolution No. 6, regarding the senior youth camps, was lost.

A motion carried to delete Resolution No. 3 on page 51 from the Conference Journal.

After several announcements, the Conference was dismissed in prayer by Rev. William Kinnan, pasttor at Lansing Trinity Church.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference was called to order at 1:30 p.m. at the call of Rev. E. L. Downey, youth president.

Rev. Al Ransom led in the singing of "He Abides" with Mrs. Ransom at the piano.

Rev. Ronald G. Diehl, pastor at Berkley Hills, led in prayer.

For the devotional period, five youth gave a word of testimony, after which the minutes of the first sitting were read by Rev. Aaron Rummage, secretary. The minutes were approved.

Rev. A. J. Ransom reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding Resolution No. 2, page 51, was amended to read "12 through 20." It was adopted as amended.

Rev. E. L. Downey, appointed the following tellers for the election of officers: Rev. E. Woirol, head teller; Rev. R. Workman, recording teller; Rev. W. Kinnan, Rev. L. Orcena, Rev. D. Tabler, Rev. David Cheyne, Rev. D. Knight, Rev. R. Tripp, Rev. N. Kessler, Rev. L. Strait, Rev. D. Brugger, and Rev. D. Kessler.

Ballots were cast and the following officers were elected:

President: Rev. Ed Woirol

Vice President: Rev. Merlin Goodrich

Secretary: Rev. Aaron Rummage

Treasurer: Rev. Dale Kessler

As ballots were beng counted, Rev. E. L. Downey presented a short resume of the organization of the youth society under the new Discipline. A question and answer period followed.

A motion was made that the district youth organization be brought into alignment with the Discipline immediately. (Ages 13-30 on the district level, with 4 zone rallies, etc.) Carried. The conference then divided into groups in order to elect their respective zone leaders for the coming year. The following were elected:

A motion carried to approve these elections.

The presiding officer, Rev. C. M. Marshall, stated that Cheboygan is contemplating going into the Northern Light Zone, inasmuch as it is located in the northern area of the state.

The new youth president, Rev. Edwin B. Woirol, appointed new committees for the coming year. A motion carred to approve these appointments.

The motion carried to authorize the District Youth Council to approve the minutes of the last session.

A motion carried to authorize the District Youth Council to take care of any unfinished business.

Rev. Edwin B. Woirol reported for the Resolutions Committee. The following resolutions were presented and adopted by motion.

Resolution No. 7. BE IT RESOLVED, That the presiding officer, Rev. Clyde M. Marshall, be given a rising vote of thanks.

Resolution No. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That Youth President Rev. E. L. Downey be given a rising vote of thanks for his fine leadership in the past.

Resolution No. 9. BE IT RESOLVED, That Mrs. E. L. Downey be given a rising vote of thanks for her efficient secretarial help.

Following announcements the Conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. H. Koteskey.

YOUTH RALLY AT OWOSSO

The combined Michigan and East Michigan District Youth Rally at Owosso was a great success, with a fine attendance of approximately 750 per scrvice. This was a highlight for our Michigan District youth, and already we are looking forward to another such rally. A committee from our diistrict and committees from the East Michigan and the two former Wesleyan Methodist districts met in Owosso recently and laid plans for the next All-State Youth Rally at Owosso on November 2. With all four districts participating, our committees are anticipating an attendance of between 1500 and 2000. Mark this date down, and plan to attend.

YOUTH CAMPS

Our youth camps are now hstory, but I trust precious seed was sown in these young hearts that will bring forth much fruit in years to come. There were two camps this year, but with lower age limits. Rev. Ed Woirol, pastor at Ithaca, directed the junior camp for ages 9-12, and he did a very commendable job. There were 138 junior campers. I conducted the senior camp for ages 13-15, and there were 80 campers. I appreciated the cooperation of each camper, as we had no discipline problems; just two weeks of real Christian fun and fellowship. Also, there was a fine spirit of co-operation among both pastors and laymen in the securing of counselors and workers. There were 30 campers and 18 adult workers from the Ithaca church at the junior camp. This is a wonderful response from the Ithaca church, and I commend them and their pastor, Rev. Woirol.

YOUTH PROJECT

Our project this year was to build a basketball court for youth activities and also to make the old dining hall into a girl's dormitory. The churches donated \$962.13 toward this project, and I sincerely appreciate your response.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is my very sincere desire that Hopkins Camp Grounds will be kept as our youth camp grounds, to be developed for all the districts' use on a full summer and winter schedule. I have talked with the two former Wesleyan Methodist Youth leaders and also with the East Michigan youth president, and they are in complete agreement. We have facilities and grounds for just about any program that youth would want to sponsor.

PERSONAL COMMENTS

I wish again to thank all of you who have so kindly co-operated with the activities of our youth department. I especially praise God for His help in the past years of my service to our youth. I have learned much, enjoyed much, and feel that it has been a deep personal privilege to be in the service of the youth of our church. May God richly bless all of our young in the coming years.

As I resign this year as youth president, I want to pledge my full support to our new leader. I will do my best to co-operate with him in any way possible. I pray and trust that in many other capacities I might continue to serve the youth of our church. God bless you all. Let us remember, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us... Jesus Christ the same yesterday, today, and forever." Praise His Name.

RESOLUTION NO. 1. WHEREAS the zone president and the zone treasurer are elected at the annual youth conference,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 15 on page 43 of the 1967 Conference Journal be amended to read, "The election of all other zone officers shall be held at the annual youth conference." (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 2. WHEREAS there are now two former Wesleyan Methodist districts included in our involvement of youth, and WHEREAS we want them to be a part of us,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 17 on page 44 of the 1967 Conference Journal be made to read, "A joint rally with all Wesleyan Youth of Michigan shall be held on the first Saturday of November at Owosso College. This rally shall be counted as a zone rally. The program shall be geared to all youth." (Adopted.) RESOLUTION NO. 3. WHEREAS the song "Forward Ever" is not used by our youth,

BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 19 on Page 44 of the 1967 Conference Journal be deleted. (Adopted.)

RESOLUTION NO. 4. WHEREAS there has been considerable difficulty in contacting proper government authorities and officers in government food programs and food buying,

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

RESOLUTION NO. 1

BE IT RESOLVED that Resolution No. 2 on page 51 of the 1967 Conference Journal be placed in the standing rules and amended to read as follows:

Each local society sending a president and duly appointed delegate to the youth conference and/or convention shall be required to pay \$3 registration fee for each person sent. It is recommended that each local society offer to pay the expenses to and from the conference for each delegate.

All youth, ages 12 through 20, shall be entertained free Friday through Saturday during the youth convention upon payment of a \$3 registration fee. The fee for the total camp meeting will be \$20 with minimum of work, or \$10 part time work. The rate for single days will be \$3. Young people who have completed high school or are 18 years of age, who choose to pay full current rates for rooms and meals, will not be required to register in the youth program at the annual district camp meeting.
