# JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS 

## Indiana Conference

## FIRST SITTING

The forty-eighth session of the Indiana Conference convened at Frankfort, Indiana, at 9:10 A. M. August 20, 1951. Rev. R. W. Ives led in singing "Revive Us Again." Rev. Russell Wooten led in prayer. Rev. Beitha Schoeff read the scripture lesson from Proverbs 22:1, and Ecc. 7:1-8. Rev. R. W. Ives sang a special song, "I Have Found a Hiding Place."

Rev. Floyd Goins introduced Rev. L. W. Sturk, the General Superintendent, and the conference stood to its feet in appreciation of Rev. Sturk's presence.

Rev. Sturk addressed the conference on, "Kindling Revival Fires." He stressed the need of the revival of holiness preaching in the Pilgrim Holiness churches.

Rev. G. C. Middleton gave a brief resume of the early days of the church, then sang "Amazing Grace."

The secretary, Rev. Carl R. Reed, called the roll.
Motion prevailed that the hours of the Conference session be the same as last year: 8:30 A. M. to 11:30 A. M.; 1:30 P. M. to 4:30 P. M. and from 7:00 P. M. to 9:00 P. M.

Rev. Floyd Goins, Superintendent of the Northern District, read his report, which was accepted.

Motion prevailed to seat Zulah Fergason as the delegate from the Vevay church.

Motion prevailed to seat Rosa McVay as delegate from the LaGrange church.

Motion prevailed to seat Harold Colen as delegate from the Rising Sun church.

The conference recessed by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. R. K. Storey.

## SECOND SITTING

The second sitting opened with Rev. C. J. Adams leading the conference in singing "Where He Leads I'll Follow." Rev. Robert Addington read the 13th chapter of First Corinthians as a scripture lesson. Rev. O. D. Williams led in prayer.

A motion prevailed to dispense with the roll call for the remainder of the conference.

The minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.
Rev. Ralph Nibarger, Superintendent of the Central District, read his report. A motion to accept it carried.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted.
The report of the Conference Treasurer was read and accepted.
The report of the Young People's Treasurer was read and accepted.
The report of the Conference Statistician was read and accepted.

Rev. Melvin Snyder, Superintendent of the Southern District, read his, report. A motion carried to accept the report.

The report of the Camp Meeting Treasurer was read and accepted.
The report of the Frankfort Pilgrim College was read and accepted.
The report of the Sunday School Committee was read and accepted. Awards and certificates were given by the committee to the delegates of the churches showing the highest gain in Sunday School membership, and to the schools having reached the "Four-star program" standards.

By common consent it was agreed to call in all committees.
Rev. and Mrs. Jason Felter and Rev. R. W. Ives were introduced to the conference, and each gave a brief testimony. A motion prevailed to give these visitors an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The conference recessed for five minutes and was then called to order by the chairman.

The Examining Board gave a partial report, which was accepted.
By common consent, permission was granted Rev. Goins to insert in his report the item concerning the new parsonage at Monon.

The Secretary read the resolution submitted by the Committee on Division.

A motion made and seconded to rescind the action of last conference concerning division into three separate districts.

A motion prevailed to hear a report of the financial status and membership of the proposed two districts. Rev. Locke gave this report.

A motion prevailed to extend the time until 5:00 P. M.
A motion prevailed to extend the time until 5:20 P. M.
A motion prevailed to adjourn at once.
A motion prevailed to reconvene at 6:30 P. M.

## THIRD SITTING

The third sitting opened with Brother Harvey Best leading the conference in singing "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder." Rev. James Hertel led in prayer. Rev. E. W. Wright read as a scripture lesson Romans 5:1-12, and then read one of his own poems, "Jesus Took The Blame." Brother and Sister Harvey Best sang "Traveling on the Narrow Road."

The minutes of the second sitting were read and approved.
A motion prevailed to vote by ballot when voting on rescinding the action of last conference on division.

The previous question was called and carried.
The following tellers were appointed by the Superintendents: Southern District, Rev. Noel Taylor and Rev. Dennis Barber; Central District, Rev. T. J. Preusz and Rev. Ralph Conner: Northern District, Rev. Russell Wooten and Rev. Robert Addington.

The ballots were cast on the motion to rescind.
The following visitors were introduced to the conference and each gave a brief testimony: Rev. G. G. Beckwith, Mrs. Moreland Yundt, Rev. Forest Adams, Rev. Mrs. Hobart Whittinghill, Rev. Harry Black and Miss Eileen Baker.

The conference was favored with a solo, "Stand By Me," by Rev. L. W. Sturk.

The report of the tellers showed 195 in favor of rescinding and 140 against rescinding.

The motion to rescind the action of last conference was lost.
The conference recessed until the call of the chairman.
At 9:00 P. M. the conference was called to order by the chairman.
A motion prevailed to extend the time until 10:00 P. M.
Rev. A. L. Luttrell led in special prayer for Rev. Floyd Hadsell.
The Examining Board gave a report. A motion prevailed to accept this report.

A motion prevailed to set the time for the ordination service at 8:30 A. M. Wednesday.

The secretary read the report of the committee on division.
A motion prevailed to divide this report into paragraphs and consider it paragraph by paragraph.

A motion prevailed to adjourn.
Rev. R. E. Nibarger dismissed with prayer.

## FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting opened with Rev. Clarence Keith in charge of devotions. Rev. Elton Call led the conference in singing "His Way With Thee." Rev. M. D. James read the third chapter of James as a scripture lesson. The conference knelt in silent prayer for a few moments, after which Rev. Clarence Keith led in prayer. All joined in singing "Glory To His Name."

The minutes of the third sitting were read and approved.
A motion made and seconded to reconsider the action taken last night and bring the matter of rescinding the action of division by the 1950 conference before the conference again.

The count showed 184 for reconsidering and 65 against reconsidering. The motion carried.

The conference secretary read the motion of rescinding the action of the 1950 conference.

The conference knelt for prayer before voting.
The count showed 274 for rescinding and 26 against. The motion carried.
A motion made and seconded that the conference divide into three districts.

A motion made and seconded to amend by deleting the words "three districts," and by inserting the words "two or more districts." the motion to amend carried.

The previous question was called and carried by a two-thirds vote.
A motion made and seconded that the vote be taken by standing.
A substitute motion made and seconded to vote by secret ballot. The count showed 131 in favor and 172 against secret ballot. The substitute motion was lost.

The motion carried to vote by standing.
A motion prevailed to extend the time until 12:00 noon.
The amended motion to divide carried. Count showed 327 in favor of division and 6 against.

A motion made and seconded that the conference be divided into two separate districts. The motion carried, the count showing 229 in favor and 99 against.

A motion prevailed to continue the 24 man committee on division.
The Examining Board gave a report. A motion prevailed to accept the report.

A motion prevailed to adjourn.
Rev. L. W. Sturk dismissed with prayer.

## FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting opened with Rev. Walter Daugherty in charge of devotions. Rev. Kenneth Greves led in singing "Where He Leads I'll Follow," and "Love Lifted Me." Mrs. Joseph Miller sang "I Will Pilot Three." Rev. Walter Daugherty read the following scriptures, Ehp. 5.8, 4:1, 5:1-2, 5:15-16. Rev. F. B. Dunn led in prayer.

The minutes of the fourth sitting were read and approved.
The secretary read the report of the committee on division.
A motion prevailed to adopt the recommendation of the committee.
A motion prevailed to consider the report paragraph by paragraph.
A motion prevailed to adopt the paragraph under Division.
A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph one under Disposition of Conference Property.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph two under Disposition of Conference Property.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph one under Transfer of Property.
By common consent it was agreed to insert in paragraph one under Transfer of Property, that Quit-claims be given to local church trustees if needed.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph two under Transfers of Property.
A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph one under Disposition of Existing Funds.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph two under Disposition of Existing Funds.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph one under Existing Financial Obligations.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph two under Existing Financial Obligations.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph one under Continuation of Projects.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph two under Continuation of Projects.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph one under Joint Government.
A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph two under Joint Government.
A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph three under Joint Government.
A motion prevailed to amend paragraph four under Joint Government to read, "All the property incident to camp meeting purposes shall be under the immediate jurisdiction of the camp meeting board, and all property incident to school use shall be under the administration of the Board of Trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph four as amended.
A motion prevailed to adopt paragraph one under Consummation of the Division.

A motion made and seconded that all proceeds from rooms during the camp meeting be given to the camp meeting board. This motion carried.

The Educational Board report was read and accepted.
Rev. Floyd Goins presented the following new churches to the conference: Crawfordsville, Rev. F. B. Dunn, pastor; Anderson Northside, Rev. Melvin Shafer, pastor; LaPorte, Rev. William Babb, pastor; Upland, Rev. Carl Sager, pastor.

A motion prevailed to accept these new churches, and the delegates where seated within the conference bar.

A count was taken of the delegates from the districts, which showed 172 from the Northern District, and 153 from the Southern District. The Northern District was to remain in the tabernacle and the Southern District to meet in the chapel.

The conference was reseated according to the districts for the purpose of voting for the District Superintendents.

## ANNUAL REPORTS

## SUPERINTENDENT OF THE NORTHERN DISTRICT

To the 48th Annual Session of the Indiana Conference, I submit the following report:

It is with keen sense of my inability that I have served the Northern Indiana District another year. This has been a strenuous year, however, it has been a most joyous one.

The strain has come because of increased activity. I have put more miles on my car than in any previous year. I have spent considerable time with the Home Missionary projects or in quest of prospective openings. The concern and responsibility for the Old People's Home has been greater due to an unusual amount of sickness. Then, too, two inmates of the Home unfortunately sustained broken hips. Another contributing factor has been the unusual amount of pastoral changing and the difficulty of churches in choosing pastors.

In addition to all this there has been the concern with the twenty-four man committee to bring proper recommendations to this conference in keeping with the action of the last annual conference as well as the action of the General Executive Committee.

THE CHURCHES. God's blessing has rested upon the churches. Some of the revivals have been outstanding and 87 new members have been received
into the churches. With the members of the new churches organized this year, this makes us a net gain in membership of 171 or $11 \%$.

Most of the churches have done well in supporting all departments of the church. I feel perhaps that some could have done better, yet the churches have given more than in any previous year to the support of the departments of the church. Several of the pastors have received substantial increases in salary.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS. Our District has shown but little gain, 74 to be exact. Part of this is due to the extreme weather conditions but perhaps mostly due to the relaxing of effort on the part of pastor and people. We should pledge anew our efforts to extend this arm of the church and build a spiritual and agressive Sunday School. The goal set by the general church has been a $10 \%$ increase in average attendance each year. This should be and can be accomplished if each of us catch the spirit and do our best.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS. Logansport is building a beautiful church to cost approximately $\$ 50,000$. This church plant has been a pressing need for years. For several years the church has had an average Sunday School attendance of over 200 but was unable to go higher due to lack of facilities. Rev. William R. Phillips, after serving the church for one year, was forced to resign because of ill health.

MUNCIE. The new church at Muncie is nearing completion. Under the leadership of Rev. Angus Jeffers, they have been raising money for several years. This new church will give a new grip on the community and I predict great things for the Muncie Church.

FRANKFORT, EAST SIDE. Under the leadership of John Stewart, the East Side is lengthening its cords and strengthening its stakes. A partial basement is being completed and an addition being built on the church. A new heating plant is being installed.

MONON. A new, 6 -room, fully modern parsonage has been constructed under the supervision of Rev. Estel Eckart.

LaGRANGE. At LaGrange a new parsonage has been purchased and Rev. Oscar Felsburg is busily engaged in remodelling it. Much of the material to complete the erection of the new church has also been purchased.

MICHIGANTOWN. The aggressive Pilgrims at Michigantown are building again. They are enlarging and modernizing the parsonage. Rev. Vard Van Briggle is the Pastor.

RADIO PROGRAM. It was my happy privilege to carry on a Radio Program most of the year over WCBC. It was carried on by free will offerings, and we feel was very profitable in furthering our Home Missionary work. We feel it would be well for the District to make some provision for this type of ministry.

HOME MISSIONARY WORK. It has been my happy privilege to organize four new churches this year. They will be presented to this conference for formal acceptance.

CRAWFORDSVILLE. Following the last conference I went to Crawfordsville with Bro. Floyd Dunn for a revival meeting in our rented building. At the close of this meeting we organized and have 27 charter members. Rev. Dunn was God's man for the place. They have purchased a $\$ 12,000.00$ property which will provide a parsonage and a nice chapel with Sunday School rooms. They have voted to pay Bro. Dunn $\$ 60.00$ a week. They have informed me that the offerings have averaged $\$ 181.00$ each Sunday the past year.

LaPORTE. Following the Crawfordsville revival I held a revival meeting in the newly acquired property at LaPorte where Rev. Wm. Babb had been installed as pastor. Here we organized and have 19 charter members. The Sunday School has averaged 54 for the last 12 months.

ANDERSON. Shortly after last Camp the First Church at Anderson assisted me in a tent meeting on the Eastside of Anderson. This failed to materialize into a church. However, the First Church has purchased a beautiful lot on the Southside where we hope to be able to build a church. Also, we have an option on buying a church on the Westside and the First Church has agreed to pay one-half of the down payment. If we can find the right man, we will endeavor to step into this open door.

THE NORTH ANDERSON GOSPEL TABERNACLE. The North Anderson Gospel Tabernacle voted to unite with us and we organized there with 21 members. This is a talented group. Rev. and Mrs. Melvin Shafer, the pastors, are fine young people.

UPLAND. We recently organized at Upland with 17 members. Rev. Carl Sager, the pastor, has the burden for a new church on his heart. A lot has been purchased and plans are being made for the erection of a church.

We have opened a chapel in Burlington where three young men from the Forest Church are holding services. Rev. Lewis Stroud has secured a large brick church near North Webster and is having gratifying results.

At this point, I am praying earnestly that God will direct us and that the Pilgrim Work in Indiana will continue to grow and develop. With interest I have noted that at the time I accepted my first pastorate, Indiana had 79 organized Pilgrim Holiness Churches.

Notwithstanding the fact that 13 of these were closed for one reason or another, we now have upwards of 150 churches. It has been my privilege during my seven years as a District Superintendent to organize 19 of these.

We stand, it seems, on the threshold of a new undertaking. Should this Conference accept the report of the committee on division, I trust as we have prayed and pulled together in the past that God will help us to knew His will and go forth to greater things in God.

I am grateful to God for the privilege of having worked with you. The fellowship is sweet and the concern deep. In my own District I have received wonderful co-operation. My assistant superintendent has been an earnest brother and kind counsellor.

PERSONAL ACTIVITIES. I have made 224 visits to churches, 21 of which were for Zone Rallies and 15 for Annual meetings. I have preached 229 times, made 16 business trips, attended the Ministerial meeting as well as all the Council, School Board, and General Board Meetings. I also attended the District and State Youth Conventions, the District Superintendents' meetings, and the meetings of Committee on Division. I held three Home Missionary revivals, two Camp meetings, and a short meeting at Logansport. In December with Rev. Ralph McCrory and Rev. G. R. Bateman, I went to Oklahoma to hold a Ministerial Convention for the General Superintendent.

## SUPERINTENDENT OF THE CENTRAL DISTRICT

It is with a deep sense of God's help that I present this report of the activities of the past year.

My heart is grateful to the Lord for His goodness and mercy which has followed me, and whose love has constrained me along the lines of my christian endeavor of duty to God and man.

In taking a retrospective view of this past year, I am confident that the Pilgrim Holiness Church has made excellent progress, also that the future is filled with many possibilities for winning the lost to Christ.

I certainly do appreciate the support of our faithful pastors and churches. May God bless them one and all.

Although unable to organize any new churches this year, I appreciate every effort put forth by our Zones and the people interested in Church extension work. Some tent meetings and revivals were held in this interest, giving us some bright hopes and pleasant contacts. We have one church nearly completed, which we had hoped to organize before Conference, but of necessity it will be organized later.

When I was called upon to serve our Conference in this office, I felt that our local churches should own their own places of worship and by God's help, new churches have been built and bought until every local congregation is now worshipping in its own property.

A new church has been built at New Castle. This church had worshipped in a basement-church for several years. Rev. O. W. Barnes has done an excellent work here.

Indianapolis Northside Church has installed several new Sunday School Rooms, under the faithful leadership of Rev. T. J. Preusz, and is now showing splendid gains.

Edinburg has enlarged its church once again, under the noble venture of faith and labors of the good pastor, Rev. Wilbur Russell.

Concord church, under the leadership of Rev. Gerald Leavell, has completely remodeled its church and has by God's help nearly paid off the entire cost.

Connersville has also remodeled its new church by building several new Sunday School rooms. Rev. Kenneth Greves is the pastor.

Parsonages have been built or bought at Aurora, Clarksburg, Richmond Eastside, and along with these, major improvements, many minor improvements have been made over the District. We are praising God for the splendid labors of our pastors and churches.

I hereby wish to report, that by God's help and Providence I have made approximately 150 calls to churches, attended all Council meetings, Executive and school board meetings, District Youth rallies, Sunday School conventions, 17 Zone meetings, 32 annual elections and board meetings, and the General meeting of the District Superintendents. I have received my salary in full and $\$ 750.00$ towards traveling expense.

By God's help I feel I have done my best to faithfully serve my district in every channel possible and have discharged my obligations as outlined by our conference and church manual.

Our work from an administrative standpoint has afforded me many pleasant contacts which has proved a great blessing to me, and may God richly bless our churches.

Furthermore may I express my appreciation to my noble Assistant Superintendent, Rev. T. J. Preusz; and to Rev. F. J. Goins and Rev. M. H. Snyder, Superintendents of the Northern and Southern districts respectively.

## SUPERINTENDENT OF THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT

To the Forty-eighth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of Indiana, Greetings:

Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank my God always on your behalf, for the grace of God which is given you by Jesus Christ; that in everything ye are enriched by Him, in all utterance, and in all knowledge.

It is with a sense of deep gratefulness to God for His manifold mercies that I submit this annual report of the Southern District and a brief summary of my personal activities.

Need I remind you that the church has moved forward this year in the midst of a confused and troubled world which it seems is fast ripening for the great tribulation judgments? It was our privilege during the Christmas holidays to make a brief visit to twelve countries on three continents. Everywhere we traveled we found confusion and unrest. A sense of futility seems to grip the peoples of earth. War and fear have laid hold of the world's vitals like a malignant cancer threatening the temporal security of all people. The single exception to this picture is Israel. This land is full of jubilance and hope. They seem to sense that God is bringing them back to their home. Surely the coming of the Lord draweth nigh.

In view of these alarming conditions how necessary it is that this conference prayerfully seek Divine guidance for the coming year. We must do our best to reach the lost about us for the night soon cometh when no man can work.

MEMBERSHIP GAIN. According to the statistician's report the Southern District has made a $5 \%$ gain in membership during the past year. However, the Conference Sunday School Secretary's report shows a loss of nearly $41 / 2 \%$ in Sunday School attendance for the year. Some of the loss was occasioned by the severe winter. It does mean, however, that our efforts in this field of activity must be redoubled during the coming year to make up for these losses.

CHURCH EXTENSION. Four new home missionary projects have developed during the year.

The Rev. William Rollins of the West Terre Haute church felt burdened for a community some four miles from the local church. Under the supervision of the home church he purchased a house which was converted into a chapel. Here the work developed until now they are constructing a new church building. The footing for the foundation has already been poured.

The Rev. Frank Reed has been laboring for some time at Patoka. The home in which they have been worshipping has become far too small. Some weeks ago they purchased lots and set to work with a will. The new church is now nearing completion and will be dedicated after conference.

The Rev. Paul Fair has been pastoring a small group at Ashyer during recent months. They own their own church building and wish to organize a Pilgrim Holiness Church just as soon as the group is developed to that point.

The Rev. Fred Winkler of Bicknell has joined our church and the mission which he has been pastoring for some time has voted to unite with us. This group, as well as the Ashire group, was formerly associated with the Trinity Gospel Association.

While neither of the above mentioned projects have been organized as yet, some of them will be ready for organization shortly after this conference.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS. A lovcly new church building of tile and brick construction will soon be completed at Scottsburg where the Rev. and Mrs. Lester Smith have labored so sacrificially.

Rev. Stella Critchfield tells me that they will soon be in their new church auditorium at Cannelton. This building of concrete block construction will also provide a nice six room modern apartment when completed. Rev. Dennis Barber, pastor at French Lick, has helped extensively in the planning and construction of this building.

It was our privilege recently to dedicate the new church building of the Eastside church in Evansville. The other Pilgrim churches of the city have co-operated so beautifully in helping this new project that it appears it will not be long until the present indebtedness will be liquidated under the able supervision of the pastor, the Rev. Donald Rhoner.

The large church building started by the Rev. J. M. Burcham and the good people at Washington is nearing completion under the able supervision of their present pastor, the Rev. Oscar Miller. When completed this church measuring 50 by 90 will be one of the largest and most beautiful in the Conference.

At last the Orrville church, valued at $\$ 20,000.00$, is completed. Rev. Robert Martin, the pastor, has done a wonderful job in leading his people to victory in this project.

We must not leave out the large beautiful Forest Hills church in Evansville which was completed last conference year but was not dedicated until this year because of a hold-up on the delivery of the pews. Rev. Mark Storey and his good people planned one of the most beautiful dedication ceremonies I have ever witnessed.

IMPROVEMENTS. The interior of the Boonville church has been sealed and redecorated. A complete bath has been built in the Bicknell parsonage. The Mitchell and Shoals churches have completed rather extensive redecorating and improvment programs. The Oaktown church has built on additional Sunday School rooms.

NEW PARSONAGES. The Fort Branch church has purchased a new parsonage and the Jasonville church under the faithful labors of the pastor, the Rev. Harry Gray, has completed a five room apartment on the rear of the church. This project was started by the former pastor, the Rev. Plen Smith, who had to resign because of ill health. The Austin church has also purchased an eight room modern parsonage.

OUR LOSSES. The Southern District has lost three ministers this year. The Rev. Harry L. Holden who for years was active in the Apostolic Holiness Church and later came back to us with the organization of the Brazil church. Then the District sustained a great loss in the passing of two of our most faithful pastors, the Rev. Bonnie Bradfield of the Boonville church, and the Rev. Virgil Kelley, of the Sullivan church. The victorious passing of these soldiets of the cross should incite us all to persevere in this great business of holy living.

OUR PROSPECTS. It appears to me that we have reached a point in the life of our Conference which calls for a great step of venturing faith if we are to keep step with the Holy Ghost. Let us not draw back. Since we have voted for a division of the conference in order to better push out into the ripened harvest fields let us go forward under the banner of King Immanuel with a conqueror's tread. He who has led us this far will safely lead us home.

I appreciate the faithful labors and fellowship of my co-superintendents, Reverends Goins and Nibarger, also my able assistant, Rev. Mark Storey.

PERSONAL ACTIVITIES. I have made 158 calls on the churches, preached 206 times, held one revival, two camps, one ministerial convention, attended 11 Zone meetings, conducted 50 district broadcasts, made 24 business trips, attended two General Board meetings, one Pension board meeting, two school board meetings, and attended all Conference Council meetings. I have had one wedding, two funerals, and one baccalaureate service, and have given 24 illustrated lectures on my trip to the Holy Land. I have received my salary in full and have traveled approximately 50,000 miles.

## REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Sunday School Committee wishes to submit the following report to the 48th annual conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Indiana:

With the co-operation of the pastors and the three superintendents we are able to give you a $100 \%$ report.

The Sunday Schools got off to a good start with a gain in the September general Sunday School Rally. The report of the rally follows:

This gives a conference gain of 513 .
Sunday School conventions were held in the following churches: Shoals, Washington, Hulman St. (Terre Haute), Connersville, North Vernon, Westport, Nappanee, Marion, Kokomo First, Indianapolis First, and Muncie. Rev. P. F. Elliott, General Sunday School Secretary, was the guest speaker. His message on "The Church's Greatest Business" was greatly appreciated. The attendance was gratifying although it was hindered in the Central and Southern Districts by snow storms.

In our Sunday School there were 398 seeking regeneration and 65 seeking sanctification. The Northern District had 23 churches, the Central District had 18 churches and the Southern District had 24 churches which showed a gain in average attendance.

Our yearly average attendance follows:

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DIVISION

## DIVISION.

The line of division shall be State road No. 36 to the west of Indianapolis and State road No. 40 to the east of Indianapolis. All of Marion county shall be included in the Northern District.

## DISPOSITION OF CONFERENCE PROPERTY.

The conference property now held in trust by the trustees of the Indiana conference, namely: Frankfort Pilgrim College, The Old People's Home, the camp meeting property, and the eighty acre farm shall be held in trust for the two districts by a Board of Trustees of six, said Board shall be composed of the three trustees of the Northern District and the three trustees of the Southern District.

The conference trustees are hereby authorized to make the transfer of the conference property to the Board of six trustees.

At such time as the Southern District shall desire to start a camp meeting in the south, the eighty acre farm shall be sold and the proceeds of the sale given to the Southern District, and at the same time, the tract of land west of a line running north and south in front of the Clyde Titus cottage plot shall be deeded to the Northern District. Also at this time the camp meeting equipment, beds, bedding, etc. shall be divided equally between the two districts.

All rights of cottage leases shall be honored in the transfer of properties.

## TRANSFER OF PROPERTY HELD BY THE CONFERENCE TRUSTEES.

This conference shall authorize the conference trustees to give Quit-claim deeds to the trustees of the newly organized districts or to the trustees of the local church as the case may demand, for all properties now held by the conference trustees in these respective districts.

The plot of land known as the Trailer Court shall be deed to the Board of Trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

## DISPOSITION OF EXISTING FUNDS.

The money in the conference treasury as of September 1, 1951 shall be divided equally between the two districts.

The money resulting from the sale of the parsonage of the Central District and now held by the conference treasurer shall be divided one-third to the Northern District and two-thirds to the Southern District.

## EXISTING FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS.

The trustees of the new districts shall assume the financial obligations in their respective districts which are now held by the conference trustees.

The school debt of $\$ 14,500.00$ shall be assumed equally by the trustees of the Northern and the trustees of the Southern Districts.

CONTINUATION OF PROJECTS.
All commitments regarding Home missionary funds made by the present superintendents shall be honored by the councils of the new districts.

The same support shall be given to Frankfort Pilgrim College and the Old People's Home by both districts as has been the custom in previous years.

JOINT GOVERNMENT OF PROPERTIES AND ACTIVITIES.
The Old People's Home shall be governed by a board of six, composed of the trustees of the two districts. This board shall elect a chairman and a
treasurer from its membership. All money raised for the Old People's Home in the districts shall be sent to this treasurer by the treasurers of the two districts.

The camp meeting management and properties shall be under the control of a camp meeting board of sixteen members composed of the two district superintendents and seven members from each of the two districts. The members shall be appointed by the district councils of the two districts.

All rules and regulations of this camp meeting board shall be published in the annual Minutes of each district.

All property incident to camp meeting purposes shall be under the immediate jurisdiction of the camp meeting board and all property incident to school use shall be under the administration of the Board of Trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

All money received from the rent of dormitory rooms during the camp meeting shall go to the camp meeting board treasurer.

## APPOINTMENT OF NOMINEES

Inasmuch as at the time of division there will be no councils elected for either district the present conference council shall be authorized to make the nominations for the offices of district treasurer.

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

## Church Government

## 1.

Whereas many of our members are not familiar with the actions of the Conference, therefore

Be it resolved that the Pastor shall have a special meeting of his church at the earliest possible date, for the purpose of familiarizing his people with their responsibilities for the Conference year.
2.

We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on June 30 of each year.

Inasmuch as it is impossible for the local church to send Conference funds to the Conference Treasurer by June 30 , we recommend that the Treasurer hold his books open until July 15.
4.

We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone and if possible, other utilities also be furnished as recommended by the Local Church Board.
5.

We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating facilities, window shade, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings that provisions be made for the same by the Local Church.
6.

We recommend that where churches and parsonages are located in cities that the location of the church and parsonage appear in our Minutes. We further recommend if possible, that where parsonages are equipped with phones, that the name of the Pastor and Pilgrim Holiness Church be listed in the phone book.

## 7.

We recommend that no Local Church Board endorse for Conference license anyone who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's Word. We further recommend that the Examining Board pass no candidate for Conference license who fails to give evidence of a Divine Call to the ministry or a willingness to give full time to the same.
8.

Whereas, we have many able-bodied licensed and ordained ministers, who are employed in other than ministerial work, and seldom if ever preach, we recommend that the Examining Board be instructed to draw the lines closer on such individuals and that no one who is not active in the ministry be recommended for ordination.

We recommend that the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper be observed at least once each quarter by our local churches.
10.

We recommend that the Conference Council consist of 9 members comprised of the District Superintendent, the Assistant, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, 5 Advisory members from the District.
11.

Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees which has resulted in some poorly constructed buildings, therefore

Be it resolved that before constructing church buildings or parsonages that plans and specifications be approved by the conference council or by a committee appointed by same.
12.

We recommend that the time of voting of the church on its pastor be May 15 to 30.
13.

We recommend that the District Superintendent release no name of changing pastors until June 15, at which time a complete list of all available ministers be given to each church.
14.

Inasmuch as the Resolutions Committee has been approached with the matter of the use of lantern slides and motion pictures in our churches, therefore

Be it resolved that the Northern Indiana Conference go on record as opposed to the use of the same.
15.

We recommend that no person be recommended for ordination without having served two years in full time pastoral or evangelistic work.
16.

Whereas there are many of our churches that are failing to meet their financial requirements, therefore

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits his District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.
17.

We recommend that our District have a Ministerial Convention.
18.

We recommend the questionaire be continued for our licensed ministers, one copy to be given to the District Superintendent and one to be kept on file by the Examining Board.
19.

We recommend that the District Superintendent with his Assistant together with the Zone Chairmen shall be responsible for the promotion of Home Missionary Work.

## Sunday School

1. 

The duties of the Conference Sunday School Board in harmony with the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be as follows:

1. The Conference Sunday School Board, together with Zone Presidents and District Superintendent shall arrange for Sunday School Conven. tions to be held in respective Zones during the year.
2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the Conference.
3. To present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:
a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.
4. The Council shall direct the Conference Treasurer to take care of all expense incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.
5. The Conference Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the Council.
6. The Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the Conference Sunday School Board, who in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
7. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the Conference Sunday School Board, the Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.
8. The Conference Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Secretary in promoting the annual Rally Day, etc.
9. To have published each quarter a Conference Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School in the Conference for the quarter, this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the Conference.
10. We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer Vacation Bible School.

## Conference

1. 

We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to this entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during Camp Meeting.

We recommend that there be a Publishing Committee composed of the Conference Secretary and two appointee members. It shall be the duty of this committee to publish the Conference Minutes.
3.

We recommend that the Conference Council be responsible for providing needed help for the kitchen and dining room during Conference.
4.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary at his earliest convenience inform the Chairman of the various Boards and Committees of their respective duties.

We further recommend that within three months said Committee and Boards be required to formulate plans to meet the desires of this Conference.
5.

We recommend that caution be taken to not over-estimate the values of Church property in our Annual Reports.

We recommend that the Conference go on record as interpreting 1 Peter $3: 3$, where it speaks of the wearing of gold, to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

## 7.

We recommend that where a man is advertantly placed on more Boards and Committees than he can well serve that the Conference Council be authorized to make proper adjustment in such Committees.

## 8.

We recommend that upon the death of a Conference Minister or his wife, that the conference secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all conference pastors by telephone or telegraph.

## 9.

Whereas the Conference Council has considerable business to care for between conferences and such business is important and more or less unknown to the members of the Conference, therefore

Be it resolved that the Conference Secretary read in review to the assembled Conference the major actions of the Council during the preceeding year.
10.

We recommend that any Minister, who fails to get his annual report to the Conference Statistician by July 31st, shall be referred to the Examining Board.
11.

Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee therefore
Be it resolved that we have a brief memorial service instead of the morning Devotional Service on the second day of Conference.

We further recommend that the Conference Secretary gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a Questionaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each conference.
12.

We recommend that the dates of major activities of the Conference and School be in the hands of the Pastors by October 15, 1951.
13.

We recommend that all auditing material be brought to the Auditing Committee by the first Monday of the Camp Meeting.

## Zone Work

1. 

Inasmuch as the Zone Meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference, we recommend they be continued.

We further recommend that the Zone Chairmen be elected by secret ballot by the Ministers and lay delegates.
2.

Whereas as the need arises for the district to change its zone boundaries because of receiving new churches and distance, therefore be it resolved that there be a committee appointed by the District Superintendent to work out the rezoning of the district. The rezoning plan shall be ratified by the Conference.

## Educational and Examining Board

The Recommendations brought in regarding this work are printed under the report of the Educational Board at its request.

## Pastoral

1. 

We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks vacation with pay.

## 2.

We recommend that pastors of deceased members of our District Conference bring to the Committee on Memoirs a copy of the obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.
3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the District Superintendent.

## 4.

We recommend that each Pastor keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate in the vicinity of his pastorate and shall endeavor to secure the renewal of each subscription before the date of expiration, and shall secure as many subscriptions as the membership of his church.

## Young People

1. 

We recommend that the Young People's Executive Council, Young People's Zone Chairmen, and the District Superintendent make plans for the District Young People's rally.

## Miscellaneous

1. 

We recommend that immediately following the Conference the Secretary mail to each pastor an itemized postal notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year including general church assessments.
2.

We recommend that 600 copies of the Conference Minutes be provided within 30 days after the Conference adjourns. Each church must send in the money with its order.
3.

We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest day for the School. Such day shall be set aside for the various zones to bring in canned goods and produce for the School.
4.

We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee meet at the call of the Chairman of said committees prior to the next Annual Conference. The District Superintendents may also meet with these committees.
5.

Whereas Television programs are a definite hinderance to the spirituality of our people, bringing evil influence into the home

Be it resolved we go on record as opposing the same.

# REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE 

## Local Church Financial

## 1.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of $10 \%$ of all money raised by the local church, Sunday School and $5 \%$ from the Young People's Society, except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, and all funds raised for specified Conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and churches and money paid on contracts of the same.

We recommend that the Conference Budget be prorated as follows: Conference Fund, $60 \%$; Old Peoples Home, $5 \%$; Frankfort Pilgrim College, $17 \%$; Home Missions, $16 \%$; and General Conference, $2 \%$.
3.

We recommend that each church raise five cents per member per month for Home Missionary Work and Church Extension, money to be paid to the Conference Treasurer.
4.

We recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of $1 \%$ of the annual gross receipts of the local church treasury up to and including $\$ 3000.00$, and $2 \%$ for all churches with an annual income over $\$ 3000.00$. Said amount to be paid monthly through the Conference Treasury.

## District Financial

1. 

We recommend that our regular Conference stenographer be paid $\$ 30.00$ and that the Secretary be authorized to secure additional helpers at the rate of $\$ 20.00$ per person.
2.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of $\$ 75.00$ per week, plus mileage at the rate of four cents per mile not to exceed $\$ 1000.00$ for the Conference year.
3.

We recommend that our Assistant District Superintendent be paid at the rate of $\$ 10.00$ per day plus mileage for each days service, also telephone expense.
4.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary be paid $\$ 150.00$ for his services for the year.
5.

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be paid $\$ 300.00$ for his services for the year.
6.

We recommend that the Conference Statistician be paid $\$ 75.00$ for his services for the year.
7.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate be fixed at 4 cents per mile.
8.

We recommend that each church raise fifty cents per member per year for the operating expense of the Old Peoples Home.
9.

Inasmuch as the Pension Plan would entail considerable expense to make it fully operative in our District, we recommend that our District go on record as favoring the plan; We further recommend that the matter be left on a voluntary basis, both as to ministers becoming members and churches desiring to participate in the Pension Plan.
10.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be enrolled in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, if he desires.

## Young People's Work

1. 

We recommend that each Young People's Society be requested to send an offering for the Young People's Rally to the Conference Young People's Treasurer: also that Churches without organized Societies be invited to send an offering for same.

We further recommend that said offering be sent in at least 30 days prior to the Conference Young People's Rally.
2.

We recommend that each Young People's Society send ten per cent of all money raised in the regular offering to the Conference Young People's Treasurer to finance the work of the Conference Young People's Organization.

## THE REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL BOARD

We, the Educational Board of the Indiana Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, have examined 138 applicants for license and 16 recommendations which were sent in for absentees. We have tried to handle impartially each case in the sight and fear of God.

## Special Sections from the Manual

Section 210, paragraphs 2, 3, and 4:
Those entering a ministerial office shall immediately enter upon the prescribed course of study and pursue same until completed. To this end they shall place themselves under the direction of the District Educational Board, which has charge of this work, unless the same course, or its equivalent, is taken in school.

Examiniations required by the District Educational Board shall be submitted in writing and shall be conducted at the time and place of the annual conference or during the year upon completion of a book or subject, either personally or through the mails.

The passing grade of any study shall not be less than an average of 70 percent.

Section 154:
No person shall be eligible for ordination until first having served at least two years in active ministry.

Section 155:
The licentiate who has held his license at least three years, and has successfully completed the required course of study, shall be eligible for ordination as a minister of the Gospel, unless the district council will have deemed it wise to have ordained before the expiration of the three year period.

Section 149, paragraph 1 :
All licensed ministers failing to complete and report on at least two subjects a year in their required Course of Study, for two consecutive years, will automatically forfeit their licenses, unless in the judgment of the educational board an exception shall be made. The district council shall have power to review and pass upon such action when it deems advisable. (Section 109, paragraph 2.)

The following recommendations were brought in by the Resolutions Committee:

## 1.

We recommend that at each annual Camp Meeting on the last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, there shall be one daily session of the Educational and Examining Boards for the purpose of the examination of ministers. All
ministers knowing themselves due to appear before these boards are urged to be present.

We further recommend that the time of each session shall be announced from the platform.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

Whereas Almighty God has permitted us to enjoy another gracious and blessed camp, therefore, be it resolved that we express our appreciation to God by saying, "Praise the Lord."

Whereas our conference has enjoyed the very efficient and spiritual leadership of our General, The Rev. L. W. Sturk; therefore, be it resolved that we show our appreciation by saying "God bless you."

Whereas Rev. Ralph Nibarger has done such a noble work in supervising the construction of the new Buildings; therefore, be it resolved that the conference show its appreciation to him and his building committee by a rising vote of thanks.

Whereas the Frankfort Morning Times and the Lafayette Courier-Journal have been so courteous and considerate in giving the camp and conference publicity; therefore, be it resolved that the conference secretary be authorized to express the gratitude of the conference by letters of thanks.

Thanks have been extended to all the efficient camp meeting workers, but we wish to express our hearrfelt gratitude to those who have worked behind the scenes to make possible this great camp. Faithful workers toiled long and late in order to make preparations for the camp. Be it resolved that we express our appreciation by saying "Thank you."

Whereas God, in his inscrutable wisdom, took from our midst a veteran warrior of the cross, the Rev. Lee Goins, and whereas we do not wish to forget those who blazed spiritual trails before us; therefore be it resolved that we honor his memory by standing for a minute in silent meditation.

## REPORT OF THE CAMP MEETING BOARD

## 1.

Inasmuch as the State Fire Marshal has required that all wiring must meet the State Code, therefore

We recommend that all buildings on the Camp ground be wired accordingly and that the expense be prorated to the cottage owners.
2.

Any person accepted as a worker by the Camp committee shall be required to pay a registration fee for the camp meeting of $\$ 1.00$.

We recommend that conference ministers, their wives, and their dependent children be granted workers tickets for their meals during camp meeting.

We further recommend that those physically able be assigned their respective duties and all failing to fill their assignment shall have their workers tickets forfeited.
4.

We recommend that the camp meeting secretary issue no workers tickets to laymen except such as are authorized by the department superintendents.
5.

We recommend that the camp meeting board pass on all improvements or construction not entailing an expense of more than $\$ 1,000$.
6.

We recommend that the camp meeting begin on the second Friday of August each year.

We recommend that all bills for camp meeting purchases be given to the camp meeting treasurer at the close of the camp meeting.
8.

We recommend that all who rent rooms during the camp be advised to bring their own bedding.
9.

We recommend that no lease be bought or sold without the sanction of the proper agent signing the same and that a carbon copy of this contract be kept in the agent's file, the same to be the property of the camp meeting board.

We further recommend that no person be allowed to own two leases and that any person who buys a lease must build within three years or the camp board, at its discretion, may repossess the lot by refunding the purchase price.
10.

We recommend that water and sewer service be installed under the direction of the camp meeting board.
11.

We recommend that the camp meeting board appoint a committee to see that there are but two blue prints made; one showing the plumbing and sewer system, the other showing the wiring of the camp ground and buildings.
12.

Whereas there are new cottages being built and others being remodeled, And whereas there has been no set of rules formulated to govern the same, Therefore be it resolved that a committee of three, composed of the conference secretary, the electrician, and the plumber, formulate a set of rules governing the construction, plumbing, wiring, and remodeling of all privately owned cottages, trailers, etc.

We furcher recommend that a written permit must be secured from this committee before construction is started;

We further recommend that all cottage owners be notified of this recommendation and that anyone failing to meet the requirements shall be required to make the necessary changes or have their lease forfeited.
(Note-see item 17.)
We recommend that there shall be a fee for each house-car, car, or trailer which is on the camp ground for three months or more during the year, this fee shall be used for the maintenance of roads.

Whereas there is need of improved roads on the camp ground, we recommend a fee of $\$ 5.00$ be collected from all persons owning a car who live on the camp grounds for a period of three months or more during each conference year, said funds collected shall be used exclusively for the improving of the roads, and an equal amount shall be paid by the camp meeting treasurer for this purpose.
15.

We recommend that the camp meeting board appoint an inspector for the camp grounds and buildings. He shall make periodic inspections and shall have the authority to enforce such regulations as may be delegated him by the camp meeting board.

## 16.

Whereas there is a growing number of cottages being constructed upon the camp grounds, and whereas these cottages and buildings are helping to meet the housing needs of the school, and whereas our properties are part of a non-profit organization, and whereas there is the possibility that some are not aware of the limitations of such an organization and hereby may make charges for the use of cottages which are out of harmony with our organizarion; Therefore be it resolved that an appraisal committee be appointed by the camp board for the purpose of appraising the camp cottages and trailers, said appraisal to determine the maximum amount of remuneration to be received from the same during the school year.

## 17.

We recommend that the ground west of the tabernacle which has been designated for camp meeting purposes be sowed in grass, laid off in lots, and leases be sold for the lots.

We further recommend the following rules for construction.

## I. CONSTRUCTION

1. All cottages shall be of single story, standard $2 \times 4$ frame, tile, or block with 8 foot ceiling height. The roof shall be of gable or hip construction.
2. All cottages shall have a uniform front line, said line to be determined at the time the lots are laid out.
3. No cottage shall be built closer than 3 feet to either side line or to the rear line of the lot.
4. Written permission shall be obtained before any construction is started.
5. Trailers shall not be permitted on lots for permanent use.
II. PLUMBING
6. All plumbing shall conform to the local code and shall be inspected by a person authorized by the camp meeting board.

## III. ELECTRIC WIRING

1. All electric wiring shall conform to the National Code and to the rules of the local power company. No connections shall be made to any service line until permission is obtained for such connection from the person authorized by the camp board to grant such connection.
2. 

Whereas there is great difficulty in providing rooms for many who desire to attend the camp meeting, and,

Whereas there are some rooms vacant for many days of the camp meeting but which cannot be used because the room superintendent has not been notified as to the time of their occupancy,

Therefore be it resolved that each person having a deposit on a room notify the room superintendent by the first day of the camp meeting of the date of their arrival, and that the room superintendent shall have the right to rent out the room during the time it will not be occupied by the one making the deposit.

We further recommend that the room superintendent shall notify all persons who have deposits made, of the above recommendation and anyone who fails to comply with said recommendation shall forfeit the deposit and room.
