JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Twenty-Fourth Annual Conference of the Oklahoma and Texas District convened July 31, 1950, at Hopeton, Oklahoma.

The Conference was opened with an inspiring song service, led by Lyle Wayne Quinn. W. P. Haltom led in prayer.

Rev. D. R. Close, District Superintendent, introduced to the Conference our chairman, Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent of The Pilgrim Holiness.

Rev. Sturk gave a timely message on the subject of "The Call to Prayer and Church Evangelism."

The Secretary gave the roll call.

It was moved and seconded that the first four rows of seats on the north and south, and the first five seats in the center constitute the Conference bar. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that our time continue until 12. Recess for dinner, convene at 1 to 5, recess for supper, convene at 7. Carried.

The reception committee introduced to the Conference, Rev. Robert Heckart, president of Colorado Bible College, Colorado Springs, Colo., and Rev. and Mrs. L. C. Gray, pastors of the Newkirk church. Each gave a good testimony.

The District Superintendent gave a good report of his work on the district the past year, which was heartily accepted.

The Auditing Committee's report was given and accepted.

The District Treasurer gave his report. It was moved and seconded we accept it. Carried.

The District Secretary read the following note of appreciation: "Please accept my sincere thanks and appreciation to this District for the lovely flowers sent to me while in the hospital. God bless you. Mrs. D. R. Close."

The Assistant Superintendent gave a report of his work, which was accepted.

A report of the District Young Peoples Conference was given by Mary Darden, and accepted as printed in the District Minutes.

The Statistical Committee's report was given and accepted.

The Ways and Means Committee reported. The report was accepted as printed.

Adjourned by the expiration of time.

Second Sitting

The second sitting opened by singing, and prayer by Walter Quinn. Minutes of the last sitting were read and approved.

The Resolutions Committee's report was given and accepted as printed.

Mrs. D. R. Close, president of the District W. F. M. S., reported of the progress of the work over the past year. Moved and seconded to accept the report. Carried.

Moved and seconded the election of officers be the order of the day. Carried.

Rev. D. R. Close was re-elected as District Superintendent.

Rev. J. F. Wilson was elected as Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. E. V. League was elected as District Secretary.

Rev. E. C. Gafford was elected as District Treasurer.

Rev. L. C. Hiles, W. P. Haltom and M. G. Nelson were elected as advisory members of the Council.

W. P. Haltom was re-elected to the Bible College Board.

Rev. H. A. Downing was elected to the Examining Board.

Rev. J. R. Kelly was re-elected to serve on the Educational Board.

Adjourned by expiration of time.

Third Sitting

The third sitting opened with the Conference singing, led by Sister Close.

A beautiful and impressive ordination service followed, with Rev. L. W. Sturk delivering the Charge to Ministers. Rev. Lyle Wayne Quinn and Rev. E. C. Gafford received the rites of Ordination.

It was moved and seconded the Conference adjourn. Carried.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY REPORT

This report is somewhat incomplete and vague, due to the fact that this last year in trying to start as a District we had little pattern to follow. As individual societies, however, the work of the Society has gone forward.

I felt concerned for something we could do district wide that some other district was not doing. Upon writing Miss Dean, promptly came the reply that Oklahoma-Texas might have the project of sending blankets to the Phillippes for our very own. We were happy to do it.

A brief report from the following societies has been given to me:

BLACKWELL—Organized March 28, 1950 with 12 present. Two meetings are held each month. One is a study and prayer service. The second comprises business, devotional, and work period in interest of home and foreign missions. Boxes have been sent to the department and the blanket to the Phillippes.

BETHANY—I do not have the president's report, but dish towels were sent to the Bible School, a Christmas box to Strucklands and a blanket to the Phillippes. A study course has also been followed.

DEVINE, TEXAS—Has not organized as yet but are doing a good work. They meet each month. They have sent boxes to Africa, and sent money for special request.

ENID—Meets once a month and are stressing prayer for Missions in their meetings. A blanket was sent to the Phillippes along with some other useful articles.

FAIRVIEW—Organized in October. They have 13 active members and one associate. They have seven members of prayer and fasting league, 11 Missionary Bulletin subscriptions. They have sent 9 boxes to missionaries, three table cloths sent to Colorado Bible College, a blanket to the Phillippes. Their total receipts were \$71.86.

HOPETON—Was organized just a few days before Camp Meeting. Missionary boxes, however, have been sent through the Y. P. Society to Lyford, Texas, and Albuquerque, New Mexico. The missionary society sent a blanket to the Phillippes.

OKLAHOMA CITY—Membership 8 active, 2 associate, 11 Missionary subscriptions. They have used the study course books. Boxes have gone to Bible College and Africa, and the Phillippes. The total receipts were \$42.00.

PLEASANT VIEW—Was organized March 8, 1950, with 11 active and 5 associate members. A box was sent to the Headquarters Mission Home. A box of clothing valued at \$73.90 was sent to West Indies. Also the blanket to Phillippes.

POND CREEK—Sent a box to Rev. R. W. Ives, a quilt to Colorado Bible College and clothing to a native worker and family in British Guinea.

2. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid four (4) cents per mile travel expense.
3. We recommend that all ministerial tithe be paid to the District parsonage fund. We further recommend that Sunday Schools of fifty Treasurer monthly, this money to be placed in the district fund.
4. We recommend the transferring of the tent fund, to a district (50) or under pay ten (10) cents a week, and Sunday Schools of over fifty (50) pay twenty (20) cents a week into this fund. And that a special offering be taken once during the year to be applied to this fund.
5. We recommend that the registration fee for the camp be set at three (3) dollars for adults who stay the full time, and \$1.50 for those coming on or after the last Thursday. Children 5 to 12 one-half adult fee. We further recommend a fee of fifty (50) cents be charged for the cots the full time, and twenty-five (25) cents for those coming on or after the last Thursday.
6. We recommend the District Treasurer be paid a salary of \$50.
7. We recommend the District Secretary be paid a salary of \$30.
8. We recommend that the district postage, stationery, telegrams and telephone calls be paid out of the district fund.
9. We recommend that all district and general funds be forwarded to the district treasurer the first of each month.
10. We recommend that all the district checks from the bank be kept on file and turned over with the treasurer's books.
11. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$25.00 a week.
12. We recommend that the home missionary offering, which is taken the last Sunday of the camp, be applied in the interest of district home missions, and that the distribution of all Home Missionary money shall be left to the District Council.
13. We recommend we have 200 copies of the 1950 minutes printed and that we sell them at 25 cents per copy.
14. We recommend that each minister and deaconess, both licensed and ordained, be assessed a conference fee of \$2.00, the same to be paid before the end of the first quarter.
15. We recommend that all children attending be accompanied by a parent or guardian, and that they be subject to all camp rules.

MINUTES OF THE DISTRICT YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONFERENCE

The Third Annual Young People's Conference of the Oklahoma-Texas District was held at Hopeton, Okla., July 29, 1950, Rev. D. R. Close presiding.

Mary Darden was elected secretary, Frances Hofen as treasurer.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved that the penny-a-day money in the treasury specified for home missions be given to the special home missionary offering taken the last Sunday of camp.

Resolved that as young people we cooperate with the General Church in the weekly fast day.

Resolved that a Youth Rally be held once each quarter in connection with the regular district rally, and that two special rallies be held the coming year, September 4 and July 4.

Resolved that the minutes of this Conference be printed in the district minutes.

Resolved that each society set aside at least one meeting each year for a study of our church doctrine.

Resolved that a Young People's prayer meeting be organized on the camp ground in 1951, under the leadership of the executive committee.

Resolved that each society strive to keep the Pilgrim Youth News in each Pilgrim home.

Resolved that the assessment be as last year, 25c per member each quarter, the money to be divided equally between home missions and camp equipment.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. We recommend that the fiscal year close June 30th.
2. Inasmuch as the District Treasurer has so much work to do at the close of the year, be it resolved that all district and general monies be sent to the District Treasurer not later than July 10th.
3. Be it resolved that all delegates exceed the age of eighteen years.
4. Be it resolved that the Council make arrangements for a quarterly bulletin of district interest to be sent to each church.
5. In order that we may conserve the Lord's money and give our churches the advantage of evangelistic meetings, be it resolved that we as pastors and churches consult our Superintendent in slating Evangelists and, if it is possible and practical, that they be slated for two or more consecutive meetings which would keep down traveling expense.
6. Inasmuch as there is a great blessing derived from a ministerial and Christian workers convention, be it resolved that during the year we have a three-day convention in the district to be divided between the Ministerial and Sunday School interests. The council shall be the committee to set the time and prepare the program.
7. We recommend that the District Superintendent appoint all committees for the next year during the present conference sitting.
8. Be it resolved that our camp begin the third Friday in July.
9. Be it resolved that each minister come a day earlier and stay throughout the camp and a day after camp unless excused by the District Council. If it is impossible to come, unless excused, be it resolved that he send the sum of \$5.00 to help on camp meeting expense or to hire labor in erecting and dismantling the camp equipment whichever the council deems needful.
10. Be it resolved that each pastor have the privilege of conducting two revivals off charge during the year, or his choice of a two weeks vacation with pay and one meeting leaving the pastor responsible for supply; providing that the charge be supplied satisfactorily with the local church board.
11. Resolved that the camp have children and young people services, the District Council to secure a leader for each and said meetings to be announced on the camp meeting bills.
12. Resolved that the District Council set the date for the District Conference.
13. Resolved that each active minister be released for two Sundays during the camp and conference and that they receive regular salary or offering, providing they attend Camp and Conference.
14. Resolved that the first prayer meeting night in each month shall be donation night for the pastors of the district. The announcement shall be made the Sunday previous by someone appointed by the local church board.
15. Be it resolved that the pastors be required to see that all reports are mailed to the District Superintendent by the 15th of the month following the close of the quarter, and that the annual reports be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee by July 15th.
16. Be it resolved that the District remain divided into zones as follows: Zone 1. Hopeton, Pleasant View and Fairview; Zone 2, Pond Creek, Blackwell, Newkirk and Enid; Zone 3. Henryetta, Oklahoma City and Bethany; Zone 4, Devine, Hillsboro and Dallas.
17. Be it further resolved, that the pastors of each zone constitute the committee to prepare the program for the rallies in their respective zones.
18. We further recommend that when practical and possible one rally be conducted in each zone during the year, and that all rallies shall be under the supervision of the District Superintendent.
19. Resolved that we have a workers meeting in the 1951 camp meeting beginning at 9:15 a. m. to 10:15.

20. Whereas the Pilgrim Holiness Church has assumed a responsibility in supporting and caring for the missionaries going out under our church and whereas our missionary work is very extensive. And whereas the National Holiness Association is sending their representatives to the Association meetings for the purpose of advancing their interest in missions; be it resolved that our ministers go no farther in the Association than that of fellowship and that they comply with the manual page 44 par. 14 relative to all representatives. (Our pastors should not grant the use of their churches to those claiming to be missionaries or raising money for religious work, unless such persons have proper endorsement of the District Council.)

21. We recommend the following goals for this next year: 20% increase in Sunday School attendance; 15% increase in membership; 100% up on budgets each quarter. We recommend that a report be gotten out at the end of each quarter and sent to each church, the same being placed on the bulletin board showing each church's standing for the quarter.

22. Whereas there is a danger of valuable papers becoming lost in our local churches, we recommend that the District rent a safety deposit box and all churches send their abstracts, deeds, etc., to the District Superintendent for safe keeping in said box. This box shall be rented near the District Superintendent's residence.

23. Resolved that each pastor give a three minute report in district conference concerning his church's progress during the year covering spiritual, financial and numerical gains.

24. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be granted two weeks vacation with pay.

NEW RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that all pastors desiring or considering changing pastorates, shall send in their request to the District Superintendent prior to the annual meeting. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent present to each church a complete list of available pastors to be voted upon.

SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that we, the District Conference, express our appreciation to our District Superintendent, Rev. D. R. Close, for his labors of love among us the past year by a rising vote of thanks.

2. Be it resolved that we, the District Conference, express our appreciation to Rev. L. W. Sturk, by a rising vote of thanks.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Oklahoma-Texas District Conference convened at Hopeton, Oklahoma July 31, 1950.

Greetings.

Each District Conference brings us to a historic mile post in the life of a District. Gains and losses are tabulated and the future course of the District is charted.

Our people readily accepted the call of the General Board for fasting and prayer. We can not help but give credit for the best revivals in years to these seasons of fasting and prayer. There is only one way for victory in God's work and that is by way of the throne.

Home Missions has been the central program of the District over the years. We have appreciated the loyal response to this cause which has born fruit in Pilgrim congregations and now we have a fine group of young people in our Bible College preparing to enter the Lord's great harvest field. What greater increase and reward could we ask than to have out of our giving the establishment of churches and the going forth of our young people into Gospel work.

The District Conference last year set goals for this year. They were 20% gain in average Sunday School attendance over last year, 15% gain in membership, and 100% up on budgets each quarter. Our District gains in Sunday School .095%, membership .06%. The Sunday Schools that made the 20% gain in attendance were Enid 54%, Pond Creek 28%, Blackwell 23%, Bethany 21%.

The church which made the 15% gain in membership was Blackwell 33%.

Our great objectives as a church for the next four years have been laid out by the General Conference. The General Conference asks for 10,000 new members, 200 new churches, 65,000 average attendance in Sunday Schools, and 15,000 Advocate subscriptions to the Advocate. This of necessity becomes a district and local program. The Oklahoma-Texas District whole heartedly endorses this program. This means we must have a gain of 81 members or 25% in membership, 2 new churches, a Sunday School average of 677 or 30% gain. This can be attained by the whole hearted support of our people who we feel assured are in sympathy with this great cause.

We make the following recommendation to our conference that we stress spirituality and liberty of spirit among our people. That we keep the family altar ablaze and that we continue fasting and prayer for God's work and our own spiritual relationship with God. That we also maintain an aggressive evangelistic program and that we receive the new converts into the church. Furthermore, that we strive for larger Sunday Schools and young people's work and that the young people sponsor the Advocate subscription drive each year, and that we fully organize the Women's Foreign Missionary Society.

We have traveled 9,940 miles in District work, made 46 visits to the churches and pastored the church at Bethany, and held two revivals. We have received \$410.00 in mileage and have a balance of \$26.95.

We praise God for the privilege of service and grace and fellowship from the throne. We also deeply appreciate the privilege of laboring with the finest people on earth—God's people on the Oklahoma-Texas District.

Brother Nering kindly held the annual meetings in Texas. We greatly appreciate this kindness. We appreciate the prayers of the people of the District when serious illness was knocking at our door.

May God bless every one of you.
