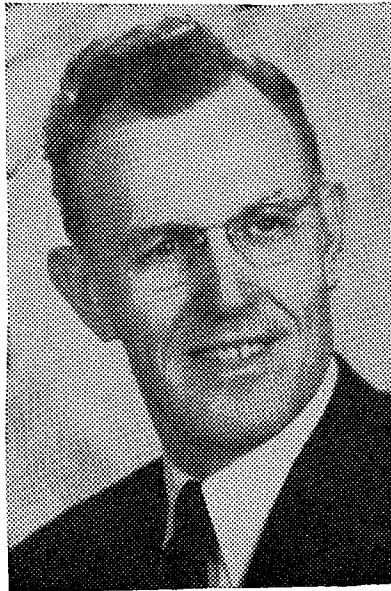

## CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The Ninth Annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened in Pilgrim Park, Salem, Oregon, August 16th, 1948, at 9:00. The Conference was opened by singing "Love Divine All Love Excelling". Two senior members of the district, Rev. O. D. Weaver and Rev. C. Edwin Cox, led the group to the throne of grace in prayer. Rev. R. A. Beltz, General Secretary of Home Missions, delivered the opening address, reading from the 5th chapter of Luke's gospel. The message of admonition and encouragement was much appreciated.

A motion prevailed to receive Rev. Parker Hesselton and Rev. W. H. Harman into the Conference by letters of transfer from other districts.

Mrs. Lily A. Rice was approved by the conference as the delegate from Vancouver.

A motion prevailed to include the first four seats of the center section and to the right of the platform in the Conference bar.

Replacements and substitutions on Standing District Committees were as follows:

Bro. Bulman was welcomed into the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent Roy E. Morgan submitted his report which was adopted.

The District Treasurer submitted his report which was accepted subject to approval of the Auditing Committee.

A motion prevailed to give Bro. Dixon a rising vote of thanks for his work as District Treasurer. After holding this position for several years he is now resigning.

Rev. Morgan spoke of some burdens which were on his heart, as follows:

1. Unity between the churches.
2. Holding our young people for the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
3. Promptness in getting in reports.
4. Entertainment of workers.
5. Conduct, appreciation of others, and being congenial.
6. Organizing prayer bands.
7. Urging Church standards.
8. Feeding the flock of God.

A motion prevailed to adjourn until 2:30 in the afternoon. Dismissed with prayer by Floyd Morgan.

## SECOND SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 2:30 p. m. as the group sang the hymn, "Friendship With Jesus," after which Rev. Floyd Morgan led in prayer.

The minutes of the morning sitting were read and approved as read.

The Statistical Committee gave their report which was accepted.

The report of the Sunday School Committee was read and accepted.

The Young People's report was read and accepted.

Resolutions were submitted as follows:

No. 3 was read and adopted by motion which prevailed.

No. 4 was read and adopted by motion which prevailed as amended.

No. 5 was read and adopted by motion which prevailed.

No. 6 was read but withdrawn.

No. 7 was read and adopted by motion which prevailed.

No. 8 was read and adopted by motion which prevailed.

A motion was made to receive the Misses Evelyn Ritenburgh and Betty Miller into the Conference by transfer from another district.

Bro. Canary and Bro. Connor were elected as additional members of the district council by secret ballot.

## EVENING SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 7:00 p.m. by singing "We Have An Anchor." Rev. John Connor led in prayer. Rev. R. A. Beltz gave words of council and advice to the Conference, using as a basis of thought Rev. 2:10, and spoke of our faithfulness to God and His work.

The minutes of the afternoon sitting were read and approved as corrected.

The recommendations of the Educational and Examining boards were given as follows:

The Auditing Committee gave their report.

August 30th was set as the date to begin work on the portable tabernacle at Oregon City. Special prayer was offered for this work and that in Portland.

Bro. Roy E. Morgan spoke of the memory of two ministers who have labored on the district but have since gone to be with their Lord, Vale Johnson and R. W. Tompkins. He called to mind their good work in respective pastorates, their sacrifice and life of prayer.

The Ways and Means Committee gave their report and the following resolutions were changed:

3. Resolved that each church take an offering for the District Superintendent at each of his regular visits, the same to be applied on the budget.

That the apportionment for Marysville be changed to \$10.00 per month.

That resolution No. 7 be deleted from the minutes.

The date was set for the next Ministerial Convention to be held February 15, 16 and 17th, with Rev. Sturk, our General Superintendent as speaker.

A motion prevailed to leave place of the Convention for the district council to decide.

The Secretary was asked to cast a ballot for the Trustees. Those elected were:

E. P. Dixon, chairman, Don Johnson, John Connor.

It was moved to send greetings to George Doll, who is in the hospital recuperating from a serious accident.

A beautiful ordination service then followed with Rev. R. A. Beltz officiating, Betty Miller as Minister and Edna Hussion and Marguarite Canary as Deaconesses.

It was moved and seconded to accept the nominations by the council for standing committees.

The Special Resolutions were read by the committee and accepted.

The closing sitting of the Ninth Annual Conference was concluded with prayer by Rev. R. A. Beltz.

## To the Ministers and Delegates of the Ninth Annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church,

### Greeting:

Grace, mercy and peace be multiplied unto you by the power of the blessed Holy Ghost.

We praise God for His abundant grace and victory through the precious blood of the Lamb.

In the Divine providence of our God we are again granted the blessings of fellowship in another annual conference. To God be all praise and glory.

In spite of the fact we live in a world of darkness, sin and despair, and the very atmosphere around us filled with fearfulness and uncertainty from the world's point of view, we are encouraged by the words of Holy Writ to look up in just such a time and condition. We praise the Lord for the promised hope which He has given to His children.

The past year has been a most busy one indeed in the work of the Lord, and we are happy to report victory and joy in the service of our Lord and Master and for the Church.

We appreciate those with whom we are called to labor and have a high regard for all our holy brethren in the Lord. God bless you all.

We have been saddened at the passing from our midst and earthly labors the past two years in the esteemed persons of Rev. Vale Johnson and Rev. R. W. Tompkins. Our loss here is their gain up there.

It was indeed a rare privilege to labor in behalf of our Department of General Home Missions and Church Extension throughout parts of the East this past Spring. We found many of our people who are much interested in the work of the Department, and the progress it is making on all fronts.

We are thankful for the victories, gains and material development of the District the past year, but most happy are we by the wonderful spiritual atmosphere in our midst.

If this Camp Meeting just closed is an omen, and we believe it is, we are making the kind of progress which is most important, and without which all other developments are of little worth. Let us always major on the spiritual in our efforts for God and souls; for unless our lives are Christ centered, we are merely time servers and are laboring in vain. Therefore we would urge upon all, first and foremost, deep piety, sincere devotion and the practice of real Bible standards in all we are and do. Therefore, whether we eat or drink, let us do all with an eye single to the glory of God.

Owing to lack of finances for entering any new field, we have been much hindered in making the progress as we otherwise should have made. As you recall at our last year's Conference there was an over \$850.00 deficit in our District finances, and this has had to be paid this year. We are thankful to report that this has all been cleared off in full. We are now in the best condition from every standpoint to make progress that we have ever been, by God's help.

The Bend Church which has been without scarcely any financial supporters for over three years has been closed and the property sold at a fair price, the money from which will enable the District to locate in a field of better and more favorable opportunity, at least at this time. Our faithful workers who have labored in Bend during these past three years have done so at great sacrifice and against tremendous odds. We appreciate their faithful efforts, and in spite of the fact that part of these workers were able to get a good Sunday School attendance in the persons of Boys and Girls, that in itself could not care for the support and maintenance of the work, and as time went on the condition was not improved but rather it decreased. Then we were very poorly located there for one thing. May the Lord help us in the future along these lines. Let us pray God to

lead us wisely. We want to reach, and must reach the boys and girls, but we must have adults to carry the burden and the responsibility of laboring in teaching, financing and staying by the work in their living and support.

We were sorry to have to retreat from this field, but were advised that under the circumstances, this was the wise thing to do.

Our net gain in Church membership this year has been small, being slightly over twelve per cent net gain. We have made a fifty per cent net gain in the membership of the District in the past three years. Our prospects are such that we should do much better this coming year than in the past.

God is opening doors for us and sending us by the help of the Department of General Home Missions some excellent workers. The Ablas came to us last year from West Virginia, and the Husselton family from Illinois this year. Also a number of new people from the East, besides these.

We were enabled of the Lord to organize the Church at Eugene with 17 charter members, 12 of which had no connection with our District before. We also were enabled to obtain for the pastorate of this Church Sisters Betty Miller and Evelyn Ritenburg, formerly of Michigan. God is giving them the hearts of the people, and we believe God will give them a good year.

We have taken in some six members in two other Churches also. Besides these we have Brother and Sister Harmon pastoring at Raymond, coming to us from the Idaho-Washington District.

Seattle will soon be dedicating their new Church building. This building is a wonderful credit to our denomination. We thank God for the faithful labors of Brother and Sister Floyd Morgan, who have sacrificed and worked so hard to accomplish this great work; along with this they have some of the best and most faithful help who have assisted them, that can be found.

The Salem Church has made progress in their construction of a new Church building; this also is going to be one of our nicest Church structures. Bro. Story is a hard worker but has been much hindered by so many other duties and lack of men to help in the construction of their Church building. God is blessing their work.

Medford now has one of the nicest and most commodious parsonages in our entire Church. Brother Connor has done much hard work in bringing it to completion. We thank God for men like the Pastors of these Churches, who are so ready to sacrifice and labor to build for God and the Church. The Medford Church folk so generously paid for the roofing on the District Parsonage and Brother Connor did the work of putting it on. May the Lord bless and reward them.

During the past year we have traveled 36,000 miles for the Church, visiting all the Churches three or more times, preached 131 times, held ten annual meetings, two revivals with several seeking the Lord. Organized one Church, received several subscriptions to the Advocate. Received my salary in full, half of which is paid by the Department of Home Missions, the other half by the District. Also received \$25 per month traveling expense. We were given \$47.32 love offering and \$75.79 in revivals. We thank all for these favors, and praise God for all victories. We sent out hundreds of pieces of mail in our work. We have given of our all to push and forward the work of God, and appreciate the love, fellowship and encouragement of you all. New doors are opening, we must enter them and forward the work of the Kingdom in our District. We covet your prayers, love and fellowship, and we pray God's richest blessings upon every one of you.

We have greatly appreciated the workers in our Camp just concluded. It has been our best Camp yet and God has signally met with, and blessed throughout. There is much land ahead to be possessed, let us go up and possess it at once.

We have enjoyed working for the Lord and with our Sunday Schools on the District the past year.

## STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that the District Council serve as our Missionary Committee.
2. Be it resolved that each church devote one service each month to missionary interests.
3. Be it resolved that no minister, evangelist or Christian worker in any realm be permitted to hold special services on the District who is not in sympathy and harmony with the doctrine and teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, nor without the advice and consent of the District Superintendent.
4. Be it resolved that each church appoint an individual to see that there is a food offering for the pastor at least once each month, which will be investigated by the District Superintendent during his visit to each church.
5. Be it resolved that all money is to be sent to the District Treasurer by the 10th of each month.
6. Be it resolved that all churches take an offering, both of food and cash for the Camp Meeting.
7. Be it resolved that each pastor conduct a class of catechism on the doctrine of holiness each month for the education of the members and their children.
8. Inasmuch as we are living in times of extreme lusts and worldliness and that such a spirit is manifest even in Holiness churches, be it resolved that we request every member to see to it that their children dress and conduct themselves as becometh holiness and according to our Church Manual.
9. Be it resolved that each church shall conduct a special Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription campaign and that a gold star recognition shall be given to each church that attains a hundred percent family membership subscription.
10. Be it resolved that our young people be given a prominent part in our District Ministerial Convention.
11. Be it resolved that each church shall furnish camp meeting equipment such as beds, bedding, furniture, dishes, utensils, etc., such that they might give away and that might be acceptable by the Camp Meeting Committee.
12. Be it resolved that each church be responsible for the salary or offering for the pastor during the Camp Meeting, and conference, and that this resolution shall be read to the church by the Church Secretary at the annual church meeting or sixty days before the Conference.
13. Be it resolved that we have a district young people's organization consisting of a Young People's Executive Secretary-Treasurer, and that a nominating committee be appointed by the District Superintendent that shall present names to this conference.
14. Be it resolved that a Young People's Rally be conducted in different zones of our district.
15. Be it resolved that we have a master plan for our Camp Meeting Grounds, and that this plan be drawn by a responsible draftsman to be approved by the District Council. Be it further resolved that all improvements and buildings be in harmony with the master plan.
16. Be it resolved that we have a Camp Meeting Board composed of nine men and that these shall include the following departments: Camp Meeting Treasurer, Camp Meeting Secretary, Department of Purchasing, Department of Entertainment, Department of Buildings and Grounds, Registrar, Department of Kitchen, Department of Labor, and Department of Dining Room.
17. Be it resolved that we have a Call Card plan for the District which shall be for the purpose of united help of \$1.00 per call, not more than four calls per year, for the Church Extension work of the District.
18. Be it resolved that there be quarterly meetings held in the Pacific Northwest district—and be it further resolved that the quarterly meeting shall be a union meeting of the churches of each zone, namely, the Northern, Central and Southern Zones.
19. Be it resolved that there shall be suitable advertising signs of the local church on the highway or highways approach and on the nearest through street to the church building, and on the church building.
20. Be it resolved that the District elect the members of the Camp Meeting Board.
21. We recommend that the course of study be purchased by ministerial candidates.

22. Be it resolved that the District School Committee be empowered by the Conference to contact the School Committees of the California District and the Idaho-Washington District for the purpose of establishing a Northwest School for all three districts.

23. Be it resolved that each church make plans for an active Missionary Society. This society shall function for Home and Foreign Missions and both men and women shall participate.

24. Be it resolved that those who regularly use the lights and water from the Camp Ground, except the caretaker or district officia's, shall pay the prevailing scale.

25. Be it resolved that immediate steps be taken to have a phone installed at Pilgrim Park.

26. We recommend that the local Sunday School shall count as present those from the local Sunday School who are attending the Annual District Camp Meeting—the attendance to be counted only when a card is signed by the proper camp meeting authority.

27. Be it resolved that the retiring pas'tor of the local church shall make available to his successor an up-to-date record of the names and address of the members and friends of the local church.

Be it resolved that immediate steps be taken to minimize the fire hazard to Pilgrim Park and buildings. Be it further resolved that a committee shall be appointed and empowered by the District Council to do this.

28. Inasmuch as the Brotherhood Insurance Company of Fort Wayne, Indiana, is state accredited and a Mennonite sponsored, non-profit Insurance Company for churches, and inasmuch as this Insurance Company has made available to the Pilgrim Holiness Church its fire, wind, etc., insurance at one-half State listed cost, be it resolved that the Pacific Northwest District take advantage of this insurance in the local and district properties.

29. We recommend that the District Grounds at Salem shall be called "Pilgrim Park".

30. We recommend that the partition of "Pilgrim Park" bounded by Williams Ave. on the East and Stortz St. on the North, shall be set aside fo our people to build a cottage on, and the cottage shall revert to the District a time of decease of the builders.

31. We recommend that whenever possible that the local church build a cabin at Pilgrim Park, and that the same shall be for the use of its pastors during Camp Meeting and Conference.

32. We recommend that the District Funds shall be kept in an account under the name of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

33. We recommend that an adequate charge for meals shall be made to cover the dining room expenses. And that the charge shall be made per dish or serving, and that a cashier shall collect for each meal, and that a committee composed of the purchasing agent, the cook and one active pastor appointed by the Council shall determine the charge per dish or per serving.

34. We recommend that those who are unable to pay for their entertainment at Camp Meeting shall be given the privilege of working for same as the opportunity affords.

35. We recommend that the procedure in regard to local church properties as outlined in the Manual, section 218, shall be carried out on this District.

36. We recommend that the District Superintendent shall devote his first visit to the local church of each conference year, to the instruction of the local church in regard to its responsibilities to the Church and its pastor, such as:

1. Parsonage.
2. Food offerings.
3. Selection of church officers and duties of same.
4. Support of General Church interests and why.
5. Loyalty to own church in SUPPORT and ATTENDANCE.
6. Vision in regard to expansion and progress in regard to local and district interests.
7. Pastoral and church cooperation.

37. We recommend that an active pastor within his own district zone shall be appointed by the District Superintendent as the Zone Chairman. And we further recommend that the chief function of the zone shall be in the interest of District Church extension.

38. We recommend that whenever feasible that a pastor of the district shall be called upon to help in a revival in another church on the district.

39. We recommend that a monthly report from the District Treasurer be sent to each church.

#### 1948 CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY CONFERENCE

40. We recommend: that the Zone Chairmen shall be elected by the delegates and ministers of his Zone at each Conference. We further recommend: that the responsibilities and duties of the Zone Chairman shall be as follows:

- (1) to conduct at least one service in each church of his Zone in the interest of Home Missions and Church Extension and to take an offering for same.
- (2) To make contacts and seek for new openings in places or with peoples.
- (3) To launch at least one Home Missionary Campaign each year in co-operation with the church and pastors of his zone.

41. Inasmuch as the work and scope of the District is increasing and the responsibilities of the District Superintendent is more demanding: We recommend that this Conference request the Executive Council to appoint an Assistant District Superintendent.

42. We recommend: that the District Superintendent shall conduct at least two home missionary campaigns in new fields in behalf of Church Extension on this District this Conference year.. And that the District shall be responsible for the pianist for these campaigns.

43. We recommend: That the Purchasing Agent shall be empowered to work out a plan for food donations in advance for each camp meeting, and it shall be of such nature as to include all friends and members of each church.

44. We recommend that each Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, of the first week of each camp meeting shall be devoted exclusively to a District Youth Convention. And that suitable workers shall be engaged who shall be sponsored by the District Young People.

45. We recommend: That wherever feasible that no one member of the conference shall serve on more than one conference committee or board.

#### SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS

46. Whereas Rev. R. A. Beltz, the General Secretary of Home Missions and Church Extension has been permitted to be present at our Conference, be it resolved that we give him a rising vote of thanks.

47. Whereas, our District Superintendent, Rev. Roy E. Morgan, has devoted himself to the responsibility of the District during the past year, be it resolved that we extend our utmost appreciation by standing to our feet.

48. Whereas in the providence of God, we have been permitted to enjoy another camp meeting under the efficient leadership of Revs. P. W. Thomas and Maxey Walton, and Max and Barbara Hamilton. be it resolved that we express our deepest appreciation for the many spirit filled messages and singing we enjoyed by a hearty Amen.

49. Where Sis. Woodruff and her good assistants, Sisters Linn, Maynard, Connor, Harman and others have worked so faithfully and untiringly in the kitchen department, and Sister Davis and her workers in the Dining Hall, be it resolved that we give them a rising vote of thanks.

50. Whereas, Mr. John Friesen has contributed wood and shavings toward the camp meeting, be it resolved that the Secretary send a note of appreciation.

51. Whereas our neighbor, Mr. Jones, has made available the water for the Camp meeting, be it resolved that the Secretary send him a note of appreciation.

52. Whereas one of our conference ministers, Rev. George Doll, is seriously injured and in the hospital, be it resolved that the Secretary send him greetings from the Conference.
