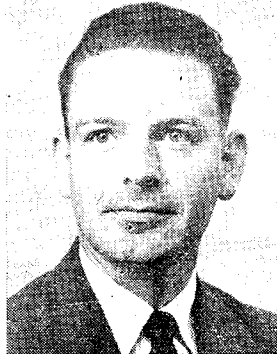

**DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT**

To the eleventh annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District, convened in session at Pilgrim Park, Salem, Oregon, August 7th, 1950: Peace be unto you, and grace from God our Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, and from the Holy Comforter.

It is with thanksgiving to God for all His bountiful mercies, both to you as a Conference and to this unworthy servant, that I greet you today.

In the good providence of God we arrived in Salem on the last day of June. Since that time I have been in "labors abundant" most of the time, in preparation for the great camp meeting which has just closed, and for this Conference.

My report of District work will necessarily be brief; however, I trust that it may be as thorough as it well can be under the circumstances.

**SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS**

As we have covered the District we have been pleased to find things in very good condition, generally speaking, so far as our observation has gone. We have noted with

pleasure the manifest desire expressed by our people for revivals, for spiritual advancement and for a greater work of God among us. Most of our churches have held their own this year and some have made gains in membership. Sunday Schools have lost in some places but others have made substantial gains.

There is upon the horizon some signs of a spiritual awakening among our people. May God grant that this Conference year shall witness a great out-pouring of the Spirit to this end.

#### TEMPORAL CONDITIONS

A number of churches have made gains in this field. Portland First has made remarkable progress in this direction. They have secured a substantial loan and are going ahead with the completion of their new church. The building is a frame structure and will be plastered inside and finished with shakes outside. It should be ready, the opening service, by early fall, the Lord willing. Brother Husseton has done a fine work there. They have doubled their membership this Conference year.

At Seattle, Brother Morgan and his workers have also made splendid progress this year. They have practically finished their beautiful church and plan to erase the indebtedness this Conference year. The building is a beautiful brick structure and has ample Sunday School rooms for a good sized Sunday School.

Salem church is nearing completion. Brother Story and his church people have worked hard and done a very commendable piece of work. The church building will be a lovely stucco job outside when completed. It is beautifully finished inside with buff colored plaster. They hope to move in this fall some time. Sunday School rooms will be finished later.

Clatskanie has made over \$300.00 worth of improvements on their church property.

Klamath Falls also made considerable improvements on their property.

Aurora church made something over \$300.00 worth of improvements also.

Work is progressing on the District parsonage at Salem. A number of the brethren have worked on it recently. During the year the brethren have built a lovely addition to the parsonage, providing a utility room and garage. This new addition will not be finished now. The main part of the house will be completed soon for occupancy. The inside is plastered beautifully in colors and a lovely oak hardwood floor has been laid in the large living room. All the labor has been donated by our faithful brethren. When completed this will be a lovely house of which the District can be justly proud. We certainly appreciate the fine offering of over \$600.00 in cash and pledges for the parsonage and camp ground improvements taken during the camp meeting.

Our churches have responded well this year to the District budget and other interests. This is very commendable in the absence of a Superintendent to keep them reminded of these obligations. Most of them are in very good condition financially according to reports made to me.

#### OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

The Pacific Northwest has a fine group of young people as a District. Our hearts are made glad as we see them taking new territory for God and His cause. Our Executive Secretary of Youth Work, Miss Betty Miller, and the workers who have assisted her, have done noble work this year among the young people. Miss Miller has visited most of the churches of the District once in this work and a number of rallies have been held over the District. There is genuine interest among the young people in promoting a forward move for Christ in youth work this year. It is our hope that we shall have more rallies and other work for our young people this year. A better and more comprehensive organization and program are being planned in this connection for this and following years.

From my limited survey of the work I would say that the over all picture is one of very good condition in general, with quite bright prospects for a progressive and expansive work of God, with challenging situations and some problems here and there to be expected.

We rejoice to report that Brother Canary has opened a new work in North Portland. This will become our second church in this great city, if we are able to carry it through as now planned. Also, Brother Imel has opened a new work at Waldport, Oregon, which we hope to see developed into a good work during this year.

#### OUR PLEDGE TO YOU

We have not come to the Pacific Northwest to twaddle our thumbs and take life easy. We have come to give our best for the service of God, the Church and the lost. We

turned down other open doors to enter this one and we trust that we are in God's will in being here. We have already begun to visualize the possibilities of a great work of God in this wonderful part of our country.

On our way out here I was under a heavy burden concerning our move and the work here. During this time the Lord spoke to me and said, "Call unto me, and I will answer thee and show thee great and mighty things which thou knowest not." This is my text for the Northwest. Will you not join with me, dear hearts, in prayer and work to see the fulfillment of this promise? I am sure that you will. It will mean sacrifice and toil. As Churchill said to England upon the eve of her greatest crisis in the recent war when he was installed as prime minister, so I now say to you, "I have nothing to offer you but sweat, and tears and blood." It will take it to win this Northwest for God, but if we will furnish the man God will furnish the grace. We must be up and at the job constantly. Our ministers and our laymen must catch the vision afresh. We must have old fashioned revivals where sinners will be saved and believers sanctified wholly. We must spare no time nor means to see this work of God accomplished. We are small as a District compared to the larger ones, but by the unity of the Spirit and firmness of purpose we can accomplish the impossible and do miraculous things for Christ. Let us go forth from this Conference determined to push the work of God to the limit of our ability by His grace this year.

We have been royally received, graciously treated and considerably accepted by our people everywhere over the District. We trust that we shall so live and serve Christ among you as a family that you shall never have occasion to regret our coming among you. We pledge you our best for the cause of Christ and the forwarding of the work of the Church in this part of God's vineyard, by God's help. We solicit your prayers and cooperation in undertaking so great a task.

#### IN APPRECIATION

I wish to hereby extend my deepest appreciation to our former District Superintendent, Rev. Roy E. Morgan. During his four years of service to the District, he did an excellent work. He left the work in fine condition for his successor. I have heard many good words of commendation for the Morgans and their work. May God bless them in their new field of labor.

#### MY PERSONAL REPORT

I have covered the entire District since coming on the work this summer. I have visited every church and preaching point except Proebstel and investigated the work and held most all the business meetings. Most of the churches have pastors for the coming year already settled and the rest are in the process of being cared for.

Canary, with Evelyn Ritenburgh at the piano. Rev. Connor led in prayer. Rev. Wm. S. Deal introduced Rev. R. A. Beltz, Secretary of Church Extension, as the Conference Chairman. After reading from II Timothy, chapter four, Rev. Beltz gave a splendid message on "The Objectives of the Coming Year". It was moved that delegates from the Church Extension Projects be seated in the Conference. Mrs. Freda Mansfield from Portland 2nd, and Mrs. Elsie Emil from Waldport, were the delegates.

In the absence of both delegate and alternate, it was moved that the following be granted seats to replace them: Mrs. Beulah Dworschwak, Aurora; Mrs. O. D. Weaver, Klamath Falls; Mrs. Doris Willis, Salem.

Rev. and Mrs. Wm. S. Deal were received into the Conference.

The first five rows of the center section and north wing of the tabernacle were set as the Conference Bar.

Time of recess was set at 12 o'clock, afternoon sitting at 1:30 and evening at 6:30.

Rev. Wm. S. Deal read his report for the forty days he had been District Superintendent. (Report on page five). This was accepted.

The combined report of the Examining and Educational Boards was read and accepted. (Report on page fourteen). Rev. D. L. Goss and Rev. L. R. Blackman were then granted seats in the Conference Bar.

Rev. Harry Heck and Rev. Carl Mansfield were appointed by the District Superintendent as a Reception Committee.

The Conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Mansfield.

### AFTERNOON SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 by singing "There is a Fountain Filled with Blood" with Mrs. Harley Lintz at the piano. Rev. I. G. Canary led in prayer.

The Statistical Report was read by Rev. Canary. Rev. R. A. Beltz commented on the report. It was accepted by the Conference. (Report on page nineteen).

The Auditor's report was read and accepted. (Report on page eighteen).

The Treasurer's report was given and accepted. (Report on page eight).

The Young People's report and Financial statement were read and accepted. (Report on page seven).

A letter from the Calhouns was read and appreciated. The Conference instructed the Secretary to send them a letter from the Conference.

An additional report of the Examining Board was given and accepted.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read (Report on page fifteen) and the following action ensued: Resolution No. 5 was amended to read "\$200" instead of "\$100"; resolution No. 6 was amended to read "25c" instead of "20c"; resolution No. 7 was amended to read "District interests" instead of "Camp improvements", also, "at the call of the Treasurer" was added. This report, as amended, carried.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read and caused the following action: resolution No. 2 was amended to read "quarterly"; No. 9 was referred back to the committee; resolution No. 10 was amended by adding "and that two or more names for each office shall be nominated by the District Council"; resolution No. 12 was amended by adding "The ministers and families exempted"; the report, as amended, was accepted.

A motion was made and carried, that the Ordination Service be held at the beginning of the evening sitting.

A motion prevailed that the minutes of the last sitting be read to, and approved by, the District Council at their first meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 o'clock.

### EVENING SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 6:30, opening with an impressive ordination service during which Rev. R. W. Birch was ordained. The District Council assisted. Rev. R. A. Beltz gave a splendid message concerning The Minister. In part, the message stated that the minister's calling was a high one; his life should be a clean one—a high calling demands a holy life—; his message should be the word of God; he is called to be a servant—a messenger of God.

The following were introduced to and welcomed by the Conference: Rev. H. C. Williams, Rev. D. L. Goss, Rev. Arthur Watrous, Rev. L. R. Blackman, Rev. Harley Lintz, Rev. Westley Emil, Rev. Ralph Myrick, and Rev. W. T. Stone.

A motion was made and carried that the election of officers be the next order of business. Rev. Husselton and Rev. Canary were appointed to count the votes and the Rev. Mansfield, Birch, Connor, and Dworschwak were appointed as tellers.

Rev. I. G. Canary was elected as Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. Floyd Morgan was elected as District Secretary, and Rev. V. G. Story for District Treasurer, upon nomination by the District Council.

The Rev. John Connor, Carl Mansfield and D. L. Goss were elected to the District Council.

A motion carried to ratify the nomination of Mrs. Carl Mansfield for Secretary and Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

Mrs. Deal was elected as President of the District Missionary Society, and Mrs. Heck as its Secretary and Treasurer.

A motion prevailed to ratify the nominations of the District Council for the Examining Board as follows: Rev. Parker Husselton, (term of office 3 years), Rev. James Dole, (term of office 2 years), and Rev. John Connor, (term of office 1 year).

A motion carried to ratify the nomination of the District Council for the Educational Board as follows: Rev. I. G. Canary (3 years), Rev. Betty L. Miller (2 years), and Rev. D. L. Goss (1 year).

It was moved and seconded that the Secretary cast the ballot for the present Trustees: Rev. John Connor, Mr. Don Johnson, and Dr. E. P. Dixon. The motion carried.

A motion carried that the Council elect the members of the Camp Meeting Board.

A motion prevailed that Svenson and Clatskanie be placed in the Central Zone.

The following Zone Chairmen were elected: Central—Rev. Husselton; Southern—Rev. Harry Heck; Northern—Mrs. Harley Lintz.

It was moved and seconded that all reports of the Ways and Means Committee be placed in the Standing Rules of the Conference. The motion carried.

The Special Resolutions of the Resolutions Committee were read and enacted. (Resolutions on page fourteen).

A motion was made and carried that all unfinished business be referred to the District Council.

The Conference was dismissed by prayer.

## STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that no minister, evangelist or Christian worker in any realm be permitted to hold special services on the District who is not in sympathy and harmony with the doctrine and teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, nor without the advice and consent of the District Superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that all money is to be sent to the District Treasurer by the 10th of each month.

3. Be it resolved that each church shall conduct a special Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription campaign and that a gold star recognition shall be given to each church that attains a hundred percent family membership subscription.

4. Be it resolved that our young people be given a prominent part in our District Ministerial Convention.

5. Be it resolved that each church shall furnish camp meeting equipment such as beds, bedding, furniture, dishes, utensils, etc., such that they might give away and that might be acceptable by the Camp Meeting Committee.

6. Be it resolved that each church be responsible for the salary or offering for the pastor during the Camp Meeting, and conference, and that this resolution shall be read to the church by the Church Secretary at the annual church meeting or sixty days before the Conference.

7. Be it resolved that a Young People's Rally be conducted in different zones of our district.

8. Be it resolved that we have a master plan for our Camp Meeting Grounds, and that this plan be drawn by a responsible draftsman to be approved by the District Council. Be it further resolved that all improvements and buildings be in harmony with the master plan.

9. Be it resolved that we have a Camp Meeting Board composed of nine men and that these shall include the following departments: Camp Meeting Treasurer, Camp Meeting Secretary, Department of Purchasing, Department of Entertainment, Department of Buildings and Grounds, Registrar, Department of Kitchen, Department of Labor, and Department of Dining Room.

10. Be it resolved that there be quarterly meetings held in the Pacific Northwest District—and be it further resolved that the quarterly meeting shall be a union meeting of the churches of each zone, namely, the Northern, Central and Southern Zones.

11. Be it resolved that there shall be suitable advertising signs of the local church on the highway or highways approach and on the nearest through street to the church building, and on the church building.

12. Be it resolved that the District elect the members of the Camp Meeting Board.

13. We recommend that the course of study be purchased by ministerial candidates.

14. Be it resolved that each church make plans for an active Missionary Society. This society shall function for Home and Foreign Missions and both men and women shall participate.

15. Be it resolved that those who regularly use the lights and water from the Camp Ground, except the caretaker or district officials, shall pay the prevailing scale.

16. We recommend that the local Sunday School shall count as present those from the local Sunday School who are attending the Annual District Camp Meeting—the attendance to be counted only when a card is signed by the proper camp meeting authority.

17. Be it resolved that the retiring pastor of the local church shall make available to his successor an up-to-date record of the names and addresses of the members and friends of the local church.

18. Be it resolved that immediate steps be taken to minimize the fire hazard to Pilgrim Park and buildings. Be it further resolved that a committee shall be appointed and empowered by the District Council to do this.

19. Inasmuch as the Brotherhood Insurance Company of Fort Wayne, Indiana, is state accredited and a Mennonite sponsored, non-profit Insurance Company for churches, and inasmuch as this Insurance Company has made available to the Pilgrim Holiness Church its fire, wind, etc., insurance at one-half State listed cost, be it resolved that the Pacific Northwest District take advantage of this insurance in the local and district properties.

20. We recommend that the District Grounds at Salem shall be called "Pilgrim Park".

21. We recommend that the partition of "Pilgrim Park" bounded by Williams Ave. on the east and Stortz St. on the north, shall be set aside for our people to build a cottage on, and the cottage shall revert to the District at time of decease of the builders.

22. We recommend that whenever possible that the local church build a cabin at Pilgrim Park, and that the same shall be for the use of its pastors during Camp Meeting and Conference.

23. We recommend that the District Funds shall be kept in an account under the name of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

24. We recommend that an adequate charge for meals shall be made to cover the dining room expenses. And that the charge shall be made per dish or serving, and that a cashier shall collect for each meal, and that a committee composed of the purchasing agent, the cook and one active pastor appointed by the Council shall determine the charge per dish or per serving.

25. We recommend that those who are unable to pay for their entertainment at Camp Meeting shall be given the privilege of working for same as the opportunity affords, and food donations be accredited to meals' account.

26. We recommend that whenever feasible that a pastor of the district shall be called upon to help in a revival in another church on the district.

27. We recommend that a quarterly report from the District Treasurer be sent to each church.

28. We recommend: that the Zone Chairman shall be elected by the delegates and ministers of his Zone at each Conference. We further recommend: that the responsibilities and duties of the Zone Chairman shall be as follows:

- (1) To conduct at least one service in each church of his Zone in the interest of Home Missions and Church Extension and to take an offering for same.
- (2) To make contacts and seek for new openings in places or with peoples.
- (3) To launch at least one Home Missionary Campaign each year in co-operation with the church and pastors of his Zone.

29. We recommend: That the Purchasing Agent shall be empowered to work out a plan for food donations in advance for each camp meeting, and it shall be of such nature as to include all friends and members of each church.

30. We recommend that each Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of the first week of each Camp Meeting shall be devoted exclusively to a District Youth Convention. And that suitable workers shall be engaged who shall be sponsored by the District Young People.

31. We recommend: That wherever feasible that no one member of the conference shall serve on more than one conference committee or board.

32. Be it resolved that all birthday offerings be used for Home Missions.

33. Be it resolved that a building program for Pilgrim Park be carried out. This is to include remodeling the kitchen, work on the pump house, toilets, etc.

34. Be it resolved that each church take a special offering each month to be divided equally between Home and Foreign Missions.

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend that there shall be a District Youth Board composed of the District Superintendent, District Youth Executive Secretary, District Youth Treasurer and the Youth Zone Chairmen. The purpose of this board is to co-ordinate the youth work on the District.

2. We recommend that there shall be a District bulletin published quarterly and that it shall be called "The Northwest Pilgrim"; and that this bulletin shall comprise all the departments of the district, name: General Church, Youth, Sunday School and Missionary Departments. We further recommend that the representative head of each department shall be responsible for the publishing material; and that the means of promotion of the bulletin shall be by subscriptions of ten cents per copy; also that the District Superintendent shall be the Editor of the bulletin.

3. Substitution for No. 15 of Standing Rules. We recommend that those who use utilities or appliances at Pilgrim Park, except the District Superintendent and the caretaker, must receive permission and shall pay the required assessment.

4. Addition for No. 27 of Standing Rules. And that a concise report shall be posted in a conspicuous place at the beginning of the annual Conference.

5. Inasmuch as the annual ministerial reports are not read at the annual Conference,

we recommend that each minister shall be permitted to give an oral report not to exceed five minutes.

6. Inasmuch as there is a growing need in the great Northwest for closer cooperation and greater understanding of mutual problems and burdens between the Idaho-Washington District, and the Pacific Northwest District, we recommend that the Pacific Northwest District shall invite the Idaho-Washington District to a joint ministerial convention; and that the date, place and program shall be arranged by the officials of said districts.

7. Delete No. 29 of Standing resolutions.

8. Inasmuch as there is a need to schedule our annual Camp and Conference so as to accommodate our General Superintendent and to better cooperate with the Idaho-Washington District, we recommend that the Conference shall grant the District Council the privilege of arranging and scheduling the Camp and Conference to the best advantage of all concerned.

9. Whereas there is need of promoting the work of our missionary societies on the district, we recommend that the Conference shall elect a missionary president and a missionary secretary-treasurer: We further recommend that two or more names for each office shall be nominated by the District Council.

10. Whereas the General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has set as objectives for the next four years that of bringing our membership up to 50,000, increasing our Sunday School attendance to 65,000, and the Advocate subscriptions up to 15,000; And whereas we as a Conference should strive mightily under God to fulfill our obligations to this great program; Therefore be it resolved that the Conference set as our objectives:

- (1) To triple our Sunday School attendance,
- (2) To double our church membership,
- (3) To quadruple the Advocate subscriptions,
- (4) To advocate and to teach loyalty to the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

11. Whereas the Pacific Northwest District is yet a young district, Be it resolved that those other than the delegates and workers at the Conference shall pay for meals the same as during the camp. Ministers and their families shall be exempted.

12. Whereas the constitution of the United States provides for freedom of worship; Be it resolved that this conference go on record as being opposed to any school system which violates the conscience of our children by any anti-Christian requirements which are contrary to the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

No. 13. Whereas there is a good opportunity for promoting the Camp interest by the formation of an association, and whereas the ministers and laymen at this recent Camp voted to recommend to the Conference that such an association be formed; Therefore be it resolved:

That this Conference authorize the formation of a Camp Association;

Be it further resolved that this association shall be known as the "Pilgrim Park Camp Meeting Association";

That it shall be under the direction of the District Council of this District, which body shall make the rules governing the Camp;

That membership in this Association shall be open to any Christian who believes in and wishes to help promote the doctrine and experience of holiness as this Camp Meeting stands for it;

That the membership fee shall be \$1.00 per year, to be paid annually at the Camp Meeting time or prior thereto;

That there shall be a Secretary-Treasurer of this Association, who shall be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church;

That said Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the Conference annually upon nomination of one or more persons for this office by the District Council;

That said officer shall be charged with the responsibility of sending Camp Meeting literature, advertising, etc., to all members of the Association not less than 30 days prior to the Camp, together with the request that all members pay their \$1.00 fee of membership at this time.

That all monies coming from membership fees shall be used to promote the Camp interests, and shall be turned over to the District Treasurer at Camp time, for this purpose.

No. 14. Whereas there is a desire on the part of a number of our young people, as well as the ministers, for more Young People's Rallies; Therefore be it resolved that we

have not less than one rally per quarter in each Zone this year.

No. 15. Whereas many of our churches pay their pastors by the free-will offering method, and this method often works a handicap upon the pastor both in raising his church finances and in his personal plans; Therefore be it resolved: That each church of our District begin to pay the pastor a stated amount per week.

No. 16. Whereas the Camp Grounds must be prepared for the Camp Meeting; Therefore be it resolved: That we have a District-wide "Fourth-of-July-Cleanup-Day" at the Camp Grounds, and that this day be climaxed with a Young People's Rally. We recommend further that, when possible, the young people come prepared to remain over the fifth in order to put the grounds in proper condition for Camp.

No. 17. Whereas our young people play an important part in our District work, and whereas, for the best interests of the promotion of our youth work, we need District gatherings;

Therefore be it resolved: That we have one or more District-wide Young People's Rallies during each Conference year. (One of them may be the Fourth of July Rally if desired.)

No. 18. Whereas there is a definite need for Bible Colledge training for young workers, and whereas our El Monte school is so far from the Northwest;

Therefore, be it resolved that this Conference empower the District Council to appoint a committee to meet with a similar committee from the Idaho-Washington District to study the matter and, if deemed advisable by the District Council, after due consideration, to help formulate a petition to the General Board for permission to begin plans for a Bible College in this great Northwest.

### SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas Rev. R. A. Beltz, our beloved General Secretary of Church extension has laboured faithfully during the past four years with us, and whereas this may be the last time our conference will be under the Church Extension Department;

Be it resolved that we rise to our feet and give Brother Beltz a hearty "God bless you!" and bid him God-speed.

2. Whereas in the kind providence of God, Rev. and Mrs. William S. Deal and daughter Evangeline, have come to our district; and whereas Brother Deal is assuming the heavy load of District Superintendent;

Be it resolved that we manifest our declarations of appreciation, co-operation and loyalty by a hearty Amen.

3. Whereas Mrs. Curtis Woodruff, and her loyal assistants, have worked so faithfully and efficiently in the kitchen and dining room, be it resolved that we give them a rising vote of thanks.

4. Whereas Almighty God has once more visited us with a gracious camp-meeting under the ministry of Rev. M. C. Kittle and Rev. Wm. S. Deal, and the Singing Stones, be it resolved that we express our gratitude by a hearty Amen.

5. Resolved that the Secretary send an expression of appreciation to the Portland Traction Company for permitting Camp posters to be placed in the Salem City buses and paying for cost of the space.

6. Resolved that we send an expression of thanks to Mrs. Doris Willis for securing the advertising space on the buses and placing them there.

7. Resolved that the Secretary send letters of condolences to our ministers who are ill.

### Combined Report of the Educational and Examining Boards

The joint report of the Educational and Examining Boards recommends that:

Homer C. Williams and Leonard R. Blackman be accepted as ordained ministers transferring from a sister church;

D. L. Goss be accepted as an ordained minister transferring from the Idaho-Washington District;

R. W. Birch be recommended for ordination;

Ida May Morgan be continued in the third year license;

A. T. Williams be continued in second year license;

Curtis Woodruff be granted second year license;

Roy Dworschwak be granted second year license;

Harley Lintz and Westley Imel be granted first year license;

Lloyd Johnson be retained as first year license.

### Report of the Ways and Means Committee

1. Be it resolved that all birthday offerings be used for Home Missions.

3. Be it resolved that each church treasurer be authorized to send 10% of the regular church offerings to the District Treasurer for District expenses, which includes pastor's tithes. 4. Be it resolved that all unstationed ministers and evangelists pay 50% of their ministerial tithes to the District Treasurer.
5. Be it resolved that the District pay the District Superintendent \$200 per month, plus \$25 per month for traveling expense. Be it further resolved that he be allowed three or four revivals per year, either on or off the District, from which he may keep the offerings.
6. Be it resolved that each church send to the District Treasurer the equivalent of 25c per member per year for General Conference expense.
7. Be it resolved that we have a call card plan for the district which shall be for the purpose of united help of \$1.00 per call, not more than two calls per year, same to be used for District interests.
8. Be it resolved that the District Treasurer be paid \$25.00 per year salary plus stationery and postage.
