PAPER READ BY THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

SOME OF OUR NEEDS

H. B. Barger

There needs to be a recognized head, a respected head, of every organization. No business can exist long without this. If it attempts it, its short life will be one of unpleasant and ever failing struggles. A spirit of independence and "do as I please, regardless" spells disaster and failure, whether it be home, church, or nation, not only to the organization, but to the individual. A proper recognition, not only of the head, but of the rights and privileges of others concerned, will bring about a pleasant state of harmony and fellowship that will mean strength and success that can never be realized in any other way.

Let us consider this in connection with our Annual Assemblies. Some one sees a need, writes a resolution, presents it to the conference. It is discussed, amended probably, and after spending much time considering it, it is adopted. Then is it not true that every one is in duty bound to see that it is carried out. But is it not true that many times we wilfully refuse to observe the laws thus made by our Assemblies and not only so, but we make slighting remarks about them, come back to the Assembly another year, make more and ignore them.

I appreciate our preachers and do not discredit the work they are doing for I believe we have some of the most sacrificing preachers in the nation. You will agree that the success of our church depends upon her ministry and is it too much to say that it is what we have made it? Perhaps you are not responsible for the existing conditions at your church, but

what about the fellow before you? That's conforiting, isn't it? We need Spirit-filled preachers,—not man-made, but God-called, until it is "Woe is me if I preach not." Then a few dollars, a home, a nice automobile, etc., will be counted as trash. I still believe in an old-fashioned God who will supply our needs if we obey Him.

We need better trained preachers. It seems to me that it is not fair to the church, or to the young, inexperienced preacher to assign him to a pastorate where some one before him has failed and perhaps left the church members disagreeing among themselves. He has a lot of carnal professors to handle who are many times on the official boards, but he is expected to pull that thing through and build it up. He has problems that the experienced pastor doesn't know how to handle. He tries it awhile in good faith, gets discouraged and tries something else. A pastor needs to know how to do many other things besides to preach. In fact in preaching is not where we are failing. Any of our preachers can preach a good sermon, but to keep harmony among the members and his church in a good working order is where we are losing. Is there not some way we can have instruction and training along this line?

We need preachers with a vision. The church is not just a place to preach a sermon and get an offering. You have a charge, a little flock of immortal souls committed to your care. All around are dangers, a plotting enemy seeking to destroy. You are to watch over them with a jealous care so that if the Master comes and looks over His flock He will find them well fed and satisfied. If your flock is restless, jumping the fence and flying over the wire, try changing feed. But you not only have a flock to watch over, you have powers and talents that you can engage in the Master's work. You should see to it that as nearly as possible every one in the flock is given something to do.

Again, a pastor must be a leader. We need leaders. If you are not a leader you will fail. It will take all your powers, for it takes patience and kindness to lead. I believe that under God, with persistent effort a pastor should lead his church to become a praying church, a spiritual and a working church. If you cannot lead, don't try to drive.

We need plenty of old-fashioned careful, Holy Ghost living so that the confidence of others will be strengthened instead of destroyed. We hear much these days about forgiving each other. If you do wrong and I know it, I cannot forgive you for it. God alone forgives sin. But by your need you destroyed my confidence in you as a Christian. You should fix it up with God and all others concerned and then my confidence will be restored. We are called upon these days to have confidence in folks that do things not consistent with a Christian life. I refuse to do it.

PROCEEDINGS

The Nineteenth Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District convened at 2:00 p. m. on the 3rd of June, 1929, in the First Pilgrim Holiness Church at Greensboro, N. C., in conformity with the resolution adopted by our last District Assembly that our Assembly follow immediately our annual state camp meeting.

Rev. H. B. Barger, our District Superintendent, read a portion of the 2nd chapter II Timothy, followed by prayer with Rev. J. T. Kenyon leading. The burden of prayer was that the Lord would direct in all the business that may be transacted by the Assembly and the presence of the Lord was felt in our midst.

A short talk was made by our District Superintendent in regard to the business of the Assembly. He hoped that as the reports were read by the pastors and delegates all would sympathize with the struggles and rejoice in the victories of the pastors and churches. In regard to the work of the Assembly, he admonished all to realize the importance of the work in hand,—the Lord's work; that there is more involved than dollars and cents and real estate,—that immortal souls are to be considered; that our duty is to further the cause and interest of His Kingdom in the world; that we should come together with our hearts and minds open for admonition, counsel, and advice; but more especially to hear the voice of God. We should do our best to make this one of the greatest conferences we have ever had and that it is the duty of every preacher and delegate to take an active part in making the conference a blessing to the immortal souls for which we are responsible by careful prayer and a vote according to our convictions. He criticised the feeling that seems to have been harbored in the past that because some resolution adopted by the Assembly did not conform to the ideas of the pastors they felt at liberty to purposely forget to put it into effect. He said, "Let us do our best to do business here that we can stand by and that will help us to do more for the Lord. If it does not accomplish that end, it is all a failure. I hope this will not only be done, but that it will be a time of spiritual refreshing until when the time comes for us to go home we will all go to sacrifice, pray and work as never before. This should be made a time of fellowship and communion among the brethren and the ties that bind us together in love and unity should be strengthened and we are made to feel that the brethren located in different places over the district are in perfect sympathy, praying for each other, interested in each other's welfare and expecting each other to succeed. All the business we transact will not succeed without the blessing of the Lord upon us."

Question arose as to whether the credentials of Aileen Gilbert, who came to us from the Nazarene Church, had been presented and accepted by this District. This was referred to the committee on credentials.

It was decided that the first six pews from the front, straight across the church, should constitute the conference bar.

Motion carried that the business be transacted according to the parliamentary rules of the Manual.

Rev. Clon C. Brown, of the Nazarene church, was recognized and given a seat in the conference bar. Bro. Bradley, of Miami, Fla., was also tendered a seat in the conference bar. Grady Castevens and Willie Deal, although not licensed at the present time, but because of their faithfulness in pastoring churches, were given the privileges of the conference bar.

It was decided that the business sessions of the Assembly be held from 9:30 a. m. to 12 m., from 2:00 p. m. to 4:00 p. m., and from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m.

Motion carried that all who could meet at 9:00 a. m. for special prayer.

Motion carried that the chair appoint the different committees which he did as follows:

Motion carried that the committee on worship decide the time and have one or more persons give a lecture during this Assembly on conducting young people's services.

Motion carried that if a report be not ready when called for that it be turned over to the statistical committee when properly prepared.

The remainder of the time until adjournment was spent in hearing reports from pastors, churches and Sunday Schools.

MONDAY EVENING SESSION.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. T. Kenyon with a talk from a portion of the 6th chapter of II Corinthians. Prayer was offered by Bro. Cox.

The minutes of last session were read and approved.

After roll call the reports were resumed, occupying the remainder of the session.

Motion carried that a committee be named to make report to the newspapers of the city. W. R. Cox and R. E. Dobie were named.

Adjournment until 9:30 Tuesday morning.

TUESDAY MORNING SESSION.

Devoitonal exercises were conducted by Rev. F. R. Cooper who used as a basis for his talk the latter part of the 8th chapter of Romans. Rev. B. B. Bulla led in prayer. This was followed by a talk by our District Superintendent who stressed several points that were on his heart, especially the need of old-fashioned Holy Ghost living.

Motion carried that the roll call be dispensed with. The minutes of last session were read and approved. The reading of reports was then resumed. After all other reports had been read, the District Superintendent read his report which was accepted. The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted, subject to the approval of the auditing committee.

Bro. Burgess of the Oklahoma District was presented to the Assembly and given a seat in the conference bar.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Carl Kivett with prayer by Bro. Barger. The roll was called and minutes of last session read and approved.

Rev. Mr. Harrison, District Superintendent of the Nazarene Church, was presented to the Assembly and given a seat in the conference bar.

The committee on resolutions reported and the following business was transacted:

Since there is dissatisfaction relative to the correlated board, be it resolved that we rescind the former action and elect all officers and boards separately by the Assembly, as provided by the Manual, pps. 28 and 31. Adopted.

Resolved, that the action of our last District Assembly relative to the date and place of the District Assembly be rescinded. Adopted.

Resolved that the District Superintendent be permitted to take a pastorate and that he shall not be required to visit the churches more than twice each year, except in case of necessity. Adopted.

Adjournment was made until 7:00 p. m.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION.

After a special season of prayer, Bro. York spoke briefly, emphasizing the need of holding up each other's hands. As the roll had been completed, it was decided to dispense with the calling of it. The minutes of last session were read and approved. The committee on resolutions continued their report and the following business was transacted:

Whereas there is confliction in the visitation of our general church representatives, be it resolved that we set aside four months of each year to be used by the representatives of each department in our district; viz., April, Home Missions; June, Foreign Missions; August, Orphanage; November, Bible School. Adopted.

Resolved, that our next annual Assembly be held in the fall of 1930, at Greensboro, First Church, 30 days prior to the General Assembly. Adopted.

Resolved that our District Counsel investigate and where they find churches, or circuits, able numerically and financially that they be supplied with a full time pastor. Adopted.

Resolved that a resolution adopted by our last District Assembly relative to the tithe of our pastors be rescinded. Adopted.

Since our people see the reports of the different churches as they appear in the minutes, be it resolved that all ministers and delegates hand their reports to the secretary and be allowed to give a brief, verbal report of their work. Adopted.

Resolved that we give due consideration to the resolution adopted by our last District Assembly relative to a Young Peoples' Convention. Adopted.

Resolved that each church pay the traveling expenses of its delegates to our District Assemblies. Adopted.

The ways and means committee reported and the following business was transacted:

Since our Bible School interests are of such importance and it would require extensive drafting of rules to meet the need, we therefore recommend that this Assembly give 30 minutes to lay this matter before the Conference. Adopted.

The auditing committee reported that the books of the treasurer were in good shape and his report was accepted.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

District Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Way.

Assistant Dist. Supt., Rev. H. B. Barger.

District Secretary, Miss Cary Anthony.

District Treasurer, Rev. J. F. Talbirt.

Additional members of the District Counsel: Rev. O. L. Ruth, Rev. J. T. Kenyon, Rev. W. R. Cox.

The session adjourned until 9:30 Wednesday morning.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION.

After prayer and devotional exercises conducted by Raymond Templeton, the minutes of preceding session were read and approved, and the following business transacted:

Motion carried that the District Superintendent be a member of the board of examination by virtue of his office. Ballot was taken for three other members, the one receiving the highest number of votes to hold the office for three years, the next highest for two and the next highest for one year, resulting in the election of the following: W. R. Cox, 3 years; O. L. Ruth, 2 years; H. B. Barger, 1 year.

The following board of education was elected: W. R. Cox, R. E. Dobie, H. B. Barger.

J. F. Talbirt was re-elected on the board of trustees for three years.

The missionary boards were combined and the following were elected on what is known as the Home and Foreign Missionary Board: J. F. Talbirt, J. T. Kenyon, O. L. Ruth, H. B. Barger, Mrs. W. R. Cox.

The committee on resolutions reported and the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved that any of our ministers interfering with the work or influence of a brother minister be dealt with according to Manual, pg. 62, section 139.

Since several of our ministers fail to comply with Manual in regard to reporting, be it resolved that those committing this error be dealt with by the District Counsel, according to Manual, pg. 61, section 138.

Resolved that since our District Superintendent shall have a pastorate and cannot give his full time to the work of the District, that he write an encouraging letter to each pastor quarterly which shall be read to the congregation.

Since there is so much worldliness among our young people and since our mothers have the greatest influence over our children, be it resolved that our preachers preach an encouraging sermon to mothers on Mothers' Day, helping them to counteract this great evil.

The session adjourned until 2:00 p. m.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Mr. Curtis Holland, a Greensboro business man who is a member of the Greensboro 1st P. H. church, and who has had considerable experience in managing the Young Peoples' Meeting, gave a 30 minute helpful talk on this interesting subject which we believe will be helpful to the pastors on this needy phase of Christian work.

Rev. W. R. Cox brought the needs of the Bible School before the Assembly in another 30 minute talk and several of the pastors pledged definite amounts in support of this worthy institution.

It was decided to refer this matter further to the pastors and advisory boards or S. S. boards of the different churches, letting them decide on the

amount to be given each month reporting the same to Bro. Cox, the president of the school, at once.

The committee on credentials reported as follows:

We, the examining board of the Sou. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, submit the following recommendations:

That the following names be continued in the 1st year,—Carl Kivett, O. T. Faither, C. W. Hartman, Raymond Templeton; 2nd year—W. S. Smith, T. C. Vaughn, J. B. Fulp, Mrs. J. E. Fulp, Grady Castevens; 3rd year—Ralph Davie, Lois Bingham, T. R. York; and that Robert Tritton and Robert McCluskey keep their present standing. Accepted.

The committee on resolutions reported and the following resolution was adopted:

Since our preachers feel the need of a broader and deeper conception our opportunities, duties and advantages as ministers; resolved that we have a meeting and invite an able man to discuss with us the problems that perplex us continually.

Bro. Cox announced that Rev. Jos. H. Smith was to be in the Bible School as a special lecturer at some time during the school year and it was decided that our ministers avail themselves of this special opportunity to hear this man of God, letting it take the place of the meeting decided upon in the resolution above.

The following resolution was referred to the District Council:

Since the district tent has cost so much, be it resolved that this Assembly put a minimum price on each meeting where held in connection with an already established P. H. church.

The ways and means committee recommended the following:

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid on the basis of 12c per mile and that a fund not to exceed \$600.00 be provided for this purpose by an apportionment which shall be arranged by the District Council and paid monthly through the regular channels, notice of such apportionment to be sent to each church by the secretary at an early date. Adopted.

A sum amounting to \$69.00 was pledged by the pastors in the Assembly toward the printing of the minutes of the Assembly.

Motion carried that the resolution regarding the Young Peoples' Convention be referred to the District Council.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered the 1st P. H. Church in Greensboro for their splendid entertainment.

A rising vote of appreciation was given our retiring District Superintendent, Rev. H. B. Barger.

A rising vote of co-operation was tendered our new District Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Way.

Motion carried that the books of all churches in this District be closed on the 31st day of July, 1930.

Motion carried that Miss Huldah Way be recognized as corresponding secretary for our new District Superintendent.

An offering of \$6.45 was given the conference secretary for her services. The Assembly adjourned.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

While this has been a short year, I have tried to do my best. Eternity will tell the extent of success or failure. I have visited the churches with the exception of two or three small ones. While some have been visited but once, others have been visited four or five times. The reason of this is that some need more attention than others. Have made 82 official calls and when advisable have had business meeting.

I preached 148 times; held four revivals; traveled 6,679 miles; received from our treasurer \$656.62; tithe handed me by preachers \$58.73; for revivals \$121.70; handed me by friends \$37.15; received on back salary \$179.86; for services as supply pastor at Ramseur \$94.28; total cash received \$1213.70; donations \$37.85; grand total \$1251.55. Paid out for gasoline \$73.48; for oil \$11.00; tires and tubes \$16.70; making a total of \$101.18 for traveling expenses.

The life of a District Superintendent is one of battles, sorrows; burdens, and disappointments, here and there a victory and a few sweet scented flowers which help to heal the wounds made by the thorns—a few friends gained to replace those lost. Don't forget to pray for your District Superintendent and when opportunity affords, speak a word of encouragement.

D. C. Holt started when organized at Ramseur, was called hence Jan. 22, 1929. He now rests from his labors but his works follow him four months later his wife, Mrs. D. C. Holt, passed thru the river of death to have a happy reunion over there.

S. W. Kerns, High Point church, a faithful, steady puller thru the long years passed, yet finished the work allotted him and went on to his reward. His first labors were at Sawyersville, Randolph county.

On March 19, 1929, J. C. Hart passed thru the valley of death to Eternal Bliss, Second church of Greensboro and Liberty Community lost one of the most conscientious, humble Christian ever lived among us. In prayer meeting he often prayed the clouds away and the glory down. He will be missed but our loss is his gain.

Mrs. Mollie Hudson, a charter member at Kildee, was suddenly and sadly taken from us by auto wreck April 21, 1929, bringing vivid to memory the words of the Master "Be ye therefore ready" with great anticipation we wait the glad morn of celebration that no human hand can record.

These having died in the faith is an incentive for us to be faithful a little longer.
